Clarke County Public Schools Update

Dr. Michael Murphy, with Robina Rich Bouffault, appeared before the Supervisors to provide the monthly update for the Clarke County Public Schools. Highlights include:

- Boyce Elementary School was 1 of only 153 recipients in the Commonwealth of the Governors Award.
- A Clarke County student has been named as a candidate for a Jefferson Scholarship.
- The Clarke County Education Foundation hosted an award luncheon today.
- The Schools are working with the CCEF to secure funding from the Concerned Clarke Citizens. These funds will be used for additional staff development and training.
- The Schools are engaged in conversation with Lord Fairfax Community College regarding addition of fire fighting and emergency medical services courses.
- The Schools' budget will be critically impacted by proposed changes in the Composite Index and an organized campaign is being mounted to take to the General Assembly level. Chairwoman Robina Rich Bouffault asked the Supervisors to join the School Board in coordinating efforts with Fauquier County.
- Dr. Murphy explained that last year budget shortfalls were addressed through attrition, hiring freezes and salary freezes. He told the Board that teacher to student ratios were 1 to 16 in elementary and 1 to 20-21 in high school. Supervisor Dunning suggested cutting administrative staff noting that this would have less impact on pupil education.
- School Budget Public Hearing is scheduled for 7:00 pm on Wednesday, January 20, 2010.
- Supervisor Staelin asked Dr. Murphy to convey to the School Board that the Supervisors had sent a letter regarding the Composite Index to General Assembly representatives.
- High School Update:
 - o Dr. Murphy stated that the fireflow requirements should not impede the process.
 - o Gannet Fleming has requested that the Schools move forward with the 60% drawings.
 - o The Town has expressed interest in the Schools' fireflow proposal.
 - School Board Chair Robina Rich Bouffault put forth that Cost estimates have been received and confirm the figures to be presented during this evening's public hearing.
 - o Robina Rich Bouffault said that there were two options that can be followed to address fireflow. At a cost to the Schools of about \$200,000, one option is to allow the Town to build on their site what they need as long as the Schools' needs are met.
 - Supervisor Byrd added that this information was presented to Berryville Town Council last week however they had said that since they had not spoken with their engineers and could not act on the matter. Dr. Murphy informed Supervisor Byrd Jon Erickson had delivered all the documentation to the Town.

Chairman Hobert requested that appointment to Our Health be referred to the Personnel Committee for review and recommendation.

Citizens Comment Period

No citizens appeared to address the Supervisors.

VDOT

Jeff Lineberry, Resident Engineer, with Charlie Monroe, appeared before the Supervisors to provide the monthly update.

- Chairman Hobert expressed his disappointment with the closure of the Luray Residency and the elimination of Mr. Lineberry's position. He expressed appreciation for all Mr. Lineberry had done during his tenure on behalf of Clarke County.
- Preparing for additional forecast for later in the week.
- Performing tree trimming by the water plant.
- Performing grading of some non-hard surface roads.
- Receiving reports of weather-related soft spots on Route 605 that will be closely monitored.
- A four-way stop has been installed at the intersection of Browntown and Old Chapel Roads and new traffic pattern signs have been placed in all directions.
- Westwood Road / Mosby Street Update:
 - o A meeting was held on January 13 with design staff in Luray Residency.
 - o The design now proposed is a reduced scope design with a two-lane facility and a round-about on Business Route 7 to keep the cost down.
 - Even with the reduced design, the current funding is \$2.8MM and the current estimate is \$3.2MM in round numbers.
 - Based on the preliminary schedule, public hearing will be held in spring 2011 and right-of-way acquisition should begin fall 2011.
 - In the reconfigured VDOT, no one has yet been identified to lead the Westwood Road / Mosby Street project.
- Supervisor Weiss remarked that VDOT had done a good job of snow removal and was expeditious in the removal on secondary roads.
- Jeff Lineberry explained to Supervisor Byrd that the official next step for Neil Road closure would be to conduct a public hearing. He raised no object to Supervisor Byrd's suggestion to hold a more informal meeting with constituents.
- Jeff Lineberry informed Supervisor Byrd that no decision had been made regarding elimination of the passing zone in front of Annfield Road.
- Charlie Monroe informed Supervisor Byrd that the overhanging tree on Salem Road had been located and any problems would be addressed.

