Dear Mr. Staelin et al.:

Thank you for allowing me to speak at the October 16 Clarke County Board of Supervisors Meeting regarding the study of a turning lane near the intersection of Route 340 and Senseny Road. Although I'd still like to see less expensive, less intrusive alternatives studied, I do appreciate that the Board requested that VDOT investigate using the property on the west side of Route 340 (the side of the road with no bordering houses) if a turning lane is the option pursued.

Property owners on the east side of Route 340 are alarmed. An east side expansion threatens the safety of people. Re-routing speeding traffic closer to the residents will endanger us, disturb our quality of life and decrease our property values. Therefore, even if a west side expansion is more expensive, it should be chosen rather than an east side expansion which would impact people dangerously and negatively.

Attached is a signed petition reflecting this serious concern and requesting that your constituents' well-being is protected.

Please continue to keep us abreast of any new information and/or actions regarding this matter.

1) Call to Order

Chairman Hobert called the afternoon session to order at 1:03 p.m.

2) Adoption of Agenda

By consensus, the Board approved the agenda as presented.

3) VDOT

Ed Carter, Assistant Residency Administrator, appeared before the Board to provide the monthly update.

Maintenance – October:

- Second round mowing on secondary's is scheduled to be complete by month's end, weather permitting;
- Performed brush cutting on Rt. 636;
- Addressed drainage issue on Rt. 606 (Larry Rogers);
- Conducted grading operations on routes 600,622 and 625;
- Removed tree hazards on routes 633, 644, 652 and 656;
- Repaired potholes on various secondary routes.

Maintenance – November:

- Continue hazardous tree removal on various routes;
- Replace pipe on Rt. 605;
- Conduct ditching operations on northeast end of County;
- Conduct shoulder and pothole repairs on various routes throughout the County.

Projects

- Route 636, Mosby Road: Contractor is still projecting completion before bad weather.
 Paving subcontractor is supposed to be back on site next week to complete all paving.
- Route 1014, Paige St. Town of Berryville: Status unchanged.
- Lewisville Road speed limit: Traffic engineering has concluded comments and recommended signage has been installed except for one which is on order. A resolution from the Supervisors is required to conduct a full-blown study. Traffic engineering's opinion is that the outcome of a full study could go either way. Highlights of the discussion include:
 - Supervisor Byrd:
 - Curves in the road coming from West Virginia cause traffic to slow; however, speeds increase where the road straightens.
 - Constituents have mentioned circulating a petition.
 - Constituents are prepared to wait to see if the recommended signage is effective.
 - o Ed Carter:
 - Responding to Supervisor McKay stated that signs depicting slow moving equipment or horses had not been recommended but could be considered.

- A speed count is used to determine average speed of the 85 percentile; and if 85% of vehicles are traveling at the speed limit or lower, a reduction would not warranted. The study also considers:
 - Road geometrics;
 - Number of entrances and intersections:
 - Traffic volume:
 - Number Accidents
- VDOT will provide the written report, as well as any accident reports to the County Administrator.

Following discussion, by consensus, the Supervisors deferred review of the matter to the November Work Session.

Turning Lanes Route 657/340: Survey complete and ready to begin preliminary engineering. Until preliminary engineering is complete, cannot make definitive statements other than moving the utilities poles in that location would be costly. He advised that a public hearing, after the completed, approved design, is not necessary unless the Board of Supervisors desires one.

Mr. Carter confirmed that this project is included in the SSYP and expressed is belief that VDOT had approximately 60% of the funding. He stated that if the plan was developed and approved the likelihood of completion was 100%.

Wendy Kedzierski, Lord Fairfax Highway, Berryville, VA 22611, appeared before the Supervisors and read the following letter:

October 16, 2012

Clarke County Board of Supervisors 101 Chalmers Court Berryville, VA 22611

Dear Clarke County Board of Supervisors:

I am writing to express my concern over a proposal for a turning lane at the intersection of Lord Fairfax Highway and Senseny Road.

While I agree that this is a dangerous intersection and have personally witnessed several accidents there, I believe that a turning lane on the side of the road where houses are present will only create a worse hazard as cars will no longer feel compelled to slow down. Instead, they will go even faster as they feel free to

speed past turning traffic - speeding in a lane that is closer to the houses located there, including mine and others with children.

The issue here is speed and inattentive driving— not volume of traffic. It seems that a safer, less expensive, and more practical solution would be a blinking light at this intersection and reducing the speed to 40 mph: blinking yellow for Lord Fairfax Highway traffic and red for Senseny Road traffic.

Putting a turning lane on the residential side of this road seems like a dangerous and expensive attempt to solve this problem. More problems would surface: speeding traffic closer to residences and traffic speeding into Berryville town limits.

My husband requested a recent survey of the road but was unable to obtain one. According to his subsequent measurements, the road already is not centered within VDOT's 110-foot wide right-of-way. It is closer to the residences than to the adjacent farm property/cornfields. Using the telephone poles as a guide, at one point, the center of the road is approximately 70 feet from the farm property and 27 feet from our neighbor's property.

When I spoke unofficially to a VDOT surveyor, he indicated that if a turning lane is constructed, the road would likely come 22 feet closer to the residences.

When my husband spoke to VDOT, he was informed that no warrants have been done on this project. It is our understanding that there has been no study to justify the expense of a turning lane and no study to show that this solution would not create other problems. Nor has there been a study on less expensive and less intrusive alternative solutions and the impact that these possible solutions may have on the residents of the area.

A turning lane seems like an expensive, dangerous proposal. The amount of work that it would take to build out this road - including removing a rock ledge in front of my house, has to be enormously expensive. And I'd like to reiterate that a turning lane would put speeding traffic closer to the residents' homes. A blinking yellow light with a reduced speed limit in the area seems like a safer, more cost-effective solution.

Highlights of the discussion include:

Ed Carter, VDOT:

- Law enforcement accident reports are the only studies into cause that VDOT can access. VDOT is willing to research accident reports to see if there is a pattern that could be addressed.
- VDOT has reduced the speed to 45 mph and added flashing yellow lights.
- VDOT can do nothing that would prevent driver inattention or speeding.
- VDOT has determined that the safest alternative is to provide a lane so vehicles can continue through and provide a turn lane to accommodate vehicles making a turn.
- VDOT will research whether the utility poles are in the right of way.
- VDOT explained that on primary roads, based on speed limits and traffic volume, a "clear zone" allowing for a certain amount of space for a vehicle to go off the road and not hit something like a utility pole is required.
- VDOT proposes a center left turn lane heading north and a right turn lane headed south on Route 340 into Senseny Road.
- In the preliminary engineering, VDOT would lay out a plan based on survey results that will spot poles, existing right of ways lines and pavements. Then using those results, VDOT will fit the proposed road based on the requirement using the most economical construction.
- Alternates will be examined during the preliminary engineering phase but the plan will be what the design engineer terms to be the most economical construction to achieve the goal.
- Property disturbance is considered in the preliminary engineering phase.

Supervisor Staelin:

- Utility poles are located on both sides of the road.
- From his measurements, poles are basically 40 feet from the white line on the side of the road.
- There appears to be plenty of room on the west side of the road for lane construction.
- Would like to keep the new lane as far from the residences as possible.
- Would like to keep the 45 mph following lane construction.
- Addition of a right turn lane going south was not previously mentioned. Mr.
 Carter advised that VDOT sees this as a safety improvement; however, the
 warrants will be re-examined during the preliminary engineering phase.

Supervisor Byrd:

 Asked VDOT if something could be done to improve the safety of this intersection by slowing speeds coming out of Berryville.

- Asked the cost of moving a utility pole. Ed Carter responded that there are many variables but can go as high as \$25,000.
- The number of right-hand turns may be lessened once Mosby Boulevard is complete.

Chairman Hobert:

- This is a major intersection in the community and it needs to be safe.
- Understands concerns and the need to be sensitive but the plan has been in place for a long time.
- Supervisor McKay:
 - This intersection is one of the highest for accidents in the County and needs to be made safe.

Following discussion, Supervisor Staelin moved to proceed with the preliminary engineering and VDOT to examine ways to cost effectively keeps things as far west as possible so as to minimize the impact on any neighbors to the east. The motion carried by the following vote:

- Supervisor Byrd:
 - Expressed appreciation for moving the median strip by Chester's Store.
- Supervisor McKay:
 - Speed Issues East end of Annfield Road with intersection of Route 340: He has requested speed enforcement from Sheriff Roper.

John Staelin left the meeting at 1:40 pm

4) Clarke County Public Schools Update

Rick Catlett, Assistant Superintendent, and Randy Trenary, Director of Operations, appeared before the Supervisors to provide the monthly School update. Highlights include:

Rick Catlett:

- Proposed that the Board develop a list of topics it would like the Schools to address.
 - Supervisor Byrd requested reports on the renovation project.
 - Chairman Hobert stated that school renovations were an area of interest and requested an update at the November regular meeting addressing project stage, direction and how the project was proceeding.
 - Supervisor McKay requested academic progress reports. He suggested that
 the Schools examine customer satisfaction to determine if students are being
 given what they need to excel.

Rick Catlett responded:

- ✓ The Virginia Department of Education and the US Department of Education are now asking questions targeted toward this area.
- ✓ While schools collect a great deal of data, there is debate about whether it
 is useful or meaningful.
- ✓ One recently added data point that does provide meaningful data is the reporting of the number of students participating in the total program including on time graduation. A recent report indicated 99% of students graduated one time for the second consecutive year
- ✓ Clarke children are coming to school, staying in school, and test score data is being captured. Testing is conducted in all grades, as well as at the end of course providing considerably more useful information.
- ✓ The Schools believe the testing reflects its goals, as well as its desire to address the needs of all children by providing dedicated resources. Career and Technical programs are offered including a nursing program. Agriculture education is now offered beginning in the 8th grade.
- Randy Trenary, Director of Operations:
 - Round About:
 - The first two weeks were difficult while everyone learned the new pattern.
 - It is making morning and evening traffic move more smoothly at D.G. Cooley.
 - It slows traffic down.
 - Per the Chief of Police, it is doing what it was designed to do.
 - School Lunch:
 - Major changes in federal regulations to the school lunch program.
 - To clear up a statement made last month by Dr. Murphy, under the new federal regulations, protein can still be served for breakfast; however, new

limits have been established on the amount of protein that can be served at breakfast.

- A meeting to discuss the current year lunch regulations is set for tomorrow.
- Because of what is happening with the new lunch regulations, the Schools are contemplating holding off changes to the breakfast program.
- Lunch counts are down.
- Al a carte items are up.
- In response to Supervisor Byrd's query, at the new high school there are three lunch shifts giving students five to six more minutes over previous years. To speed up the process, the addition of a third "pay line" is being considered.

Chairman Hobert expressed the Board's appreciation to Mr. Catlett and Mr. Trenary for their updates. He further commented that the Schools were the Supervisors most significant partner.

Chairman Hobert asked Board members to provide him with their list of interests specific to the Schools for future presentation.

5) Northern Shenandoah Valley Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan Update

Jill Keihn, NSVRC, provided a PowerPoint presentation of the Northern Shenandoah Valley Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan. 2012 Plan Update. Highlights include:

Chairman Hobert called for comment on how Board of Supervisors should task limited staff to implement the proposed plan.

Jill Keihn responded that the NSVRC continues to work closely with jurisdictions, offering assistance in grant writing and locating funding sources. She also pointed out that the regional plan requests annual review.

David Ash provided a general overview of emergency services. He further explained that a disaster is not necessarily an emergency or an emergency a disaster. He stated that the regional plan was secondary to the County's Emergency Operations Plan. He recommended review of the regional plan after it received FEMA approval. Mr. Ash noted that the regional goals listed were long-term.

