## **Recreation Center Rules**

- All persons using the Recreation Center facilities must pay in accordance with the approved fee schedule.
- A paying adult must directly supervise persons under the age of fifteen using the weight room.
- All youth groups must have one adult chaperone for every eight children.
- Food and drinks are confined to the vending and lobby areas only.
- Alcohol, drugs and tobacco products are prohibited.
- Shoes and shirts must be worn at all times outside the locker room facilities.
- Pets are prohibited inside the Recreation Center with the exception of Service Dogs.
- Indoor athletic shoes are to be worn in the gymnasium. NO sandals, street shoes or dark soled shoes are permitted.
- Slam dunking and hanging on the basketball rims is prohibited. Foul, abusive language and behavior is prohibited.
- Running and bouncing of balls is permitted in the gymnasium only.
- Headphones / Earbuds are required with music players, phones, and any other listening devices in the Rec Center.
- When using the fitness room, a maximum of 15 minutes per station is permitted when people are waiting.
- Children under the age of 8 must accompanied by an adult.

#### SWIMMING POOL RULES

- 1. Children 8 years of age and under must be accompanied in the pool area by a paying adult (16 years or older).
- 2. Children 2 years or younger must be accompanied in the pool by an adult (16 years or older).
- 3. Children not toilet trained must wear swim diaper under swimsuits. No disposable or cloth diapers.
- 4. Persons with skin disease, open wounds, nasal or ear discharge, inflamed eyes or any communicable disease are not permitted in the pool.
- 5. Adults must remain in the water with their child when using **floatation devices**. Restrictions apply for use of floatation devices. Please inquire with the pool staff as you enter the pool area.
  - Water wings and "puddle jumpers" may be worn from the zero entry area to the roped off 2 foot shallow end.
  - If in the main body of the pool, child wearing device must be within arm's reach of the adult
- 6. Smoking is permitted in designated area only.
  - Smoking area is along the fence in the concession area.
- 7. No food and drinks may be consumed pool side.
- 8. Jumping or diving in water 5 feet in depth or less is not permitted.
- 9. Running, pushing and horseplay are prohibited at all times in the enclosed area.
- 10. Only authorized staff is permitted in the pool filter room and pool office.
- 11. Organized activities in open swim areas are not allowed unless sponsored by the Department of Parks and Recreation.
- 12. Persons who are unable to pass a swimming proficiency test should not go into the water over their chest. Swimming test consists of being able to swim 25 meters in good form.
- 13. Toys and such
  - Acceptable: Diving rings/sticks, "noodles", soft nerf like balls if not crowded.
  - Not Acceptable: rafts, snorkels, fins, Hard balls (footballs, tennis balls...)
- 14. No animals, with the exception of service dogs, are permitted into the pool or pool grounds, unless a part of a Clarke County Parks and Recreation program or approved event.
- 15. No refunds for inclement weather closures.

#### **Diving Board Rules**

- 1. 250 lb weight limited on board.
- 2. One (1) person on the board's ladder at a time.
- 3. All divers must dive straight off the end of the board, no cartwheels or handstands. Swimmers are not allowed to sit on the edge of the diving board.
- 4. Each diver must wait until the preceding diver has cleared the area before diving.
- 5. Swimmers are not allowed to sit along the edge of the diving area

#### Lap Lane

- 1. Lap Lane is for the sole purpose of swimming laps.
- 2. Swimmers are not to cross the lap lane from the diving area to shallow water or to exit the pool.

#### **Adult Swim**

- 1. Fifteen (15) minutes of each hour, the pool will be cleared of children to allow adults to swim.
- 2. A child under the age of 5 may be in the pool with an adult. One child maximum per adult.

Violation of any of these rules could result in the park patron being asked to leave the park for the rest of the day. Severe or repeat violations may result in the patron being banned from the park a set period of time or permanently.



**Tennis Court Rules** 

- 1. Please observe general tennis etiquette rules of play.
- 2. In order to preserve our courts, no bicycles, skates, roller-blades, electric scooters, skateboards, or any other items that may damage the court surfacing.
- 3. Flat soled tennis shoes only.
- 4. Limit play to one hour if others are waiting.
- 5. Public availability is subject to Parks & Recreation, School, and scheduled tournament play.
- 6. Please use trash containers.
- 7. Hours are from dawn until 10:00 PM
- 8. Court Lighting:
  - Please help to conserve energy by using one set of lights at a time and turn off lights when you leave.
  - The lights have a warm-up period. Please do not turn on and off repeatedly.
  - The lights are on a timer and will not be available after 10:00 PM.
  - Please turn off the lights when you leave.
- 9. Users of the tennis courts are subject to all other park rules.
- 10. All animals, with the exception of service animals, are prohibited inside the fenced court area.