Special Event Permit: Blue Ridge Hunt Point-to-Point March 6, 2010

David Ash reviewed and recommended approval of the revised special event application for the Blue Ridge Hunt Point-to-Point scheduled for March 6, 2010. Supervisor Staelin moved to approve the application subject to receipt of comment from public agencies and resolution of any issues that might be raised.

Discussion Resolution In Support of Virginia Farm Bureau Position Regarding Proposed Legislation for the Chesapeake Bay Re-authorization Program

David Ash briefly reviewed the proposed resolution explaining that Vice Chairman Weiss had asked him to draft the resolution in conjunction with the Farm Bureau.

Vice Chairman Weiss stated that the Farm Bureau does support clean up of the Bay and the current language that leaves enforcement under the states without adverse economic affect on farmers. He remarked that the Farm Bureau is concerned by what they consider federal over reach in this proposed legislation. He opined that proposed legislation used flawed models.

Supervisor Dunning expressed concern for protection of water resources opining that not enough is done in this area.

Supervisor Staelin put forward that he did not have concerns about the resolution. He put forth that the state has been active in its water protection efforts. He commented that the proposed legislation would dictate many things to farmers including how long the grass is in the fields. Mr. Staelin noted that he had been told that the biggest problem for Spout Run, in Clarke County, was urban and residential run off. He expressed concern that standardize federal regulations could put agriculture in the county and the Chesapeake Bay area at a huge disadvantage. He opined that further study was needed.

Supervisor Byrd concurred with Supervisor Staelin.

Vice Chairman Weiss moved to pass the Resolution In Support of Virginia Farm Bureau Position Regarding Proposed Legislation for the Chesapeake Bay Re-authorization Program and send to appropriate legislative representatives.

Resolution in Support of Virginia Farm Bureau Position Regarding Proposed Legislation for the Chesapeake Bay Re-authorization Program 10-01R

WHEREAS, the Executive Order should not be codified because it will not become final until 2010; and

WHEREAS, the Executive Order is a precedent-setting document with questionable authority; and

- WHEREAS, while the TMDL development is court ordered, it should not be codified because it is underdevelopment with unknown outcomes and bypasses the authority of the Virginia Assembly. To date, a TMDL of this magnitude has never been attempted; and
- WHEREAS, the Milestones, as established through the executive order and memorandum of agreement between the Bay states and EPA, should not be codified because they are state specific and unknown beyond the current two-year cycle; and
- WHEREAS, citizen right of action or citizen suits cannot be codified because it will generate unnecessary legal action that are simply intended to stop a project or prolong the issuance of permits; and
- WHEREAS, the codification of this executive order would cause extreme hardship to the county's farmers.
- NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Clarke County Board of Supervisors supports the Virginia Farm Bureau position regarding the proposed legislation believing that reauthorization of Section 117 of the Clean Water Act is important to continued progress toward the restoration of the Chesapeake Bay; however, we oppose expansion of federal authority by codification of: President Obama's Chesapeake Bay Executive Order, deadlines for Chesapeake Bay Total Maximum Daily Load development and implementation, and authorization of citizen suits.