Chairman Hobert noted that there were are large number of hazards listed in the plan each of which would take considerable time to address. He remarked that the risks identified by this larger, external group must be prioritized and addressed as best as possible. He asked for guidance from David Ash and requested that staff review the plan over the next sixty days to determine how the county should proceed.

Biosolids Application

In response to recent concerns, Alison Teetor, with Jill Keihn, brought the matter of biosolids application before the Board for direction. Highlights include:

- Alison Teetor and Vice Chairman Weiss have discussed the possibility of conducting public meetings.
- Jill Keihn will be addressing the matter this evening with the Warren County Board of Supervisors, also dealing with public contention over the biosolids program.
- Jill Keihn will be proposing to the Warren County Supervisors an informational meeting with DEQ. Subject to the approval of Martha Shickle, NSVRC Director, Ms. Keihn is prepared to provide the same proposal to Clarke.

Chairman Hobert stated he was aware that there was community interest. He instructed Alison Teetor, in conjunction with Vice Chairman Weiss, to develop a proposal for discussion at a future work session.

6) Citizens Comment Period

Wendy Kedzierski, Lord Fairfax Highway, Berryville, addressed the Board during the VDOT update.

Architectural Historian

PURSUANT TO THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this <u>16th</u> day of <u>October</u> of 2012, by and between the Board of Supervisors (hereinafter "Board"), and Maral Kalbian, party of the second part (hereinafter "Contractor"); and in consideration of the benefits to be accrued to the parties hereunder, said parties hereto agree as follows:

- I. **WORK:** Contractor agrees that the following projects and duties shall be the focus of work endeavor and services provided pursuant to this Agreement:
 - A. Direct Services to the County of Clarke. Under the direction of the Director of Planning:
 - 1. Provide technical advice, support, and training to the Historic Preservation Commission in coordination with the application for Certificate of Appropriateness.
 - 2. Assist in the preparation of grant application(s), including those for Certified Local Government projects.
 - 3. Attend Historic Preservation Commission meetings.
 - 4. Provide information and assistance regarding:
 - a) Ordinance enforcement with respect to historic preservation matters.
 - b) Conservation easement applications.
 - 5. Conduct work specified by the Certified Local Government Grant associated with the Chapel Rural Historic District Phase III project.
 - 6. Conduct work specified by the Certified Local Government Grant associated with the Josephine City Preliminary Information form and architectural survey in conjunction with National Register listing.
 - B. Services to the General Public of Clarke County to be compensated by the County of Clarke.

 Under the direction of the Director of Planning, provide information and assistance to members of the general public regarding:
 - 1. National Register nominations, and
 - 2. Architectural modifications to historic structures.
 - C. Tax Credits. Matters related to available local, federal, and state tax incentives shall be referred by the Contractor to the Division of Historic Resources of the Commonwealth of Virginia, or the Clarke County Planning Department, unless otherwise directed by the Director of Planning.

II. LIMITATIONS ON WORK

A. *Direct Services to the County of Clarke.* For performance of the work described in Section A 1, 2, and 4 above the following limitations shall apply:

B. Services to the General Public. For performance of the work described in Section I, item B, above, for a specific property, where the advice or support takes less than 30 minutes, the Contractor may provide the services and report the assistance provided to the County Planning Director through the monthly billing, provided that the Contractor monitors expenditures against the budget in the interim to ensure compliance with the contract limit. For such work which is estimated to require more than 30 minutes, the Contractor shall obtain the written approval of the County Planning Director after providing him or her, in a form suitable to him or her, a brief written description of the objectives of the work to be performed and the estimated time anticipated to be expended. Such proposed work shall be reviewed by the Planning Director for approval. If approved, it shall specify any limitations or required contribution or participation from the property owner. For additional assistance, the Contractor shall provide the property owner a copy of the list of consultants prepared by the Virginia Department of Historic Resources. The Planning Director shall not authorize the Contractor to allocate more than eight hours to assist a property owner without the concurrent approval of the County Administrator.

III.COMPENSATION:

For performance of the work described in Section A (1-4) and Section B, above, the Contractor shall be compensated by the Board at the rate of one hundred ten dollars (\$110.00) per hour plus reimbursement for pre- approved expenses at cost, not to exceed a total of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) in the applicable fiscal year. The billable hours shall only be for productive hours specific to work for the Board. For performance of the work described in Section A (5-6) the Contractor shall be paid a lump sum of \$23,000, subject to appropriation by the Board.

- IV. **MANNER OF PAYMENT:** Contractor shall submit statements itemizing hours spent in performance of work on a monthly basis to the Planning Director. Approved payment shall be made to Contractor within 45 days of receipt of statement.
- V. **DURATION:** This Agreement shall remain in full force and affect through June 30, 2013.
- VI. **CONTRACTOR STATUS:** The parties hereto intend that the relation between them created by this Agreement is that of employer—independent contractor. Contractor is not an employee of the County of Clarke nor of the Board and is not entitled to the benefits provided by the County to its

employees, including but not limited to worker's compensation, unemployment insurance, group health insurance, V.S.R.S. or F.I.C.A. contributions. Contractor will be solely and entirely responsible for her acts during the performance of this Agreement.

- VII. **OWNERSHIP RIGHTS:** Clarke County shall retain ownership rights to any materials or work produced by Contractor pursuant to this Agreement and may use said material or work products as the County may see fit. This shall not affect Contractor's right also to use said material or work products as she may wish. The Contractor may not convey, sell, or assign rights to said material without the approval of the Supervisors.
- VIII. **RIGHT OF INSPECTION:** The work contemplated herein must meet the approval of the Board's designated agent and shall be subject to such agent's general right of inspection to secure the satisfactory completion thereof. Contractor agrees to comply with all federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations applicable to Contractor and to operations covered by this Agreement or accruing out of the performance of such operations.
- IX. **IDEMNIFICATION:** Contractor shall indemnify the Board and/or the County of Clarke against all liability and loss in connection with, and shall assume full responsibility for, payment of all federal, state and local taxes or contributions imposed or required under social security and income tax laws.
- X. **ASSIGNMENT:** The Contractor shall not assign This Agreement without the express written consent of the Board.
- XI. **TERMINATION:** The County may terminate this Agreement at any time at its discretion.
- XII. **ADDITIONAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS:** This contract is issued pursuant to RFP #12-0807 and its terms and conditions, including insurance requirements and annual renewal limitations, are incorporated herein by reference.

Easement Donation

The Clarke County Easement Authority has approved the following easements for donation. The Authority requests the Board of Supervisors to authorize the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors to execute deeds, easements, and other documents necessary to the transactions, subject to the property owners and lenders signing the Deed prior to the Chair.

James Turner - James Turner has applied to the easement authority for approval of three easement donations. Mr. Turner owns 3 parcels; two are listed under the corporation MFR Company, L.C. and the other he co-owns with his brother John Turner.

The property is south of Route 50 near the Warren County line above Shenandoah Farms. The 3 parcels are currently vacant woodland and have a total of 11 DURs. The applicant wishes to retain 1 DUR on each parcel retiring a total of 8 DURs. The parcels are zoned FOC and are in land use. All 3 parcels meet 3 of the 4 criteria. All are larger than 40 acres, all scored over 35, and all will retire at least 1 DUR, non are adjacent to an existing easement. At their regular meeting held October 17th, 2012, on motion of Mr. Engel, seconded by Ms. Thomas, the Authority unanimously gave preliminary approval for the donation.

Modification of Gift of Deed of Easement - Powhatan School

A Deed of Easement was recorded on property gifted to Powhatan School in 2011. Two perennial streams, Roseville Run and Spout Run, separate the main school property from the eased property. The original Deed of Easement specified that a vehicular bridge could be located at the southeastern part of the property and that two existing bridges could only be used as foot bridges. The School requested that one of the foot bridges be permitted for use for vehicular access. The main reason for the request is that the school needs access for tractors and other such equipment in order to construct the permitted trails so that the students have more access to the eased property. In addition the school expressed concerns regarding safety and the ability to extract students or other persons who might be injured on the property.

One of the two pedestrian bridges had previously been used for vehicles so that the construction impact would be minimal. Any conversion of the bridge would require an amendment to the Deed of Easement. The Easement Authority conducted a site visit and approved the amendment allowing for the bridge conversion at their July 2012 meeting. The Powhatan School board also approved the proposed amendment. The draft amendment was prepared by Mr. Robert Mitchell (attached). As the County is a signatory on the Deed of Easement, the Board of Supervisors must also approve and authorize signature of the amendment.

MODIFICATION OF DEED OF GIFT OF EASEMENT

THIS MODIFICATION OF DEED OF GIFT OF EASEMENT, dated the _____ day of _____, 2012, is by and between POWHATAN SCHOOL, party of the first part, a Virginia nonstock corporation ("Powhatan School"), and the COUNTY OF CLARKE, VIRGINIA ("County"), and the CLARKE COUNTY CONSERVATION EASEMENT AUTHORITY ("Authority"), parties of the second part.

WHEREAS, by Deed of Gift of Easement dated June 3, 2011, and recorded in the Office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court of Clarke County, Virginia in Deed Book 535 at Page 817, Agnes C. Brengle, Constance B. Crocker, and Isabelle C. Osborne ("Brengle, Crocker, and Osborne") conveyed a Conservation Easement ("Easement") to the County and the Authority on a parcel containing 46.8384 acres in Clarke County, Virginia, as described therein ("the Property"); and

WHEREAS, by Deed of Gift and Deed of Boundary Line Adjustment and Merger dated June 2, 2011, and recorded in the aforesaid Clerk's Office in Deed Book 535 at Page 842, Brengle, Crocker, and Osborne conveyed the Property to Powhatan School, subject to the Easement; and

WHEREAS, Powhatan School, the County, and the Authority desire to modify Paragraph 6 of Section II of the Easement regarding provisions for a riparian buffer; and

WHEREAS, the County and the Authority find the modification to be consistent with the conservation and open-space purposes of the Easement.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereby modify and replace Paragraph 6 of Section II of the Easement to provide as follows:

6. RIPARIAN BUFFER. To protect water quality, a 100-foot buffer strip shall be maintained in forest or be permitted to revegetate naturally along each edge of the Roseville Run and the west edge of Spout Run, as measured from the top of the bank. (Where there is less than 100 feet between the east edge of Roseville Run and the east boundary of the Property, the entire distance from the east edge of Roseville Run and the east boundary of the Property shall be a buffer strip.) Within this buffer strip there shall be (a) no buildings or other substantial structures constructed; (b) no storage of compost, manure, fertilizers, chemicals, machinery, or equipment; (c) no removal of trees except removal of invasive species or removal of dead, diseased, or dying trees or trees posing an imminent human health or safety hazard; and (d) no cultivation or other earth-disturbing activity, except as may be reasonably necessary for (i) either wetland or stream bank restoration or erosion control, pursuant to a government permit, (ii) fencing along or within the buffer area; (iii) construction and maintenance of stream crossings that do not obstruct (iv) creation and maintenance of foot or horse trails with water flow; unimproved surfaces; and (v) dam construction to create ponds. Limited mowing to control non-native species or protect trees and other plants planted in forested buffers is permitted. Livestock shall be excluded from the riparian buffer strip, except for one stream access for watering. Stream access shall be constructed in accordance with current Department of Conservation and Recreation Agricultural Best Management Practices for a "hardened crossing" for the purpose of providing a stabilized area for access to the stream for livestock watering. Notwithstanding the foregoing, and except as provided above for livestock access, (i) stream crossings of Roseville Run shall be limited to two crossings in the location of the existing foot bridges across Roseville Run; one bridge shall remain as a foot bridge, and the other may be improved for access of tractors or other equipment as needed for maintenance, construction, and stream restoration, with bridge materials consisting of metal I-beam supports with wood planks for the travel surface and wood hand rails, (ii) access paths to the bridges across Roseville Run shall remain in their present location, or, if changed, shall be approximately perpendicular to Roseville Run, shall not exceed twelve (12) feet in width, and shall remain pervious (unpaved), and (iii) a stream crossing for Spout Run shall be limited to one bridge and one access path over the riparian buffer for Spout Run, which shall be in the location of the existing 30 foot private right of way shown on the boundary line adjustment plat referenced in paragraph 2.B., above.