## TRAIL RULES

The trail is shared and enjoyed by bicyclist, pedestrians, runners, dog walkers, baby strollers and persons in wheel chairs. Please follow the trail rules and use courtesy and common sense to avoid collisions, especially when the trail is crowded.

- The trail is open from dawn to dusk.
- Motorized vehicles, except motorized wheelchairs, are prohibited on the trail.
- Electric scooters, with the exception of those being used for handicapped accessibility, are prohibited from trail.
- Horses are not permitted on the trail.
- All trail users should keep to the right side of the trail, except when passing.
- Pass other trail users on their left as you approach.
- Pedestrians have the right of way. Large groups of pedestrians should form a single file to allow bicyclists and others to pass.
- Bicyclists should ride single file.
- Maximum bicycle speed on the trail is 10 miles per hour.
- Keep pets on a leash and under control at all times. The best place for pets is on the right shoulder of the trail next to the owner.
- Pet owners must pick up pet waste on and off of the trail. Mitt stations are provided on the side
  of the trail periodically for your convenience.
- Respect adjoining landowners' rights and privacy.
- Enjoy the beauty of the wild plants and animals, but leave them undisturbed for all to enjoy.
- Discard all trash in the receptacles provided.
- Alcoholic beverages and illegal drugs are prohibited.
- Organized activities such as races are prohibited without first getting authorization from the Clarke County Parks and Recreation.

•	The trail is not cleared of snow and ice. If you choose to use the trail during the winter, please
	use caution.

#### General Park Rules

- Be appreciative of the natural beauty of our park. Please do not willfully break, damage, or vandalize park facilities or grounds, this includes digging, removing or damaging any natural resources on the grounds.
- For your safety, we ask that you do not climb on any trees or structures within the park grounds.
- Wildlife is a part of the beauty with our park, therefore, we ask that you do not hunt or trap within the park.
- In order to keep our park and fields in the best possible shape for public use, we ask that you only drive and park in designated roads and parking areas or other such areas that may periodically be designated for temporary parking by the Park Director.
- To ensure that our users to have a relaxing and enjoyable experience at the park, we ask that persons do not hand out handbills, circulars, advertisements, solicit donations or hang banners without the express authorization of the Park Director. We do have several bulletin boards for the public to hang flyers.
- Picnic shelters, benches, grills and fields are on a first come first serve basis when those facilities have not been reserved by an individual group. If you would like information on how to reserve those facilities or fees for reserved use, please visit or online site, <a href="https://clarke.recdesk.com">https://clarke.recdesk.com</a> or contact the park at (540)955-5140. Our park is open for your enjoyment from daylight to 10 PM unless there is a scheduled program or activity.
- Overnight camping and overnight parking are not allowed in the Park except in the instance of a special event or program authorized by the Director.
- For the safety of all of our patrons, please refrain from any using any fireworks, missiles or rockets in the park. We also ask that fires be contained to our grills, unless a specific event is authorized by the Park Director.
- No alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs are allowed on park grounds.
- Any concessionaire or other commercial activity must be approved by the Park Director and is subject to special fees and requirements. Please contact the Park for the details.
- In the interest of public safety, we ask that all dogs be kept on a leash and under the control of their owner at all times.
- We ask that everyone be respectful of all park users. We want everyone to enjoy a wonderful experience at the park. If we find that anyone is harassing or intimidating other patrons, we will ask them to leave immediately. We also ask that you keep noise to a level that will not interfere with other park users experience at our facility.

Violation of any of these rules could result in the park patron being asked to leave the park for the rest of the day. Severe or repeat violations may result in the patron being banned from the park a set period of time or permanently.

## **Clarke County Dog Park Rules**

- The off-leash dog area is for dogs, their handlers and those accompanying them. No other use is allowed.
- All dogs must be legally licensed and vaccinated, and shall wear a visible dog license.
- Dogs must be on leash when entering and exiting the off-leash dog area.
- Dogs must be under the control of their handler and in view of their handler at all times.
- Spike collars are prohibited.
- Children 8 years and under are not allowed in the off-leash dog area; children ages
   9 15 years must be accompanied by an adult.
- Handlers must be 16 years of age or older.
- Handlers must have possession of the dog leash at all times.
- Handlers must "scoop the poop" and fill any holes dug by dogs under their control.
- Food and drinks in glass containers are prohibited; training treats are allowed.
- Dogs must be removed from the off-leash dog area at the first sign of aggression.
- No animals other than dogs shall be permitted in the area.
- Users of the facility do so at their own risk. Neither Clarke County nor Clarke County Parks and Rec shall be liable for any injury or damage caused by any dog in the off-leash area.
- Dog owners are legally and financially responsible for their dogs behavior (responsibility of the owner still holds in the event the dog was brought to the park by a handler)
- Aggressive dogs, dogs in heat, or dogs under 4 months of age are not allowed.
- No smoking is permitted in the dog park.
- Dog owners/handlers are limited to a maximum of 3 dogs in the park.
- Small Dog Area is designated to those dogs that weigh less than 25 lbs.
- Clarke County Parks & Recreation has the right to close the park and make changes to the rules at any time.