Resolution Establishing Energy & Resource Management Policies 10-02R

- WHEREAS, Clarke County has historically been proactive in recognizing the importance of natural resources and in protecting the environment; and
- WHEREAS, Clarke County's Comprehensive Plan Objective 4 encourages sustainable development by conserving energy and protecting our environment through sound planning to meet the needs of the present generation without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs; and
- WHEREAS, Clarke County is committed to fostering partnerships between and among government, schools, businesses and individual citizens with the goal of creating policies, practices and procedures that will promote conservation and actions to protect and improve our environment; and
- WHEREAS, on May 20, 2008 the Board of Supervisors appointed a team of business leaders, citizens, elected officials and staff to work with the County Administrator to develop goals and policies which address energy efficiency, conservation, and education and create a plan to reduce the County's overall environmental impact, saving tax dollars and improving services; and
- WHEREAS, the appointed Green Advisory Committee has worked diligently for the past 17 months to develop an Energy and Resource Management Plan; and
- WHEREAS, the attached Energy and Resource Management Policies are recommended for adoption in order to serve as guidelines for implementation of the Plan;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Clarke County Board of Supervisors hereby adopts the Energy and Resource Management Policies, and directs the County Administrator to disseminate these policies and directives to the responsible County officials for implementation.

Chairman Hobert thanked the Committee members and Alison Teetor for their work on this policy.

Chairman Hobert instructed David Ash to draft appropriate notes of thanks to the members of the Green Committee.

Alison Teetor requested time on the Supervisors agenda to review the proposed changes.

Update on Response to Neglect or Cruelty Complaints regarding Livestock

David Ash stated that a procedural glitch in the notification of Supervisors had been identified and addressed by providing the Sheriff's Office with current contact numbers and a district map. He advised that he was currently looking at locations where seized animals could be impounded. Supervisor Byrd added that impoundment facilities require tests and vaccinations that can take up to a week.

Mr. Ash informed the Supervisors that he had spoken with Mike Legge, Purchasing Director, and the State Veterinarian about developing a procurement list of veterinarians. He stated that by statute the first responder must be a Sheriff's Deputy or an Animal Control Officer.

Chairman Hobert asked Mr. Ash to pursue the appropriate procurements and present to the Board a written plan and procedure.

Circuit Courthouse Renovation Project

David Ash advised that the architect is ready to go to bid that would include changes requested by the judge, as well as those changes approved by the Supervisors for holding cells in the Circuit and the General District Courthouse. He indicated there was no objection from Sheriff Roper or Judge Wetzel in connection with the revised design. He asked the Supervisors to approve proceeding to solicit bids.

PH 10-01 FY10 School Capital Projects Budget Adjustment

Be it resolved that the FY10 School Capital Projects Budget be amended to increase expenditure by \$10,288,653 and to recognize revenue from debt proceeds of \$9,788,653 both for the purpose of constructing a new high school.

Tom Judge provided background on the School Board's request for additional funding in the amount of \$9,788,653 as estimated by Crabtree, Rohrbaugh and Associates for construction of the new high school.

Chairwoman Robina Rich Bouffault addressed the Supervisors explaining the add alternates considered by the School Board advising that the third add alternate would be considered for inclusion if the bids were favorable. She summarized the School Board's considerations, actions and accomplishments over the last two years. Her written comments are included in the meeting materials.

Vice Chairman Weiss asked that School Board for assurance that the high school core was adequate.

Robina Rich Bouffault responded that everything in the core was sized for 1,000; and the only thing lacking in the design were the eight additional classrooms in the add alternates.

At 6:45 p.m. Chairman Hobert opened the public comment portion of the public hearing.

<u>Tammy Lanham</u> – Millwood District: spoke in support of passage. She said that as a resident and an educator she had followed the proposed high school project for years. She opined that people in the community were pulling together for other projects but did not feel that education was given the same priority noting community support for the Barns of Rose Hill. She asked to know where each Supervisor stood individually on this issue.

Chairman Hobert responded that where each Supervisor stood would be evidenced by their vote on this matter.

Robin Betz - Berryville District: spoke in support of passage. She said that she had lived in Clarke County for a year having been drawn here by the school system for her six children. She commented as a realtor that there were over 100 houses on the market; but people would not relocate to Clarke County if the high school were inadequate.