In all other respects the aforesaid Deed of Gift of Easement dated June

3, 2011 remains in full force and effect.

Dear Mr. Hobert:

We have reviewed the Commonwealth collections and remittances of the Treasurer, Commissioner of the Revenue, and Sheriff of the locality indicated for the year ended June 30, 2012. Our primary objectives were to determine that the officials have maintained accountability over Commonwealth collections, established internal controls, and complied with state laws and regulations.

The results of our tests found the Treasurer, Commissioner of the Revenue, and Sheriff complied, in all material respects, with state laws, regulations and other procedures relating to the receipt, disbursement, and custody of state funds, except as follows.

The Treasurer did not maintain sufficient internal control over state funds as described below.

Perform Monthly Reconciliations

The Treasurer did not perform timely and adequate monthly reconciliations of the accounting records to the Commonwealth Accounting and Reporting System (CARS) reports provided by the Department of Accounts. Timely monthly reconciliations are a significant internal control which is essential for determining the reliability of information.

The Treasurer should reconcile assessments, collections, and uncollected balances to CARS on a monthly basis as required by Section 58.1-3168 of the <u>Code of Virginia</u> and submit correction requests timely. Proper procedures will ensure complete and accurate recording of tax assessments and collections.

- **WHEREAS**, a copy of the Authority Resolution, a record of the public hearing and a fiscal impact statement with respect to the issuance of the Bonds have been filed with the Board of Supervisors (the "Board of Supervisors") of Clarke County, Virginia (the "County");

WHEREAS, the Foundation has requested the Board of Supervisors to approve the issuance of the Bonds to comply with Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code and with Section 15.2-4906 of the Virginia Code; and

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF CLARKE COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

- 1. The Board of Supervisors hereby approves the issuance of the Bonds by the Authority for the benefit of the Foundation, as required by Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code and by Section 15.2-4906 of the Virginia Code.
- 2. The County having not previously issued in calendar year 2012 any tax-exempt obligations (not including "private activity bonds" other than "qualified 501(c)(3) bonds," as those terms are defined in the Code), which are required to be aggregated with obligations issued by the Authority for purposes of Section 265(b)(3)(B) of the Code, and the County and all its subordinate issuing entities or authorities (including the Authority) not reasonably expecting to issue in calendar year 2012 any other such obligations that, when aggregated with the Bonds, will be in excess of \$10,000,000, the County hereby concurs with the Authority's intention to designate the Bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" under Section 265(b)(3)(B) of the Code.
- 3. The approval of the issuance of the Bonds does not constitute an endorsement of the Bonds or the creditworthiness of the Foundation. As required by Section 15.2-4909 of the Virginia Code, the Bonds shall provide that the County will have no obligation to pay the Bonds or the interest thereon or other costs incident thereto.
- 4. All acts and doings of the officers of the County and the Board of Supervisors that are in conformity with the purposes and intent of this resolution shall be, and the same hereby are, in all respects approved and confirmed.
- 5. The Board of Supervisors' approval of the issuance of the Bonds is conditioned upon (a) the issuance of the Bonds by December 31, 2012, and (b) the adoption of a concurring resolution by the Board of Supervisors of Frederick County, Virginia.

WHEREAS, there have been described to the Industrial Development Authority of Clarke County, Virginia (the "Authority"), the plans of the Lord Fairfax Community College Educational Foundation, Inc., a non-profit, Virginia nonstock corporation (the "Borrower"), to finance the costs of constructing, equipping, improving and developing a multi-purpose student union building, of approximately 31,800 gross square feet and consisting of two stories, to be located on an approximately 17.8-acre site north of, and adjacent to, the Lord Fairfax Community College main campus in Frederick County at 173 Skirmisher Lane, Middletown, Virginia 22645, together with a related parking lot of approximately 6,000 square feet, and roadways and sidewalks to access the site (collectively, the "Project");

WHEREAS, the Borrower in its appearance before the Authority and in its application has described the benefits of the financing, and has requested the Authority to issue its educational facilities revenue bonds (as more particularly described below, the "Bonds") under the Virginia Industrial Development and Revenue Bond Act in Section 15.2-4900, et. seq. of the Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended (the "Act") in such amounts as may be necessary to finance costs to be incurred in constructing, equipping, improving and developing the Project; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing has been held as required by Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), and Section 15.2-4906 of the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY OF CLARKE COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

- 1. It is hereby found and determined that the financing of the Project for the Borrower will be in the public interest of Clarke County, Virginia (the "County"), and its environs, and will enable the Borrower to provide improved educational facilities for the use of the inhabitants of the Commonwealth of Virginia (the "Commonwealth") and the County, and will be in furtherance of the purposes of the Act.
- 2. The Authority hereby agrees to assist the Borrower to finance the construction, improvement, equipping and development of the Project by undertaking the issuance of its educational facilities revenue bonds therefor in an amount not to exceed \$9,000,000, upon terms and conditions to be mutually agreed upon between the Authority and the Borrower.
- 3. The proceeds of the Bonds shall be loaned to the Borrower to enable it to construct, improve, equip, and develop the Project, pay any costs of issuance for the Bonds and, if necessary, pay capitalized interest on the Bonds during and after any construction of the Project. The Borrower shall agree to provide payments to the Authority sufficient to pay the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on and purchase price of, if any, the Bonds and to pay all other expenses in connection with financing the Project. The Bonds shall be issued in form and pursuant to terms to be approved by the Authority, and the payment of the Bonds shall be secured by an assignment, for the benefit of the holders thereof, of the Authority's rights to

payments (other than rights to fees, expenses and indemnification) under the agreement pursuant to which the proceeds of the Bonds will be loaned to the Borrower.

- 4. It having been represented to the Authority that it may be necessary to proceed immediately with the construction, improvement, equipping, and development of the Project, the Authority hereby agrees that the Borrower may proceed with plans for the Project, enter into contracts for construction, improvement, equipping, and development of the Project, and take such other steps as it may deem appropriate in connection therewith, provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to authorize the Borrower to obligate the Authority without its consent in each instance to the payment of any moneys or the performance of any acts in connection with the Project. The Authority agrees that the Borrower may be reimbursed from the proceeds of the Bonds for all lawful costs so incurred by it.
- 5. The Authority hereby agrees with the recommendation of the Borrower that Hunton & Williams LLP be appointed as bond counsel in connection with the issuance of the Bonds, and hereby appoints such firm to supervise the proceedings and approve the issuance of the Bonds.
- 6. All lawful costs and expenses in connection with the financing and the construction, improvement, equipping and development of the Project, including the fees and expenses of bond counsel, counsel for the Authority and the agent or underwriter for the sale of the Bonds, shall be paid from the proceeds of the Bonds or by the Borrower. If for any reason the Bonds are not issued, or the Bonds are issued but it is determined that a part or all of such costs are not lawfully payable out of Bond proceeds, it is understood that all such expenses shall be paid by the Borrower and that the Authority shall have no responsibility therefor.
- 7. The financing instruments shall provide for payment by the Borrower to the Authority of an annual fee consistent with the Authority's policy for such fees by not-for-profit entities; provided, however, that the amount so paid shall not equal or exceed an amount that would cause the "yield" on the obligation of the Borrower to the Authority or any other "acquired purpose obligation" to be "materially higher" than the yield on the Bonds, as the terms are defined in Section 148 of the Code.
- 8. The Borrower shall indemnify and save harmless the Authority, its officers, directors, employees, and agents from and against all liabilities, obligations, claims, damages, penalties, fines, losses, costs, and expenses in any way connected with the Borrower or the issuance of the Bonds.
- 9. Any action heretofore or hereafter taken by any officer of the Authority in conformity with the purposes and intent of this resolution and the issuance of the Bonds is hereby ratified, approved and confirmed.
- 10. The Authority hereby recommends that the Board of Supervisors of Clarke County approve the issuance of the Bonds in accordance with the provisions of Section 147(f) of the Code and Section 15.2-4906 of the Act and agrees, at the request of the Borrower, to designate the Bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" (within the meaning of Section 265(b)(3) of the Code). The Authority hereby directs the Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the


RE: Economic Development Consultant for Comprehensive Plan Update

Inspection shall be arranged to be done during normal business hours Monday through Friday at least the day prior to the event. All tents shall be fire retardant treated with the appropriate approval label on the tent and shall have a mounted and posted fire extinguisher (5 lb. ABC min.) located in each tent. If the tent is enclosed, it shall have two (2) forms of exit that are labeled and illuminated if the event occurs after daylight. If the event will occur after daylight hours, emergency lighting shall be provided.
- Electrical Systems Any temporary or portable electrical distribution systems shall require an Electrical Permit and inspections prior to the event. All portable or temporary systems shall be Ground Fault Interrupter Circuit (GFIC) protected. Trailer mounted generators shall be provided with ground rods and grounding conductors appropriate for the generator output requirements. All equipment shall be listed and labeled for the application (weather resistant). No portable generators are allowed inside any tents or trailers where persons would normally enter. A description of the electrical distribution system shall be provided with the special event application.
- Gas Appliances All gas appliances including cooking and heating appliances shall be inspected including leak tested prior to the event. No gas cylinders will be allowed inside tents or occupied trailers or structures. All gas cylinders shall be secured in areas not normally used by the public. All gas equipment shall be in good working order and shall meet requirements of the Virginia Fuel Gas Code.
- **Lighting** Information pertaining to the temporary lighting systems shall be provided with the special event application including output wattage and generation system. Lighting system shall be located not to project excessive lighting off of the premises and not to blind any moving traffic on or of the event property. Any lighting pointing to the property boundary shall be shielded and downcast.
- **Inspections** Arrangement for inspections shall be scheduled to occur prior to opening of the event during normal business hours between Monday and Friday. Required inspections shall be scheduled at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the expected inspection. If special times and arrangements are required, prior approval will need to be arranged with the Clarke County Building Department.







Re: Update on Recommendation for use of 36 East Main (Library)

As requested by the Board, we have contacted VDOT and local realtors to solicit information regarding the potential sale or use of the facility located at 36 East Main.

Previously approved plans for parking improvements in the rear of the Courthouse determined that the best location for access to that additional parking would be from Main Street with access located between the Historical Association Museum and the old library. As designed to meet the VDOT entrance requirements, the access would occupy most of the side yards of both the Museum and the old library with the entrance at Main Street being about sixty feet wide. Meeting these construction standards would constrain the Board's ability to create a separate parcel as the required access will occupy most of the side yard of both buildings and the required entrance width will expand into the front yards of both facilities. The previously planned parking and drainage structures located at the rear of the old library also serve to constrain such a parcel with storm water detention and drainage structures.

VDOT reviewed the current plans and conducted an onsite visit to determine if the construction standards could be adjusted in order to provide the Board with any additional flexibility. VDOT determined that the access width could be reduced from thirty feet to twenty-six feet (twenty-eight feet preferred) and that the radius of the entrance could be reduced from twenty-five feet to twelve and one-half feet. (The current plan uses fifteen feet). VDOT noted that this would save a total of seven to nine feet. These reductions would reduce but not eliminate the impact on the side and front yard of a library lot if the total reduction in width was taken from the library side, but may also adversely affect the parking behind the museum. The drainage and parking behind the library would not be changed.

If the Board wishes to retain the ability to construct the parking and access as previously designed, we would recommend that the Board also retain the existing plan dimensions as new regulations or construction contingencies may require modification of the details of a future plan

Should the Board decide to dispose of the property, it will be necessary to conduct a public hearing prior to doing so. We have been advised that the Board should be as accurate and complete as possible in describing the property to be disposed of or otherwise encumbered in order to reduce any future challenges to the decision. Further, we have been advised that

ownership of any property the Board anticipates using in the future should be retained and any easements or rights of way granted to others be carefully considered.