Violation of any of these rules could result in the park patron being asked to leave the park for the rest of the day. Severe or repeat violations may result in the patron being banned from the park a set period of time or permanently.



#### PICNIC SHELTER RESERVATIONS

**Public Information** 

- 1. Picnic Shelters can be reserved from 9:00am 9:00pm, Sunday Saturday during the months of April through October.
- 2. Reservations can be made starting **January 1**<sup>st</sup> of each new year.
- 3. There are parking lots located at each shelter. All vehicles must park in the designated parking lots and not in the grass. One vehicle will be allowed to drive up to the shelter to unload, but must be moved to the parking lot.
- 4. Consumption or possession of alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs is prohibited.
- 5. There are grills located at each shelter. Ground fires are prohibited
- 6. Dogs must be on a leash and under the control at all times.
- 7. At the completion of the reservation, please place all trash in the receptacles and remove all personal belongings. Your cooperation in leaving the shelter as you found it is very much appreciated.
- 8. Athletic fields are available for your use as long as they are not reserved by another group. Please inquire at the time of your reservation if you are interested in using the fields.
- 9. There is a small fee required for use of the Swimming Pool and Recreation Center. The Playground and Fitness Trail are always open for your use. Please inquire at the Recreation Center.
- 10. By reserving use of the Park Facilities, you and your guests agree to abide by the Park Rules and Regulations.
- 11. If at any time you need the assistance of the Park Attendant, please check in with either the Swimming Pool or Recreation Center.
- 12. Reservations cancelled thirty (30) days prior to the reservation date will receive a full refund.

  Reservations cancelled less than thirty (30) days prior to the reserved date will receive a 50% refund. In the case of extreme inclement weather making the shelters unavailable for use, the reservation can be rescheduled.
- 13. Full payment is due upon reservation.
- 14. Refunds are not given for time not used.
- 15. Park equipment such as picnic tables, serving tables and trash receptacles should remain in the shelter.

<u>Purpose</u> Clarke County Parks & Recreation (CCPR) provides quality facilities that are available for citizens to use for various athletic activities. This policy establishes a fair, consistent, and predictable manner in which the public may use the athletic fields and is mindful of the financial contributions taxpayers make to help maintain county park facilities. The goal of this policy is to maximize use of the athletic fields while ensuring that the fields are maintained sustainably.

CCPR recognizes the benefits of providing quality youth athletic programs and the value of the many volunteer organizations that bring youth athletics to our community. CCPR supports these efforts by making county park spaces and athletic fields available for practices and games.

There is a finite amount of park space and athletic fields available to serve the local area and Clarke County must allocate these resources wisely to protect the condition of these facilities. In accordance with policies recommended by the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board and adopted by the Board of Supervisors, CCPR serves as stewards of these community resources and retains ownership and control of all county park property.

**<u>Priority Status</u>** To accomplish the above purposes, the following priority levels are assigned:

Priority 1: Clarke County Parks & Recreation programs

Priority 2: Clarke County Public Schools athletic programs

Priority 3: Volunteer-led organizations that meet the following criteria:

- Formally recognized by CCPR.
- Provides county-wide opportunities for all youth to participate in a sport or recreational activity.
- Does not use selective criteria for choosing players.
- Ensures all players get playing time.
- Makes playing opportunities as financially affordable as possible.
- At least 75% of youth participants are Clarke County residents.
- At least 75% of Board members are Clarke County residents.

Priority 4: Volunteer-led organizations that meet the following criteria:

- Provides sporting activities for youth on a more competitive level.
- Uses selection criteria and process that could exclude players based on ability and/or number of players/teams.
- At least 50% of youth participants are Clarke County residents.
- At least 50% of Board members are Clarke County residents.

Priority 5: All other organizations

<u>Field Use Requests</u> The Director of Parks and Recreation will set deadlines for each season's field use requests. Organizations interested in using CCPR fields shall submit field use requests within those set deadlines. CCPR aims to accommodate all requests from priority levels one and two before allocating the remaining field time to organizations in other priority levels.