There being no other present desiring to address the Supervisors on this matter Chairman Hobert closed the public comment portion of the public hearing at 6:47 pm.

Supervisor Staelin put forth that he had served as Board of Supervisors Chair for eight years and expressed his belief that the community had galvanized around the current site and a School Board that appeared to be spending funds wisely. He opined that differences were just part of political life. Supervisor Staelin responded to comments made by Ms. Lanham noting that the Board of Supervisors had only provided minimal funding for the Barns project.

Supervisor Byrd expressed her pleasure and relief that this day had finally arrived and regret that it could not have happened sooner.

Supervisor Weiss remarked that he was glad to be at this point with the high school project and to finally have something the upon which the Supervisor could vote. He opined that the project appeared to have come together over the last few years and said that he was impressed by the way the School Board had gone about finding something that would work in the County. He, too, remarked on comments regarding the Supervisors' commitment noting that taxes had been raised significantly over the years with the majority of those increases going to support the high school project.

Chairman Hobert remarked that the high school would be built and he anticipated its soon coming.

7 DETAILS OF PLAT REQUIREMENTS

7-C RECORD PLAT

7-C In addition to the requirements of the Preliminary Plat, the Record Plat shall include the following: 7-C-3-(d) Water and sewage disposal systems:

- 1. If lots less than 40 acres in size are to be served by an individual onsite water well, the well site for each lot shall show the distance and bearing to one corner of the well from two property corners, and the Record Plat shall indicate Health Department approval of such sites, pursuant to Section 7-C-3-(1)-(7) herein.
- 2. If lots less than 40 acres in size are to be served by an individual onsite subsurface septic systems, the primary and reserve drainfield areas for each lot so served shall show the distance and bearing to one corner of the drainfield area from two property corners, and the Record Plat shall indicate Health Department approval of such areas, pursuant to Section 7-C-3-(1)-(7) herein.
- 3. The capacity of new drainfield areas shall be shown for each parcel by stating by the maximum number of:
 - a. gallons of effluent per day (daily design flow);
 - b. bedrooms; and
 - c. full-time occupants
- 4. If any lot contains an existing dwelling, the plat shall indicate one of the following:
 - a. Location of an existing approved standard subsurface septic system as shown by the County Health Department records or and 100% reserve drain field area and for lots under 20 acres in size, an approved standard subsurface septic system as shown by County Health Department records and 100% reserve drain field area, or
 - b. Location of a new primary and a 100% reserve drain field area, as shown in a permit, approved by the Health Department, pursuant to Section 7-C-3-(I)-(7) herein. Such location shall be shown by distance and bearing to one corner of the primary drain field and one corner of the reserve drain field from two property corners.
- 5. If any lot contains an existing dwelling, evidence shall be submitted with the proposed record plat showing that any existing septic tank has been installed or pumped within the past five years.

10 SPECIAL REGULATIONS 10-D BOUNDARY LINE ADJUSTMENTS

10-D-5 Any existing structure (or structures) and existing or proposed well(s) and on-site sewage disposal system(s) shall be shown on a Boundary Line Adjustment survey plat. Structures shall be identified as to their use and show the physical address of each structure where applicable. All wells and on-site sewage disposal systems shall be verified by the Clarke County Health Department as to location, capacity, type and use and be noted accordingly on such survey plat.

PH 10-03 CC 10-01 Chapter 57 Special Events:

The Clarke County Board of Supervisors will consider the amendment of Chapter 57 Special Events so to revise:

- § 57-2. Definition of the term "Special Events";
- § 57.4. Application for permit: so as to add the requirement to send written notice and remove the
 requirement to send the full application by certified mail; change from calendar to working days.
- § 57.6. Action on applications: so as to remove the requirement of the County Administrator and/or Board to provide notice to applicant and adjacent property owners via certified mail; change from calendar to working days where applicable.

David Ash reviewed the proposed changes to Chapter 57 Special Events.