All of the Realtors that offered information felt the current assessed value of \$536,000 was far in excess of actual value of the current parcel and that if a portion of the parcel was to be sold, an appraisal of the parcel actually offered for sale should be obtained prior to offering the property for sale.

None of the Realtors believed the structure to be particularly well suited for commercial use, citing ADA access issues, current condition, and potential parking limitations as limitations on its value. All cited current market conditions as limiting factors on sale and rental values.

One Realtor recommended that the Board consider converting the facility to residential use, perhaps two apartments, with the expectation that residential uses are easier to fill than commercial space and that the income would offset the cost of maintaining the property until such time as a decision is made on use of the remainder of the property.

The absence of independent restroom facilities severely limits the market for the old Commonwealth Attorney's office. Everyone seemed to agree that its location and dependence upon the operations of the Courts for restroom facilities made a local government use the most likely. One person suggested that installation of restroom facilities would make the building easier to rent but doubted that rental income could be increased to offset the cost of construction.

Next steps:

- 1. Decide if interest remains in potential future development of the site.
- 2. Determine if constraints on possible Library site are necessary to enable future development of remaining site.
- 3. Establish library site to enable future development of Courthouse expansion area or to maximize potential sale income from Library site.
- 4. Secure appraisal if sale is anticipated.
- 5. If Library site is not offered for sale, determine desired use.
- 6. Authorize agreed upon modifications/renovations for desired use.
- 7. Secure services of realtor for sale or rental if not used by county.

This letter is in response to your letter dated October 18, 2012 to Mr. David Ash, Clarke County Administrator, regarding VDOT's initial environmental review for the proposed replacement of the Long Marsh Run Bridge located on Shepherds Mill Road. The County appreciates the opportunity to serve as a consulting party in the Section 106 review process for this project.

As indicated in your letter, the bridge is a contributing resource within the Long Marsh Rural National Historic District (1993), as documented by Maral Kalbian, architectural historian, the historical significance of the bridge in the nomination is as follows:

"The one-lane bridge over Long Marsh Run along Route 612 (21-967-17) is in highly unaltered condition (Photo 39). According to an inscription in the southwest corner of the parapet side, the concrete bridge was constructed in 1918, perhaps by R. E. Byrd and A. J. Ritter, two names that appear under the date. What is so unique about this otherwise common structure is the Latin inscription found on the outside west wall of the bridge that reads, "HOC SIGNO VINCES." This is translated as "In this sign thou shalt conquer," and makes reference to Emperor Constantine's vision that he would triumph if he converted to Christianity. Above the written inscription are two crossed sabres, symbols for sabres at rest. Given the fact that the bridge was constructed at the end of World War I, one can assume this inscription refers to America's victory."

In addition the County believes that the bridge may also be eligible for individual listing. This is based on the unusual features of the inscriptions on this otherwise typical early-20th-century, single-slab, single-lane concrete bridge, that may be unique enough to warrant eligibility for individual listing. Further research needs to be conducted on the inscriptions in order to determine the story behind them as well as confirm whether this feature is found on other bridges of this era in the Commonwealth.

An additional concern, not addressed in the October 18 letter is the potential disturbance of significant archeological resources. The bridge is adjacent to the Castleman-Taylor Mill site, and any disturbance should be preceded by an archaeological survey.

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) is beginning the environmental studies and consultation for the proposed replacement of the Route 612 bridge over Long Marsh Run in Clarke county (see attached location map). The bridge is proposed for replacement to upgrade the structure to modern safety guidelines.

Pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, the VDOT has identified your organization along with the Clarke County Historical Association as a potential consulting party. The purpose of this letter is to inquire about your interest in being a consulting party and participating in the Section 106 consultation process for this proposed project.

Below is information about the project to assist you in determining your level of interest in becoming a consulting party.

Project Description

The project proposes to replace the existing single lane (17.5 foot-wide), one-span, concrete slab bridge (Structure #6045) over Long Marsh Run with a new two lane (25 foot-wide) concrete deck bridge (see attached photo). The proposed pavement width will increase from the existing 17.5 foot-wide single lane to a 25 foot-wide two-lane typical section. VDOT is currently gathering information to fully evaluate all possible alternatives to design a safe crossing and approach roadway with minimal impacts to the environment.

Identification Efforts

A field survey was conducted on the current project in late September 2012 by VDOT architectural historian, Meghan Hesse. The bridge, Clarke County Structure No. 6045 (DSS #021-0967-0017), was built in 1932, and was recently determined by the Historic Structures Task Group/Virginia Department of Historic Resources in October 2012 to be not eligible individually for the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). However, the bridge is a contributing resource to the Long Marsh Run Historic District. The district was listed in the NRHP in November 1996 and currently includes 10,000 acres of rolling agricultural fields and a mix of buildings and structures constructed from the late eighteenth century to the present day (see attached map).

Role of Consulting Parties

Under Section 106 and its implementing regulations at 36 CFR 800, consulting parties are those individuals and organizations with a demonstrated interest in the proposed undertaking that agree to work with the federal agency (FHWA) and its applicant (VDOT) to identify historic properties, discuss ways to avoid or minimize adverse effects to historic properties, and develop memoranda of agreement (MOA) in cases where avoidance is not feasible and the project will have an adverse effect on historic properties. An MOA is a legal document that outlines agreed-upon mitigation measures for minimizing or mitigating adverse effects to historic properties.



This summary condenses or paraphrases the actual language of the Virginia vehicle laws. In a court, which is guided by the full and exact language of the laws, it is not a proper authority to cite. Included with the summary are *Code of Virginia* references with links to the appropriate sections.

Rights and Duties

Every person riding a bicycle on a highway shall be subject to the provisions of the Code of Virginia section on motor vehicles and shall have the rights and duties applicable to the driver of a vehicle unless a provision clearly indicates otherwise.

Definitions

- A **bicycle** is defined as a device propelled solely by human power, upon which a person may ride either on or astride a regular seat attached thereto, having two or more wheels in tandem, including children's bicycles except a toy vehicle intended for use by young children. A bicycle is a vehicle when operated on the highway.
- A **bike lane** is defined as that portion of a roadway designated by signs and/or pavement markings for the preferential use of bicycles, electric power-assisted bicycles, and mopeds.

- space or barrier and is located either within the highway right-of-way or within a separate right-of way. Shared use paths may also be used by pedestrians, skaters, users of wheel chair conveyances, joggers, and other nonmotorized users.
- A sidewalk is defined as the portion of a street between the curb lines, or the lateral lines of a roadway, and the adjacent property lines, intended for use by pedestrians.
- A highway is defined as the entire width between the boundary lines of every place open to public use for purposes of vehicular travel.
- A roadway is defined as the portion of the highway improved, designed, or ordinarily used for vehicular travel, exclusive
 of the shoulder.
- A vehicle is defined as every device used for the transportation of people or property on a highway.

Traffic Controls

Bicyclists must obey all traffic signs, signals, lights, and markings.

Where to Ride

- Bicyclists must ride with the flow of traffic on the right side of the highway.
- Bicyclists operating a bicycle on a roadway at less than the normal speed of traffic at the time and place under conditions
 then existing shall ride as close as safely practicable to the right curb or edge of roadway. Exceptions to this are when
 bicyclists are overtaking and passing another vehicle proceeding in the same direction, preparing for a left turn, avoiding
 unsafe conditions, avoiding riding in a lane that turns or diverges to the right, riding on a one way street where bicyclists
 may ride as near the left-hand curb or edge of roadway, or when the lane width is too narrow to share with a motor vehicle.
 Additionally, bicycles are not excluded from riding on the highway shoulder.
- Bicyclists must not ride between two lanes of traffic moving in the same direction unless one lane is a separate or mandatory turn lane.
- Bicyclists cannot ride more than two abreast on highways. When riding two abreast, bicyclists cannot impede the
 movement of traffic and need to move into a single file when being overtaken from the rear. On a laned roadway,
 bicyclists shall ride in a single lane.
- Bicyclists are not permitted to ride on interstate and certain controlled access highways, unless the operation is limited to bicycle or pedestrian facilities that are barrier separated from the roadway and automobile traffic. The restricted sections of the highways are marked with conspicuous signs.
- Bicycles may be ridden on sidewalks unless prohibited by local ordinance or traffic control devices. While on sidewalks
 and shared use paths, bicyclists must always yield the right of way to pedestrians and give an audible signal before
 passing a pedestrian.
- Bicyclists pulling onto a sidewalk or highway from a driveway must yield the right of way to pedestrians or vehicles already
 on the sidewalk or highway.

Changing Directions

Bicyclists must signal their intentions to stop or turn. The proper signals are made with the left arm as follows:

Right Turn Left Turn Stop

A right turn may be signaled with the right arm. The signals do not have to be given continuously if both hands are needed to control the bicycle.

Bicyclists may make left turns as either motorists or pedestrians do. To make a pedestrian left turn, the bicyclist should continue straight across the intersecting road, obey the traffic signals, turn left at the corner, and proceed as usual. Bicyclists may also dismount and walk in the crosswalks of the two intersecting roads. If traffic control devices specify the method of crossings, these directions must be followed. Please refer to the examples shown here:

Passing

Bicyclists may overtake and pass another vehicle only when safe to do so. Bicyclists may pass another vehicle on the right or left, and they may stay in the same lane, change lanes, or ride off the road if necessary for safe passing. Please note that passing motor vehicles on the right side may be extremely dangerous if the motorist does not see the bicyclist and attempts a right turn.

A person riding a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, motorized skateboard or scooter, or moped shall not travel between two lanes of traffic moving in the same direction, except where one lane is a separate turn lane or a mandatory turn lane.

Motorists must approach and pass a bicyclist at a reasonable speed at least two feet to the left of the bicyclist.

Safety Considerations

- Bicyclists must not carry articles which prevent them from keeping at least one hand on the handlebars.
- Bicyclists must not carry more people than the bicycle is designed to accommodate, except for adult bicyclists carrying a
 child, under six years of age, securely attached to the bicycle in a seat or trailer designed to carry children.
- Bicyclists must not attach themselves or their bicycles to any other vehicle on the roadway.
- Bicyclists are not permitted to wear earphones in both ears while riding a bicycle.

Helmet Use

Equipment

Every bicycle ridden between sunset and sunrise must have at least one white headlamp with the light being visible at least 500 feet to the front. The bicycle must have a red reflector on the rear visible at least 600 feet to the rear. On roads posted with speed limit of 35 mph or greater, the bicyclist must additionally be equipped with at least one red taillight visible from 500 feet to the rear. Taillights may be steady or blinking, are allowed under all conditions, and may be attached to the cycle or rider.

Bicycles ridden on highways must have brakes which will skid the wheels on dry, level, clean pavement.

Registration

Bicyclists may register the serial numbers of their bicycles with local police or sheriff's department.

Localities have the authority to license bicycles.

Accidents

Bicyclists must stop when they are in an accident involving death, injury, or property damage. The bicyclist's name and address must be given to the police and to any person involved in the accident or the owner of the property. If unattended property is damaged, the bicyclist must make a reasonable effort to find the owner. The bicyclist's name and address must be given to the owner. If the owner can not be located, the bicyclist must leave a note in a conspicuous place at the accident site and report the accident to the police within 24 hours.

Mopeds, Electric Power-assisted Bicycles, and Electric Personal Assistive Mobility Devices

Mopeds, Electric Power-assisted Bicycles, and Electric Personal Assistive Mobility Devices
Generally the laws for the operation of mopeds, electric power-assisted bicycles, and electric assistive mobility devices are similar to the operation of bicycles.