For organizations of the same priority level, field time allocations will be based on:

- The number of years the organization has been serving the community
- The organization's compliance with park regulations
- The quality of the program(s) offered (quality programs means the Director of Parks &
  Recreation receives very few substantiated complaints, safe conditions exist for participants, no
  discrimination exists, coaches and volunteers are trained and qualified to perform their duties,
  facilities are cleaned up following practices and games, and the overall satisfaction by
  participants is high)
- Contributions the organization has made to facility improvements
- The number of residents the organization serves
- Any other similar criteria as determined by the Director of Parks & Recreation

Approval of a field use request is not an exclusive arrangement and members of the public may still use the fields when not scheduled by an organization. CCPR may schedule use of the fields by other organizations based on field availability. Field use for tournaments, clinics, or other special events require a separate application and are subject to field availability.

A completed Park Use Agreement is required annually for each outside organization using CCPR fields and facilities.

<u>Maintenance & Field Preparation</u> All fields and facilities remain under the exclusive ownership of Clarke County, regardless of financial or labor contributions made by outside organizations. As such, all county policies, building and zoning codes, and insurance requirements apply.

Clarke County staff and/or contracted vendors will provide general maintenance, mowing, and initial field layouts. The Park Use Agreement will specify the maintenance responsibilities of each party as well as a per-participant fee to be paid to the county. This fee will be based on:

- The estimated amount of maintenance work county staff must complete
- Estimated registration information
- The organization's priority level

No organizations are permitted to perform maintenance work on CCPR fields and facilities, nor hire a vendor do to the same, unless such work is specified in the Park Use Agreement or is otherwise authorized in writing by the Director of Parks & Recreation.

The county's regular maintenance consists of the following:

- Weekly mowing
- Filling holes or addressing other safety hazards
- Cleaning and restocking sanitary facilities
- Activities listed in the Park Use Agreement

Additional maintenance work can be performed on an hourly basis or through the use of an outside contractor. Hourly rates will be predetermined and set annually. Additional services will be completed only if the Clarke County Maintenance Department has time available to complete or oversee the work.

Basic services for baseball fields during the practice season will include twice weekly field dragging and repairing batter's boxes and pitching mounds. Preparation for games includes dragging the fields and drop lines. During the playing season, outfield foul lines will be painted every two weeks. Other basic costs include a temporary bathroom for the tee ball field, electric bill for the lights and concession stand, fence and gate repair, new bases every two to three years, putting up batting cages in the spring, and taking batting cages down in late fall. Modifications to these basic services can be made through adjustments in the Park Use Agreement.

Basic services for soccer during the season will include painting field lines at least once weekly, providing three temporary restrooms, maintaining goals and nets, and providing flags for the fields. Modifications to these basic services can be made through adjustments in the Park Use Agreement.

<u>Financial Contributions</u> Taxpayers and park users share the costs of operating and maintaining the park. Programs offered at the park generally cover the costs of instruction with additional revenue towards overall park operations. CCPR's goal is for youth sports to do the same while also keeping fees low enough to avoid creating barriers to entry.

Annually, the Director of Parks & Recreation will calculate the expected costs of providing basic field maintenance and preparation as outlined in the Park Use Agreement and develop a per-participant fee based on that cost estimate and both historic and anticipated participant numbers. For the organizations, the per-participant fee removes unknown financial costs for the basic services provided. Any other services requested will be charged the predetermined hourly rate or the actual cost, if an outside contractor is used.

Organizations in priority level four are expected to pay higher per-participant and field rental fees than organizations in priority level three, who are expected to pay higher fees than organizations in priority level two and so forth.

<u>Park Closures</u> County staff reserves the right to close the park in the interest of public safety, as conditions warrant. No organization may use any CCPR fields or facilities when the park is closed.

<u>Park Improvements.</u> All improvements made at the county park must follow the approval process outlined in Parks & Recreation Delegated Authority document.

<u>Insurance Requirements.</u> The organization shall procure and maintain, in force and at its sole expense, comprehensive general liability insurance during the entire term of the Park Use Agreement.

Coverage shall be provided by an insurer that is approved by the County and shall be adequate to protect against liability for damage claims arising through public use, product liability, or from accidents occurring in or around the premises. The minimum coverage amount shall be \$1,000,000.00 Combined

Single Limit, including a Broad Form endorsement. Said policy will name the County of Clarke and Clarke County Parks and Recreation, its officers, agents, and employees, as an additional co-insured. A copy of such insurance policy shall be furnished to the County upon execution of the Park Use Agreement.