At 7:02 p.m. Chairman Hobert opened the public comment portion of the public hearing. Being no persons present wishing to address the matter the public comment portion of the public hearing was closed.

Following discussion, by consensus, the Supervisor deferred action on the proposed change from calendar versus working days requesting that staff provide a recommendation.

Supervisor Staelin moved to approve the amendment to Chapter 57 shown on pages 174 through 178 of the meeting packet except those changes striking calendar and inserting working and carry over that section on days and ask staff to provide a recommendation at the February meeting.

§ 57-2. Definitions. Special Event –

- Any public assembly, attraction, ceremony, event, festival, gathering, circus, carnival, or show at which rides, games, competitions, attractions, music, dance, or other performing arts are engaged in by participants or provided as entertainment by professional or amateur performers or by prerecorded means,
 - which involves the raising, charging, donating or re-couping of funds,
 - 2) which is held at any place other than (1) on property owned by the United States of America, the Commonwealth of Virginia, or the County of Clarke, or (2) in a permanent enclosed structure, to which the public is invited or admitted,

- 3) to which the public is invited or admitted,
- 4) which does not occur in the Town of Berryville, the Berryville Annexation Area, or the Town of Boyce, and
- 5) which occurs on a parcel of land of six or more acres (a parcel of land of six or more acres may include adjoining parcels with the same owner that have a total area of six or more acres).
- b) Such an assembly shall not include demonstrations, parades, rallies, marches, or picketing activities.

§ 57.4. Application for permit.
[Amended 09-02-17]

- a) Written application for a Special Event permit shall be made to the Board of Supervisors or its designee. Such application shall contain such information and be on such forms as the Board of Supervisors, or its designee, may from time to time require. No application shall be submitted, or accepted, unless presented on the required forms along with all additional required plans, documents, approvals, fees, and other material required by this ordinance.
- b) An application for a Small Special Event shall be submitted at least 30 calendar days before the date of the Event to allow for review of the application.
 - An application for a Medium or Large Special event shall be submitted at least 120 calendar days before the date of the Event in order to allow for review of the application. However, such an application may be submitted at least 75 calendar days before the date of the Event if the application contains written approval of all requirements as specified in Section 57.7.
- c) Multiple applications for Special Event permits may be submitted together for a single parcel of property for events to be held during a calendar year.
- d) No application for a Special Event may be filed more than one year before an Event is to be held or before the first Event Day for applications for multiple Special Event permits, except for an application for a Special Event that is substantially the same as a Special Event that been previously approved.

e) The applicant shall:

- a. Send a copy of the application to all adjacent property owners by certified mail on the same date as the application is filed with the Administrator. The address for such owners shall be that found in the records of the Commissioner of the Revenue or equivalent source for properties not located in Clarke County.
- b. Include with the application sent to adjacent property owners

a written notice that these owners may contact the Administrator with any comments within 15 calendar days of the date of the mailing of the notice.

f)-*e*) The application shall include:

- 1)A description of the event and the type and nature of the performances, shows, and/or other activities.
- 2)A schedule of the dates and times of specific performances, shows, and/or other activities.
- 3)A description, plan, and/or documentation of how the applicant will comply with each of the Special Event requirements set forth in §57. 7.
- 4)A signed statement from the owner of the property on which the event is to be held to confirm that the owner has given permission for the specific Special Event to be held.
- 5) A list of all adjacent property owners, with addresses.
- 6)Written proof of the mailing of the certified notices A copy of the written notice sent to adjoining property owners summarizing the Special Event[s] including date[s] and time[s] and a statement that adjoining property these owners may contact the applicant or County Administrator with any comments and/or to review application within 15 calendar days of the date of the mailing of the notice. The address for such owners shall be that found in the records of the Commissioner of the Revenue or equivalent source for properties not located in Clarke County. as described in section 57.4.f.1., above. Written notice shall be sent on the same date as the application is filed with the Administrator.
- 7) For Medium or Large Special Events, a scaled drawing depicting the following:
 - a) The areas for performances or activities and for grandstands or seats, showing the location of all aisles for pedestrian travel and other crowd-control measures.
 - b) All physical facilities existing or to be constructed on the premises, including, but not limited to, fences, ticket booths, grandstands, and stages.
 - c) The location, capacity, and nature of all temporary lighting, sound, and public address facilities.