"Moped" means every vehicle that travels on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground that has (i) a seat that is no less than 24 inches in height, measured from the middle of the seat perpendicular to the ground and (ii) gasoline, electric, or hybrid motor that displaces less than 50 cubic centimeters. Moped operators must be at least 16 years old and must carry some form of identification that includes name, address, and date of birth. A moped is considered a vehicle while operated on a highway. Mopeds can not be ridden on sidewalks or bike paths. Some localities in Northern Virginia may impose restrictions on the operation of mopeds. Localities can require additional safety equipment for moped operation.

"Electric power-assisted bicycle" means a vehicle that travels on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground and is equipped with (i) pedals that allow propulsion by human power and (ii) an electric motor with an input of no more than 1,000 watts that reduces the pedal effort required of the rider. Operators must be at least 14 years old or be under the supervision of someone at least 18 years old. An electric power-assisted bicycle shall be considered a vehicle when operated on a highway.

"Motorcycle" means every motor vehicle designed to travel on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground and is capable of traveling at speeds in excess of 35 miles per hour. The term "motorcycle" does not include any "electric personal assistive mobility device," "electric power-assisted bicycle," "farm tractor," "golf cart," "moped," "motorized skateboard or scooter," "utility vehicle" or "wheelchair or wheelchair conveyance" as defined in this section.

"Motor-driven cycle" means every motorcycle that has a gasoline engine that (i) displaces less than 150 cubic centimeters; (ii) has a seat less than 24 inches in height, measured from the middle of the seat perpendicular to the ground; and (iii) has no manufacturer-issued vehicle identification number.

"Motorized skateboard or scooter" means every vehicle, regardless of the number of its wheels in contact with the ground, that (i) has no seat, but is designed to be stood upon by the operator, (ii) has no manufacturer-issued vehicle identification number, and (iii) is powered by an electric motor having an input of no more than 1,000 watts or a gasoline engine that displaces less than 36 cubic centimeters. The term "motorized skateboard or scooter" includes vehicles with or without handlebars, but does not include "electric personal assistive mobility devices."

An electric personal assistive mobility device is a self-balancing two-nontandem-wheeled device that is designed to transport only one person and is powered by an electric propulsion system that limits the device's maximum speed to fifteen miles per hour or less. Such devices must be equipped with a system that will enable the user to bring the device to a controlled stop. These devices may be operated on highways with a maximum speed limit of 25 miles per hour or less if no sidewalk is provided or if use of the sidewalk is prohibited. Operators must be at least 14 years old or under the supervision of a person who is at least 18 years old. An electric personal assistive mobility device is considered a vehicle when operated on a highway.

Important Note on Infractions

Violation of state traffic laws is considered a traffic infraction and is punishable by a fine of not more than \$100 unless other specific penalty provisions apply.

Tips for Safe Bicycling

- Be a responsible bicyclist obey all traffic control devices and use proper hand signals.
- Always ride with the flow of traffic.
- Dress safely wear a helmet, wear bright colored clothing, and secure loose pant legs.
- Ride defensively anticipate the actions of other road users and watch for road hazards.
- Pass vehicles with extreme care turning vehicles may not see you.
- Be aware of motor vehicle blind spots whether while riding or when stopped at an intersection.
- Maximize your visibility at night wear reflective clothing and apply reflective tape to your bicycle.
- Walk your bicycle when you get into traffic situations beyond your cycling abilities.
- Exercise great caution when riding in bus traffic watch out for buses pulling to and from curbs and passengers getting
 on and off buses.
- Park your bicycle so you do not block sidewalks, handicap and building accesses, or emergency drives.
- Lock your bicycle secure both wheels and the frame to a stationary object using a sturdy lock.
- Register or license your bicycle if required or provided by your community.

§ 46.2-100. (Effective until October 1, 2012) Definitions.

The following words and phrases when used in this title shall, for the purpose of this title, have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section except in those instances where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

"All-terrain vehicle" means a three-wheeled or four-wheeled motor vehicle powered by a gasoline or diesel engine and generally characterized by large, low-pressure tires, a seat designed to be straddled by the operator, and handlebars for steering that is intended for off-road use by an individual rider on various types of unpaved terrain. The term does not include four-wheeled vehicles, commonly known as "go-carts," that have low centers of gravity and are typically used in racing on relatively level surfaces, nor does the term include any "utility vehicle" as defined in this section or any "farm utility vehicle" as defined in this section.

"Antique motor vehicle" means every motor vehicle, as defined in this section, which was actually manufactured or designated by the manufacturer as a model manufactured in a calendar year not less than 25 years prior to January 1 of each calendar year and is owned solely as a collector's item.

"Antique trailer" means every trailer or semitrailer, as defined in this section, that was actually manufactured or designated by the manufacturer as a model manufactured in a calendar year not less than 25 years prior to January 1 of each calendar year and is owned solely as a collector's item.

"Automobile or watercraft transporters" means any tractor truck, lowboy, vehicle, or combination, including vehicles or combinations that transport motor vehicles or watercraft on their power unit, designed and used exclusively for the transportation of motor vehicles or watercraft.

"Bicycle" means a device propelled solely by human power, upon which a person may ride either on or astride a regular seat attached thereto, having two or more wheels in tandem, including children's bicycles, except a toy vehicle intended for use by young children. For purposes of Chapter 8 (§ 46.2-800 et seq.) of this title, a bicycle shall be a vehicle while operated on the highway.

"Bicycle lane" means that portion of a roadway designated by signs and/or pavement markings for the preferential use of bicycles, electric power-assisted bicycles, and mopeds.

"Business district" means the territory contiguous to a highway where 75 percent or more of the property contiguous to a highway, on either side of the highway, for a distance of 300 feet or more along the highway, is occupied by land and buildings actually in use for business purposes.

"Camping trailer" means every vehicle that has collapsible sides and contains sleeping quarters but may or may not contain bathing and cooking facilities and is designed to be drawn by a motor vehicle.

"Cancel" or "cancellation" means that the document or privilege cancelled has been annulled or terminated because of some error, defect, or ineligibility, but the cancellation is without prejudice and reapplication may be made at any time after cancellation.

"Chauffeur" means every person employed for the principal purpose of driving a motor vehicle and every person who drives a motor vehicle while in use as a public or common carrier of persons or property.

"Commission" means the State Corporation Commission.

"Commissioner" means the Commissioner of the Department of Motor Vehicles of the Commonwealth.

"Crosswalk" means that part of a roadway at an intersection included within the connections of the lateral lines of the sidewalks on opposite sides of the highway measured from the curbs or, in the absence of curbs, from the edges of the traversable roadway; or any portion of a roadway at an intersection or elsewhere distinctly indicated for

pedestrian crossing by lines or other markings on the surface.

"Decal" means a device to be attached to a license plate that validates the license plate for a predetermined registration period.

"Department" means the Department of Motor Vehicles of the Commonwealth.

"Disabled parking license plate" means a license plate that displays the international symbol of access in the same size as the numbers and letters on the plate and in a color that contrasts with the background.

"Disabled veteran" means a veteran who (i) has either lost, or lost the use of, a leg, arm, or hand; (ii) is blind; or (iii) is permanently and totally disabled as certified by the U.S. Veterans Administration. A veteran shall be considered blind if he has a permanent impairment of both eyes to the following extent: (i) central visual acuity of 20/200 or less in the better eye, with corrective lenses, or central visual acuity of more than 20/200, if there is a field defect in which the peripheral field has contracted to such an extent that the widest diameter of visual field subtends an angular distance no greater than 20 degrees in the better eye.

"Driver's license" means any license, including a commercial driver's license as defined in the Virginia Commercial Driver's License Act (§ 46.2-341.1 et seq.), issued under the laws of the Commonwealth authorizing the operation of a motor vehicle.

"Electric personal assistive mobility device" means a self-balancing two-nontandem-wheeled device that is designed to transport only one person and powered by an electric propulsion system that limits the device's maximum speed to 15 miles per hour or less. For purposes of Chapter 8 of this title, an electric personal assistive mobility device shall be a vehicle when operated on a highway.

"Electric power-assisted bicycle" means a vehicle that travels on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground and is equipped with (i) pedals that allow propulsion by human power and (ii) an electric motor with an input of no more than 1,000 watts that reduces the pedal effort required of the rider. For the purposes of Chapter 8 of this title, an electric power-assisted bicycle shall be a vehicle when operated on a highway.

"Essential parts" means all integral parts and body parts, the removal, alteration, or substitution of which will tend to conceal the identity of a vehicle.

"Farm tractor" means every motor vehicle designed and used as a farm, agricultural, or horticultural implement for drawing plows, mowing machines, and other farm, agricultural, or horticultural machinery and implements including self-propelled mowers designed and used for mowing lawns.

"Farm utility vehicle" means a vehicle that is designed for off-road use and is used as a farm, agricultural, or horticultural service vehicle, generally having a gasoline or diesel engine, four or more wheels, bench seating for the operator and a passenger, a steering wheel for control, and a cargo bed. "Farm utility vehicle" does not include pickup or panel trucks, golf carts, low-speed vehicles, riding lawn mowers, or all-terrain vehicles.

"Federal safety requirements" means applicable provisions of 49 U.S.C. § 30101 et seq. and all administrative regulations and policies adopted pursuant thereto.

"Financial responsibility" means the ability to respond in damages for liability thereafter incurred arising out of the ownership, maintenance, use, or operation of a motor vehicle, in the amounts provided for in § 46.2-472.

"Foreign market vehicle" means any motor vehicle originally manufactured outside the United States, which was not manufactured in accordance with 49 U.S.C. § 30101 et seq. and the policies and regulations adopted pursuant to that Act, and for which a Virginia title or registration is sought.

"Foreign vehicle" means every motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer that is brought into the Commonwealth otherwise than in the ordinary course of business by or through a manufacturer or dealer and that has not been registered in the Commonwealth.

"Golf cart" means a self-propelled vehicle that is designed to transport persons playing golf and their equipment on a golf course.

"Governing body" means the board of supervisors of a county, council of a city, or council of a town, as context may require.

"Gross weight" means the aggregate weight of a vehicle or combination of vehicles and the load thereon.

"Highway" means the entire width between the boundary lines of every way or place open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel in the Commonwealth, including the streets and alleys, and, for law-enforcement purposes, (i) the entire width between the boundary lines of all private roads or private streets that have been specifically designated "highways" by an ordinance adopted by the governing body of the county, city, or town in which such private roads or streets are located and (ii) the entire width between the boundary lines of every way or place used for purposes of vehicular travel on any property owned, leased, or controlled by the United States government and located in the Commonwealth.

"Intersection" means (i) the area embraced within the prolongation or connection of the lateral curblines or, if none, then the lateral boundary lines of the roadways of two highways that join one another at, or approximately at, right angles, or the area within which vehicles traveling on different highways joining at any other angle may come in conflict; (ii) where a highway includes two roadways 30 feet or more apart, then every crossing of each roadway of such divided highway by an intersecting highway shall be regarded as a separate intersection, in the event such intersecting highway also includes two roadways 30 feet or more apart, then every crossing of two roadways of such highways shall be regarded as a separate intersection; or (iii) for purposes only of authorizing installation of traffic-control devices, every crossing of a highway or street at grade by a pedestrian crosswalk.

"Law-enforcement officer" means any officer authorized to direct or regulate traffic or to make arrests for violations of this title or local ordinances authorized by law. For the purposes of access to law-enforcement databases regarding motor vehicle registration and ownership only, this term shall also include city and county commissioners of the revenue and treasurers, together with their duly designated deputies and employees, when such officials are actually engaged in the enforcement of §§ 46.2-752, 46.2-753, and 46.2-754 and local ordinances enacted thereunder.

"License plate" means a device containing letters, numerals, or a combination of both, attached to a motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer to indicate that the vehicle is properly registered with the Department.

"Light" means a device for producing illumination or the illumination produced by the device.