The organization shall obtain a written obligation from the insurers to notify the County in writing at least thirty (30) days prior to cancellation or refusal to renew such policy.

<u>Organization Responsibilities</u> Organizations using Clarke County fields and facilities are responsible for providing a safe and nurturing environment for all participants and must:

- Provide appropriate background checks for all coaches and involved adults.
- Provide safety training, including concussion training, for all coaches and involved adults as appropriate.
- Ensure participants, parents, and spectators follow all park rules and regulations.
- Police the fields or facilities during use.
- Deposit all trash in containers provided by CCPR and return the premises to a neat and clean condition following each game or practice.
- Provide CCPR accurate information regarding selection criteria, participant numbers and residency, bylaws, organizational or board officers, and other information as requested.
- Pay appropriate usage fees.
- Make appropriate decisions regarding weather conditions by considering the safety of all
  participants and spectators and potential impacts to fields. If significant damage is done to any
  field as a result of an organization's decision, weather-related or not, the county reserves the
  right to hire a contractor to fix the damage at the expense of the organization.

Compliance: Each party subject to this policy is expected to comply with the policy in full and any additional requirements found in the applicable Park Use Agreement. Minor violations or questions about the policy can be handled verbally between the Director of Parks & Recreation and the organization using or requesting a field. More significant violations or repeated minor violations require the impacted party to provide written notice to the other party of the specifics of the alleged violation within 15 days of the violation occurring. The accused party shall respond within 15 days of receiving the written notice. The response can include evidence or arguments that show no violation occurred or acknowledgement that a violation did occur and a plan to ensure it doesn't happen again. Although written notices and response are required, it is suggested that both parties also meet to discuss alleged violations. If, after written notice and a written reply is received, and a meeting held between the two parties, and there is still not consensus between the two parties on whether a violation did occur, the matter can be forwarded to the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board who will make the final decision. Repeated offenses after formal notice has been provided can disqualify a group from future use of the fields.

A proposed Athletic Field Use Policy is attached for your review. We are seeking a recommendation on the policy so that it can be forwarded to the Board of Supervisors for possible adoption. A workgroup consisting of myself, Lisa Cooke, and Tracy Smith reviewed numerous policies from parks and recreation organizations across the country. The proposal attempts to tailor what we learned from other policies to fit the specific needs of Clarke County. Further background information on the proposed policy is below:

Why Do We Need a Policy: We continue to see pressure for space in Chet Hobert Park from youth athletic programs, outside organizations, and the needs of our park programs. While these areas continue to grow, the size of the park is not. Similar to our conversation about the previously approved Delegation of Authority document, we feel the need to have an established framework for the Director of Parks & Recreation to work under. We currently use Park Use Agreements but there is no policy or framework for the composition of these agreements. This document is structured in a manner to protect organizations that serve primarily Clarke County youth.

Who Does the Policy Impact: The policy applies to any group requesting use of athletic fields at Chet Hobert Park. The policy does not apply to individuals or families playing unorganized sports (ex. siblings kicking the soccer ball on the soccer fields when games aren't scheduled or a parent pitching baseball to their child on a baseball field). One major change is moving to a per participant fee instead of the County trying to calculate actual expenses occurred and billing organizations based on those expenses. The three major organizations impacted are CC Little League, CC Youth Basketball, and CC Soccer League. We presented the proposed policy to each organization. Baseball and Basketball did not have any opposition to the policy. Soccer has components of both Priorities 3 & 4 because they have an open enrollment section and a travel section which uses an ability-based selection criteria. Staff has told Soccer the open enrollment section would be considered Priority 3 while the travel section would be considered Priority 4. Soccer feels they meet the percentages outlined in Priority 3 and should be considered as one organization under Priority 3.

<u>What Does the Policy Do:</u> The policy attempts to create a framework for field use by creating priority status based on certain characteristics of the group requesting the field. The policy acknowledges the contributions Clarke County taxpayers make to the Parks & Recreation budget and prioritizes groups that serve primarily Clarke County youth over those that do not. The policy outlines the responsibilities of the

County for maintaining and preparing fields. The responsibilities for organizations using fields is also outlined and includes tasks aimed at providing a safe and nurturing environment for all participants. We feel the policy provides protections to Clarke County based organizations while making clear that fields remain under the control of the County.

How Would the Policy Be Implemented: Once a recommendation is made by the Advisory Board, the policy will be sent to the Board of Supervisors for consideration. If adopted by the Board of Supervisors, the Parks & Recreation Director would work to establish park use agreements that comply with the policy.

**When Would the Policy Be Effective:** Depending on when the Board of Supervisors approves the policy, we would work to phase in the policy as new youth sports seasons begin.