- d) The location, capacity, and nature of all temporary water, toilet, and all other public health-related facilities.
- e) Vehicle ingress, egress, and parking plan, to include emergency vehicle access.

§ 57.6. Action on applications. [Amended 09-02-17]

- a) Small Special Event. Upon receipt of a complete Small Special Event permit application, the Administrator, or his designee, shall review the application and shall, within 30 calendar days, upon finding that the Special Event would comply with the provisions of this ordinance, approve the permit subject to such reasonable terms and conditions established by the Administrator;
 - 1) Provided, however, if the applicant requests additional public services or the Administrator has cause to believe that additional public services would be necessary:
 - The Administrator shall forward the application to the public agency or agencies, which would provide the additional services for comment and/or agency approval of the additional services.
 - The public agency shall respond with comments and/or agency approval within 15 calendar days. Failure to respond within 15 calendar days shall be deemed approval by the agency.
 - The Administrator shall act upon the permit within 10 calendar days of receipt of the comments and/or agency approval.
 - The Administrator shall consider the application and agency comments and shall approve the application, incorporating such reasonable terms and conditions as may be established by the Administrator or deny the application.
 - If the Administrator approves multiple events and the conditions established are not followed, the Administrator may reconsider his/her approval action for any events that have not occurred.
 - If the Administrator approves multiple events and the conditions established are determined by the Administrator to be ineffective in protecting the public health, welfare, or safety, the Administrator may modify such conditions. Such modifications shall be provided to the applicant in writing at least 5 calendar days before the next event.
 - The Administrator shall send notice of his action to all adjacent property owners by certified mail within 5 calendar days after the decision being rendered.
 - 3) The Administrator may approve any number of Special Events for

multiple years at the same location.

- b) <u>Medium or Large Special Event</u>. Upon receipt of a complete Medium or Large Special Event permit application,
 - The County Administrator shall forward the completed application to the:
 - Clarke County Building Official,
 - Clarke County Sheriff,
 - Chief of the Fire and Rescue Company serving the location, and
 - Local offices of the Virginia Departments of Health, State Police, and Transportation for comment and/or agency approval. The public agency shall respond with comments and/or agency approval within 45 calendar days. Failure to respond within 45 calendar days shall be deemed approval by the agency.
 - The Administrator shall:
 - Forward the application and any agency comments and/or agency approvals to the Board, and
 - Place the application on the agenda of the first regular meeting of the Board that occurs after 60 days after the submittal of the application. At this meeting:
 - 1) For Medium Special Events, the Board shall consider the application and agency comments and shall approve the application, incorporating such reasonable terms and conditions as may be established, deny the application, or set a public hearing on the application for the next regular meeting of the Board. After a public hearing at the next regular meeting, the Board shall approve the application, incorporating such reasonable terms and conditions as may be established or deny the application.
 - 2) For Large Special Events, the Board shall set a public hearing on the application for the next regular meeting of the Board. After a public hearing at the next regular meeting, the Board shall approve the application, incorporating such reasonable terms and conditions as may be established or deny the application.
 - 3) The Board shall send notice of its action to the applicant and all adjacent property owners by certified mail within 10 calendar days after the decision being rendered.
 - 4) The applicant or any adjacent property owner may appeal in writing to the Circuit Court an action of the Board to

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approve or deny an application. Such appeal shall be filed within 30 calendar days of the date of the Board's decision.

5) The Board may approve any number of Special Events for multiple years at the same location.