"Low-speed vehicle" means any four-wheeled electrically-powered vehicle, except a motor vehicle or low-speed vehicle that is used exclusively for agricultural or horticultural purposes or a golf cart, whose maximum speed is greater than 20 miles per hour but not greater than 25 miles per hour and is manufactured to comply with safety standards contained in Title 49 of the Code of Federal Regulations, § 571.500.

"Manufactured home" means a structure subject to federal regulation, transportable in one or more sections, which in the traveling mode is eight body feet or more in width or 40 body feet or more in length, or, when erected on site, is 320 or more square feet, and which is built on a permanent chassis and designed to be used as a dwelling with or without a permanent foundation when connected to the required utilities, and includes the plumbing, heating, air conditioning, and electrical systems contained therein.

"Moped" means every vehicle that travels on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground that has (i) a seat that is no less than 24 inches in height, measured from the middle of the seat perpendicular to the ground and (ii) a gasoline, electric, or hybrid motor that displaces less than 50 cubic centimeters. For purposes of this title, a moped shall be a motorcycle when operated at speeds in excess of 35 miles per hour. For purposes of Chapter 8 (§ 46.2-800 et seq.), a moped shall be a vehicle while operated on a highway.

"Motor-driven cycle" means every motorcycle that has a gasoline engine that (i) displaces less than 150 cubic centimeters; (ii) has a seat less than 24 inches in height, measured from the middle of the seat perpendicular to the

ground; and (iii) has no manufacturer-issued vehicle identification number.

"Motor home" means every private motor vehicle with a normal seating capacity of not more than 10 persons, including the driver, designed primarily for use as living quarters for human beings.

"Motor vehicle" means every vehicle as defined in this section that is self-propelled or designed for self-propulsion except as otherwise provided in this title. Any structure designed, used, or maintained primarily to be loaded on or affixed to a motor vehicle to provide a mobile dwelling, sleeping place, office, or commercial space shall be considered a part of a motor vehicle. For the purposes of this title, any device herein defined as a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped shall be deemed not to be a motor vehicle.

"Motorcycle" means every motor vehicle designed to travel on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground and is capable of traveling at speeds in excess of 35 miles per hour. The term "motorcycle" does not include any "electric personal assistive mobility device," "electric power-assisted bicycle," "farm tractor," "golf cart," "moped," "motorized skateboard or scooter," "utility vehicle" or "wheelchair or wheelchair conveyance" as defined in this section.

"Motorized skateboard or scooter" means every vehicle, regardless of the number of its wheels in contact with the ground, that (i) has no seat, but is designed to be stood upon by the operator, (ii) has no manufacturer-issued vehicle identification number, and (iii) is powered by an electric motor having an input of no more than 1,000 watts or a gasoline engine that displaces less than 36 cubic centimeters. The term "motorized skateboard or scooter" includes vehicles with or without handlebars, but does not include "electric personal assistive mobility devices."

"Nonresident" means every person who is not domiciled in the Commonwealth, except: (i) any foreign corporation that is authorized to do business in the Commonwealth by the State Corporation Commission shall be a resident of the Commonwealth for the purpose of this title; in the case of corporations incorporated in the Commonwealth but doing business outside the Commonwealth, only such principal place of business or branches located within the Commonwealth shall be dealt with as residents of the Commonwealth; (ii) a person who becomes engaged in a gainful occupation in the Commonwealth for a period exceeding 60 days shall be a resident for the purposes of this title except for the purposes of Chapter 3 (§ 46.2-300 et seq.) of this title; (iii) a person, other than a nonresident student as defined in this section, who has actually resided in the Commonwealth for a period of six months, whether employed or not, or who has registered a motor vehicle, listing an address in the Commonwealth in the application for registration shall be deemed a resident for the purposes of this title, except for the purposes of the Virginia Commercial Driver's License Act (§ 46.2-341.1 et seq.).

"Nonresident student" means every nonresident person who is enrolled as a full-time student in an accredited institution of learning in the Commonwealth and who is not gainfully employed.

"Off-road motorcycle" means every motorcycle designed exclusively for off-road use by an individual rider with not more than two wheels in contact with the ground. Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, for the purposes of this chapter off-road motorcycles shall be deemed to be "motorcycles."

"Operation or use for rent or for hire, for the transportation of passengers, or as a property carrier for compensation," and "business of transporting persons or property" mean any owner or operator of any motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer operating over the highways in the Commonwealth who accepts or receives compensation for the service, directly or indirectly; but these terms do not mean a "truck lessor" as defined in this section and do not include persons or businesses that receive compensation for delivering a product that they themselves sell or produce, where a separate charge is made for delivery of the product or the cost of delivery is included in the sale price of the product, but where the person or business does not derive all or a substantial portion of its income from the transportation of persons or property except as part of a sales transaction.

"Operator" or "driver" means every person who either (i) drives or is in actual physical control of a motor vehicle on a highway or (ii) is exercising control over or steering a vehicle being towed by a motor vehicle.

"Owner" means a person who holds the legal title to a vehicle; however, if a vehicle is the subject of an agreement for its conditional sale or lease with the right of purchase on performance of the conditions stated in the agreement and with an immediate right of possession vested in the conditional vendee or lessee or if a mortgagor of a vehicle is entitled to possession, then the conditional vendee or lessee or mortgagor shall be the owner for the purpose of this title. In all such instances when the rent paid by the lessee includes charges for services of any nature or when the lease does not provide that title shall pass to the lessee on payment of the rent stipulated, the lessor shall be regarded as the owner of the vehicle, and the vehicle shall be subject to such requirements of this title as are applicable to vehicles operated for compensation. A "truck lessor" as defined in this section shall be regarded as the owner, and his vehicles shall be subject to such requirements of this title as are applicable to vehicles of private carriers.

"Passenger car" means every motor vehicle other than a motorcycle designed and used primarily for the transportation of no more than 10 persons including the driver.

"Payment device" means any credit card as defined in 15 U.S.C. § 1602(k) or any "accepted card or other means of access" set forth in 15 U.S.C. § 1693a(1). For the purposes of this title, this definition shall also include a card that enables a person to pay for transactions through the use of value stored on the card itself.

"Pickup or panel truck" means every motor vehicle designed for the transportation of property and having a registered gross weight of 7,500 pounds or less.

"Private road or driveway" means every way in private ownership and used for vehicular travel by the owner and those having express or implied permission from the owner, but not by other persons.

"Reconstructed vehicle" means every vehicle of a type required to be registered under this title materially altered from its original construction by the removal, addition, or substitution of new or used essential parts. Such vehicles, at the discretion of the Department, shall retain their original vehicle identification number, line-make, and model year.

"Replica vehicle" means every vehicle of a type required to be registered under this title not fully constructed by a licensed manufacturer but either constructed or assembled from components. Such components may be from a single vehicle, multiple vehicles, a kit, parts, or fabricated components. The kit may be made up of "major components" as defined in § 46.2-1600, a full body, or a full chassis, or a combination of these parts. The vehicle shall resemble a vehicle of distinctive name, line-make, model, or type as produced by a licensed manufacturer or manufacturer no longer in business and is not a reconstructed or specially constructed vehicle as herein defined.

"Residence district" means the territory contiguous to a highway, not comprising a business district, where 75 percent or more of the property abutting such highway, on either side of the highway, for a distance of 300 feet or more along the highway consists of land improved for dwelling purposes, or is occupied by dwellings, or consists of land or buildings in use for business purposes, or consists of territory zoned residential or territory in residential subdivisions created under Chapter 22 (§ 15.2-2200 et seq.) of Title 15.2.

"Revoke" or "revocation" means that the document or privilege revoked is not subject to renewal or restoration except through reapplication after the expiration of the period of revocation.

"Roadway" means that portion of a highway improved, designed, or ordinarily used for vehicular travel, exclusive of the shoulder. A highway may include two or more roadways if divided by a physical barrier or barriers or an unpaved area.

"Safety zone" means the area officially set apart within a roadway for the exclusive use of pedestrians and that is protected or is so marked or indicated by plainly visible signs.

"School bus" means any motor vehicle, other than a station wagon, automobile, truck, or commercial bus, which is: (i) designed and used primarily for the transportation of pupils to and from public, private or religious schools, or used for the transportation of the mentally or physically handicapped to and from a sheltered workshop; (ii) painted yellow and bears the words "School Bus" in black letters of a specified size on front and rear; and (iii) is equipped

with warning devices prescribed in § 46.2-1090. A yellow school bus may have a white roof provided such vehicle is painted in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Department of Education.

"Semitrailer" means every vehicle of the trailer type so designed and used in conjunction with a motor vehicle that some part of its own weight and that of its own load rests on or is carried by another vehicle.

"Shared-use path" means a bikeway that is physically separated from motorized vehicular traffic by an open space or barrier and is located either within the highway right-of-way or within a separate right-of-way. Shared-use paths may also be used by pedestrians, skaters, users of wheel chairs or wheel chair conveyances, joggers, and other nonmotorized users.

"Shoulder" means that part of a highway between the portion regularly traveled by vehicular traffic and the lateral curbline or ditch.

"Sidewalk" means the portion of a street between the curb lines, or the lateral lines of a roadway, and the adjacent property lines, intended for use by pedestrians.

"Snowmobile" means a self-propelled vehicle designed to travel on snow or ice, steered by skis or runners, and supported in whole or in part by one or more skis, belts, or cleats.

"Special construction and forestry equipment" means any vehicle which is designed primarily for highway construction, highway maintenance, earth moving, timber harvesting or other construction or forestry work and which is not designed for the transportation of persons or property on a public highway.

"Specially constructed vehicle" means any vehicle that was not originally constructed under a distinctive name, make, model, or type by a generally recognized manufacturer of vehicles and not a reconstructed vehicle as herein defined.

"Stinger-steered automobile or watercraft transporter" means an automobile or watercraft transporter configured as a semitrailer combination wherein the fifth wheel is located on a drop frame behind and below the rearmost axle of the power unit.

"Superintendent" means the Superintendent of the Department of State Police of the Commonwealth.

"Suspend" or "suspension" means that the document or privilege suspended has been temporarily withdrawn, but may be reinstated following the period of suspension unless it has expired prior to the end of the period of suspension.

"Tow truck" means a motor vehicle for hire (i) designed to lift, pull, or carry another vehicle by means of a hoist or other mechanical apparatus and (ii) having a manufacturer's gross vehicle weight rating of at least 10,000 pounds. "Tow truck" also includes vehicles designed with a ramp on wheels and a hydraulic lift with a capacity to haul or tow another vehicle, commonly referred to as "rollbacks." "Tow truck" does not include any "automobile or watercraft transporter," "stinger-steered automobile or watercraft transporter," or "tractor truck" as those terms are defined in this section.

"Towing and recovery operator" means a person engaged in the business of (i) removing disabled vehicles, parts of vehicles, their cargoes, and other objects to facilities for repair or safekeeping and (ii) restoring to the highway or other location where they either can be operated or removed to other locations for repair or safekeeping vehicles that have come to rest in places where they cannot be operated.

"Toy vehicle" means any motorized or propellant-driven device that has no manufacturer-issued vehicle identification number, that is designed or used to carry any person or persons, on any number of wheels, bearings, glides, blades, runners, or a cushion of air. The term does not include electric personal assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, mopeds, or motorcycles, nor does it include any nonmotorized or nonpropellant-driven devices such as bicycles, roller skates, or skateboards.

"Tractor truck" means every motor vehicle designed and used primarily for drawing other vehicles and not so constructed as to carry a load other than a part of the load and weight of the vehicle attached thereto.

"Traffic infraction" means a violation of law punishable as provided in § 46.2-113, which is neither a felony nor a misdemeanor.

"Traffic lane" or "lane" means that portion of a roadway designed or designated to accommodate the forward movement of a single line of vehicles.

"Trailer" means every vehicle without motive power designed for carrying property or passengers wholly on its own structure and for being drawn by a motor vehicle, including manufactured homes.

"Truck" means every motor vehicle designed to transport property on its own structure independent of any other vehicle and having a registered gross weight in excess of 7,500 pounds.

"Truck lessor" means a person who holds the legal title to any motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer that is the subject of a bona fide written lease for a term of one year or more to another person, provided that: (i) neither the lessor nor the lessee is a common carrier by motor vehicle or restricted common carrier by motor vehicle or contract carrier by motor vehicle as defined in § 46.2-2000; (ii) the leased motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer is used exclusively for the transportation of property of the lessee; (iii) the lessor is not employed in any capacity by the lessee; (iv) the operator of the leased motor vehicle is a bona fide employee of the lessee and is not employed in any capacity by the lessor; and (v) a true copy of the lease, verified by affidavit of the lessor, is filed with the Commissioner.

"Utility vehicle" means a motor vehicle that is (i) designed for off-road use, (ii) powered by an engine of no more than 25 horsepower, and (iii) used for general maintenance, security, agricultural, or horticultural purposes. "Utility vehicle" does not include all-terrain vehicles as defined in this section, riding lawn mowers, or any other vehicle whose definition is included in this section.

"Vehicle" means every device in, on or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn on a highway, except devices moved by human power or used exclusively on stationary rails or tracks. For the purposes of Chapter 8 (§ 46.2-800 et seq.) of this title, bicycles, electric personal assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, and mopeds shall be vehicles while operated on a highway.

"Wheel chair or wheel chair conveyance" means a chair or seat equipped with wheels, typically used to provide mobility for persons who, by reason of physical disability, are otherwise unable to move about as pedestrians. The term includes both three-wheeled and four-wheeled devices. So long as it is operated only as provided in § 46.2-677, a self-propelled wheel chair or self-propelled wheel chair conveyance shall not be considered a motor vehicle.

§ 46.2-100. (Effective October 1, 2012) Definitions.

The following words and phrases when used in this title shall, for the purpose of this title, have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section except in those instances where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

"All-terrain vehicle" means a three-wheeled or four-wheeled motor vehicle powered by a gasoline or diesel engine and generally characterized by large, low-pressure tires, a seat designed to be straddled by the operator, and handlebars for steering that is intended for off-road use by an individual rider on various types of unpaved terrain.

The term does not include four-wheeled vehicles, commonly known as "go-carts," that have low centers of gravity and are typically used in racing on relatively level surfaces, nor does the term include any "utility vehicle" as defined in this section or any "farm utility vehicle" as defined in this section.

"Antique motor vehicle" means every motor vehicle, as defined in this section, which was actually manufactured or designated by the manufacturer as a model manufactured in a calendar year not less than 25 years prior to January 1 of each calendar year and is owned solely as a collector's item.

"Antique trailer" means every trailer or semitrailer, as defined in this section, that was actually manufactured or designated by the manufacturer as a model manufactured in a calendar year not less than 25 years prior to January 1 of each calendar year and is owned solely as a collector's item.

"Automobile or watercraft transporters" means any tractor truck, lowboy, vehicle, or combination, including vehicles or combinations that transport motor vehicles or watercraft on their power unit, designed and used exclusively for the transportation of motor vehicles or watercraft.

"Bicycle" means a device propelled solely by human power, upon which a person may ride either on or astride a regular seat attached thereto, having two or more wheels in tandem, including children's bicycles, except a toy vehicle intended for use by young children. For purposes of Chapter 8 (§ 46.2-800 et seq.), a bicycle shall be a vehicle while operated on the highway.

"Bicycle lane" means that portion of a roadway designated by signs and/or pavement markings for the preferential use of bicycles, electric power-assisted bicycles, and mopeds.

"Business district" means the territory contiguous to a highway where 75 percent or more of the property contiguous to a highway, on either side of the highway, for a distance of 300 feet or more along the highway, is occupied by land and buildings actually in use for business purposes.

"Camping trailer" means every vehicle that has collapsible sides and contains sleeping quarters but may or may not contain bathing and cooking facilities and is designed to be drawn by a motor vehicle.

"Cancel" or "cancellation" means that the document or privilege cancelled has been annulled or terminated because of some error, defect, or ineligibility, but the cancellation is without prejudice and reapplication may be made at any time after cancellation.

"Chauffeur" means every person employed for the principal purpose of driving a motor vehicle and every person who drives a motor vehicle while in use as a public or common carrier of persons or property.

"Commission" means the State Corporation Commission.

"Commissioner" means the Commissioner of the Department of Motor Vehicles of the Commonwealth.

"Converted electric vehicle" means any motor vehicle, other than a motorcycle, that has been modified subsequent to its manufacture to replace an internal combustion engine with an electric propulsion system. Such vehicles shall retain their original vehicle identification number, line-make, and model year. A converted electric vehicle shall not be deemed a "reconstructed vehicle" as defined in this section unless it has been materially altered from its original construction by the removal, addition, or substitution of new or used essential parts other than those required for the conversion to electric propulsion.

"Crosswalk" means that part of a roadway at an intersection included within the connections of the lateral lines of the sidewalks on opposite sides of the highway measured from the curbs or, in the absence of curbs, from the edges of the traversable roadway; or any portion of a roadway at an intersection or elsewhere distinctly indicated for pedestrian crossing by lines or other markings on the surface.

"Decal" means a device to be attached to a license plate that validates the license plate for a predetermined registration period.

"Department" means the Department of Motor Vehicles of the Commonwealth.

"Disabled parking license plate" means a license plate that displays the international symbol of access in the same size as the numbers and letters on the plate and in a color that contrasts with the background.

"Disabled veteran" means a veteran who (i) has either lost, or lost the use of, a leg, arm, or hand; (ii) is blind; or (iii) is permanently and totally disabled as certified by the U.S. Veterans Administration. A veteran shall be considered blind if he has a permanent impairment of both eyes to the following extent: (i) central visual acuity of 20/200 or less in the better eye, with corrective lenses, or central visual acuity of more than 20/200, if there is a field defect in which the peripheral field has contracted to such an extent that the widest diameter of visual field subtends an angular distance no greater than 20 degrees in the better eye.

"Driver's license" means any license, including a commercial driver's license as defined in the Virginia Commercial Driver's License Act (§ 46.2-341.1 et seq.), issued under the laws of the Commonwealth authorizing the operation of a motor vehicle.

"Electric personal assistive mobility device" means a self-balancing two-nontandem-wheeled device that is designed to transport only one person and powered by an electric propulsion system that limits the device's maximum speed to 15 miles per hour or less. For purposes of Chapter 8 (§ 46.2-800 et seq.), an electric personal assistive mobility device shall be a vehicle when operated on a highway.

"Electric power-assisted bicycle" means a vehicle that travels on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground and is equipped with (i) pedals that allow propulsion by human power and (ii) an electric motor with an input of no more than 1,000 watts that reduces the pedal effort required of the rider. For the purposes of Chapter 8 (§ 46.2-800 et seq.), an electric power-assisted bicycle shall be a vehicle when operated on a highway.

"Essential parts" means all integral parts and body parts, the removal, alteration, or substitution of which will tend to conceal the identity of a vehicle.

"Farm tractor" means every motor vehicle designed and used as a farm, agricultural, or horticultural implement for drawing plows, mowing machines, and other farm, agricultural, or horticultural machinery and implements including self-propelled mowers designed and used for mowing lawns.

"Farm utility vehicle" means a vehicle that is designed for off-road use and is used as a farm, agricultural, or horticultural service vehicle, generally having a gasoline or diesel engine, four or more wheels, bench seating for the operator and a passenger, a steering wheel for control, and a cargo bed. "Farm utility vehicle" does not include pickup or panel trucks, golf carts, low-speed vehicles, riding lawn mowers, or all-terrain vehicles.

"Federal safety requirements" means applicable provisions of 49 U.S.C. § 30101 et seq. and all administrative regulations and policies adopted pursuant thereto.

"Financial responsibility" means the ability to respond in damages for liability thereafter incurred arising out of the ownership, maintenance, use, or operation of a motor vehicle, in the amounts provided for in § 46.2-472.

"Foreign market vehicle" means any motor vehicle originally manufactured outside the United States, which was not manufactured in accordance with 49 U.S.C. § 30101 et seq. and the policies and regulations adopted pursuant to that Act, and for which a Virginia title or registration is sought.

"Foreign vehicle" means every motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer that is brought into the Commonwealth otherwise than in the ordinary course of business by or through a manufacturer or dealer and that has not been registered in the Commonwealth.

"Golf cart" means a self-propelled vehicle that is designed to transport persons playing golf and their equipment on a golf course.

"Governing body" means the board of supervisors of a county, council of a city, or council of a town, as context may require.

"Gross weight" means the aggregate weight of a vehicle or combination of vehicles and the load thereon.

"Highway" means the entire width between the boundary lines of every way or place open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel in the Commonwealth, including the streets and alleys, and, for law-enforcement purposes, (i) the entire width between the boundary lines of all private roads or private streets that have been specifically designated "highways" by an ordinance adopted by the governing body of the county, city, or town in which such private roads or streets are located and (ii) the entire width between the boundary lines of every way or place used for purposes of vehicular travel on any property owned, leased, or controlled by the United States government and located in the Commonwealth.

"Intersection" means (i) the area embraced within the prolongation or connection of the lateral curblines or, if none, then the lateral boundary lines of the roadways of two highways that join one another at, or approximately at, right angles, or the area within which vehicles traveling on different highways joining at any other angle may come in conflict; (ii) where a highway includes two roadways 30 feet or more apart, then every crossing of each roadway of such divided highway by an intersecting highway shall be regarded as a separate intersection, in the event such intersecting highway also includes two roadways 30 feet or more apart, then every crossing of two roadways of such highways shall be regarded as a separate intersection; or (iii) for purposes only of authorizing installation of traffic-control devices, every crossing of a highway or street at grade by a pedestrian crosswalk.

"Law-enforcement officer" means any officer authorized to direct or regulate traffic or to make arrests for violations of this title or local ordinances authorized by law. For the purposes of access to law-enforcement databases regarding motor vehicle registration and ownership only, this term shall also include city and county commissioners of the revenue and treasurers, together with their duly designated deputies and employees, when such officials are actually engaged in the enforcement of §§ 46.2-752, 46.2-753, and 46.2-754 and local ordinances enacted thereunder.

"License plate" means a device containing letters, numerals, or a combination of both, attached to a motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer to indicate that the vehicle is properly registered with the Department.

"Light" means a device for producing illumination or the illumination produced by the device.

"Low-speed vehicle" means any four-wheeled electrically-powered vehicle, except a motor vehicle or low-speed vehicle that is used exclusively for agricultural or horticultural purposes or a golf cart, whose maximum speed is greater than 20 miles per hour but not greater than 25 miles per hour and is manufactured to comply with safety standards contained in Title 49 of the Code of Federal Regulations, § 571.500.

"Manufactured home" means a structure subject to federal regulation, transportable in one or more sections, which in the traveling mode is eight body feet or more in width or 40 body feet or more in length, or, when erected on site, is 320 or more square feet, and which is built on a permanent chassis and designed to be used as a dwelling with or without a permanent foundation when connected to the required utilities, and includes the plumbing, heating, air conditioning, and electrical systems contained therein.

"Moped" means every vehicle that travels on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground that has (i) a seat that is no less than 24 inches in height, measured from the middle of the seat perpendicular to the ground and (ii) a gasoline, electric, or hybrid motor that displaces less than 50 cubic centimeters. For purposes of this title, a moped shall be a motorcycle when operated at speeds in excess of 35 miles per hour. For purposes of Chapter 8 (§ 46.2-800 et seq.), a moped shall be a vehicle while operated on a highway.

"Motor-driven cycle" means every motorcycle that has a gasoline engine that (i) displaces less than 150 cubic centimeters; (ii) has a seat less than 24 inches in height, measured from the middle of the seat perpendicular to the ground; and (iii) has no manufacturer-issued vehicle identification number.

"Motor home" means every private motor vehicle with a normal seating capacity of not more than 10 persons,

including the driver, designed primarily for use as living quarters for human beings.

"Motor vehicle" means every vehicle as defined in this section that is self-propelled or designed for self-propulsion except as otherwise provided in this title. Any structure designed, used, or maintained primarily to be loaded on or affixed to a motor vehicle to provide a mobile dwelling, sleeping place, office, or commercial space shall be considered a part of a motor vehicle. For the purposes of this title, any device herein defined as a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped shall be deemed not to be a motor vehicle.

"Motorcycle" means every motor vehicle designed to travel on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground and is capable of traveling at speeds in excess of 35 miles per hour. The term "motorcycle" does not include any "electric personal assistive mobility device," "electric power-assisted bicycle," "farm tractor," "golf cart," "moped," "motorized skateboard or scooter," "utility vehicle" or "wheelchair or wheelchair conveyance" as defined in this section.

"Motorized skateboard or scooter" means every vehicle, regardless of the number of its wheels in contact with the ground, that (i) has no seat, but is designed to be stood upon by the operator, (ii) has no manufacturer-issued vehicle identification number, and (iii) is powered by an electric motor having an input of no more than 1,000 watts or a gasoline engine that displaces less than 36 cubic centimeters. The term "motorized skateboard or scooter" includes vehicles with or without handlebars, but does not include "electric personal assistive mobility devices."

"Nonresident" means every person who is not domiciled in the Commonwealth, except: (i) any foreign corporation that is authorized to do business in the Commonwealth by the State Corporation Commission shall be a resident of the Commonwealth for the purpose of this title; in the case of corporations incorporated in the Commonwealth but doing business outside the Commonwealth, only such principal place of business or branches located within the Commonwealth shall be dealt with as residents of the Commonwealth; (ii) a person who becomes engaged in a gainful occupation in the Commonwealth for a period exceeding 60 days shall be a resident for the purposes of this title except for the purposes of Chapter 3 (§ 46.2-300 et seq.); (iii) a person, other than a nonresident student as defined in this section, who has actually resided in the Commonwealth for a period of six months, whether employed or not, or who has registered a motor vehicle, listing an address in the Commonwealth in the application for registration shall be deemed a resident for the purposes of this title, except for the purposes of the Virginia Commercial Driver's License Act (§ 46.2-341.1 et seq.).

"Nonresident student" means every nonresident person who is enrolled as a full-time student in an accredited institution of learning in the Commonwealth and who is not gainfully employed.

"Off-road motorcycle" means every motorcycle designed exclusively for off-road use by an individual rider with not more than two wheels in contact with the ground. Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, for the purposes of this chapter off-road motorcycles shall be deemed to be "motorcycles."

"Operation or use for rent or for hire, for the transportation of passengers, or as a property carrier for compensation," and "business of transporting persons or property" mean any owner or operator of any motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer operating over the highways in the Commonwealth who accepts or receives compensation for the service, directly or indirectly; but these terms do not mean a "truck lessor" as defined in this section and do not include persons or businesses that receive compensation for delivering a product that they themselves sell or produce, where a separate charge is made for delivery of the product or the cost of delivery is included in the sale price of the product, but where the person or business does not derive all or a substantial portion of its income from the transportation of persons or property except as part of a sales transaction.

"Operator" or "driver" means every person who either (i) drives or is in actual physical control of a motor vehicle on a highway or (ii) is exercising control over or steering a vehicle being towed by a motor vehicle.

"Owner" means a person who holds the legal title to a vehicle; however, if a vehicle is the subject of an agreement for its conditional sale or lease with the right of purchase on performance of the conditions stated in the agreement and with an immediate right of possession vested in the conditional vendee or lessee or if a mortgagor of a vehicle is

entitled to possession, then the conditional vendee or lessee or mortgagor shall be the owner for the purpose of this title. In all such instances when the rent paid by the lessee includes charges for services of any nature or when the lease does not provide that title shall pass to the lessee on payment of the rent stipulated, the lessor shall be regarded as the owner of the vehicle, and the vehicle shall be subject to such requirements of this title as are applicable to vehicles operated for compensation. A "truck lessor" as defined in this section shall be regarded as the owner, and his vehicles shall be subject to such requirements of this title as are applicable to vehicles of private carriers.

"Passenger car" means every motor vehicle other than a motorcycle designed and used primarily for the transportation of no more than 10 persons including the driver.

"Payment device" means any credit card as defined in 15 U.S.C. § 1602(k) or any "accepted card or other means of access" set forth in 15 U.S.C. § 1693a(1). For the purposes of this title, this definition shall also include a card that enables a person to pay for transactions through the use of value stored on the card itself.

"Pickup or panel truck" means every motor vehicle designed for the transportation of property and having a registered gross weight of 7,500 pounds or less.

"Private road or driveway" means every way in private ownership and used for vehicular travel by the owner and those having express or implied permission from the owner, but not by other persons.

"Reconstructed vehicle" means every vehicle of a type required to be registered under this title materially altered from its original construction by the removal, addition, or substitution of new or used essential parts. Such vehicles, at the discretion of the Department, shall retain their original vehicle identification number, line-make, and model year. Except as otherwise provided in this title, this definition shall not include a "converted electric vehicle" as defined in this section.

"Replica vehicle" means every vehicle of a type required to be registered under this title not fully constructed by a licensed manufacturer but either constructed or assembled from components. Such components may be from a single vehicle, multiple vehicles, a kit, parts, or fabricated components. The kit may be made up of "major components" as defined in § 46.2-1600, a full body, or a full chassis, or a combination of these parts. The vehicle shall resemble a vehicle of distinctive name, line-make, model, or type as produced by a licensed manufacturer or manufacturer no longer in business and is not a reconstructed or specially constructed vehicle as herein defined.

"Residence district" means the territory contiguous to a highway, not comprising a business district, where 75 percent or more of the property abutting such highway, on either side of the highway, for a distance of 300 feet or more along the highway consists of land improved for dwelling purposes, or is occupied by dwellings, or consists of land or buildings in use for business purposes, or consists of territory zoned residential or territory in residential subdivisions created under Chapter 22 (§ 15.2-2200 et seq.) of Title 15.2.

"Revoke" or "revocation" means that the document or privilege revoked is not subject to renewal or restoration except through reapplication after the expiration of the period of revocation.

"Roadway" means that portion of a highway improved, designed, or ordinarily used for vehicular travel, exclusive of the shoulder. A highway may include two or more roadways if divided by a physical barrier or barriers or an unpaved area.

"Safety zone" means the area officially set apart within a roadway for the exclusive use of pedestrians and that is protected or is so marked or indicated by plainly visible signs.

"School bus" means any motor vehicle, other than a station wagon, automobile, truck, or commercial bus, which is: (i) designed and used primarily for the transportation of pupils to and from public, private or religious schools, or used for the transportation of the mentally or physically handicapped to and from a sheltered workshop; (ii) painted yellow and bears the words "School Bus" in black letters of a specified size on front and rear; and (iii) is equipped with warning devices prescribed in § 46.2-1090. A yellow school bus may have a white roof provided such vehicle is painted in accordance with regulations promulgated by the Department of Education.

"Semitrailer" means every vehicle of the trailer type so designed and used in conjunction with a motor vehicle that some part of its own weight and that of its own load rests on or is carried by another vehicle.

"Shared-use path" means a bikeway that is physically separated from motorized vehicular traffic by an open space or barrier and is located either within the highway right-of-way or within a separate right-of-way. Shared-use paths may also be used by pedestrians, skaters, users of wheel chairs or wheel chair conveyances, joggers, and other nonmotorized users.

"Shoulder" means that part of a highway between the portion regularly traveled by vehicular traffic and the lateral curbline or ditch.

"Sidewalk" means the portion of a street between the curb lines, or the lateral lines of a roadway, and the adjacent property lines, intended for use by pedestrians.

"Snowmobile" means a self-propelled vehicle designed to travel on snow or ice, steered by skis or runners, and supported in whole or in part by one or more skis, belts, or cleats.

"Special construction and forestry equipment" means any vehicle which is designed primarily for highway construction, highway maintenance, earth moving, timber harvesting or other construction or forestry work and which is not designed for the transportation of persons or property on a public highway.

"Specially constructed vehicle" means any vehicle that was not originally constructed under a distinctive name, make, model, or type by a generally recognized manufacturer of vehicles and not a reconstructed vehicle as herein defined.

"Stinger-steered automobile or watercraft transporter" means an automobile or watercraft transporter configured as a semitrailer combination wherein the fifth wheel is located on a drop frame behind and below the rearmost axle of the power unit.

"Superintendent" means the Superintendent of the Department of State Police of the Commonwealth.

"Suspend" or "suspension" means that the document or privilege suspended has been temporarily withdrawn, but may be reinstated following the period of suspension unless it has expired prior to the end of the period of suspension.

"Tow truck" means a motor vehicle for hire (i) designed to lift, pull, or carry another vehicle by means of a hoist or other mechanical apparatus and (ii) having a manufacturer's gross vehicle weight rating of at least 10,000 pounds. "Tow truck" also includes vehicles designed with a ramp on wheels and a hydraulic lift with a capacity to haul or tow another vehicle, commonly referred to as "rollbacks." "Tow truck" does not include any "automobile or watercraft transporter," "stinger-steered automobile or watercraft transporter," or "tractor truck" as those terms are defined in this section.

"Towing and recovery operator" means a person engaged in the business of (i) removing disabled vehicles, parts of vehicles, their cargoes, and other objects to facilities for repair or safekeeping and (ii) restoring to the highway or other location where they either can be operated or removed to other locations for repair or safekeeping vehicles that have come to rest in places where they cannot be operated.

"Toy vehicle" means any motorized or propellant-driven device that has no manufacturer-issued vehicle identification number, that is designed or used to carry any person or persons, on any number of wheels, bearings, glides, blades, runners, or a cushion of air. The term does not include electric personal assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, mopeds, or motorcycles, nor does it include any nonmotorized or nonpropellant-driven devices such as bicycles, roller skates, or skateboards.

"Tractor truck" means every motor vehicle designed and used primarily for drawing other vehicles and not so constructed as to carry a load other than a part of the load and weight of the vehicle attached thereto.

"Traffic infraction" means a violation of law punishable as provided in § 46.2-113, which is neither a felony nor a misdemeanor.

"Traffic lane" or "lane" means that portion of a roadway designed or designated to accommodate the forward movement of a single line of vehicles.

"Trailer" means every vehicle without motive power designed for carrying property or passengers wholly on its own structure and for being drawn by a motor vehicle, including manufactured homes.

"Truck" means every motor vehicle designed to transport property on its own structure independent of any other vehicle and having a registered gross weight in excess of 7,500 pounds.

"Truck lessor" means a person who holds the legal title to any motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer that is the subject of a bona fide written lease for a term of one year or more to another person, provided that: (i) neither the lessor nor the lessee is a common carrier by motor vehicle or restricted common carrier by motor vehicle or contract carrier by motor vehicle as defined in § 46.2-2000; (ii) the leased motor vehicle, trailer, or semitrailer is used exclusively for the transportation of property of the lessee; (iii) the lessor is not employed in any capacity by the lessee; (iv) the operator of the leased motor vehicle is a bona fide employee of the lessee and is not employed in any capacity by the lessor; and (v) a true copy of the lease, verified by affidavit of the lessor, is filed with the Commissioner.

"Utility vehicle" means a motor vehicle that is (i) designed for off-road use, (ii) powered by an engine of no more than 25 horsepower, and (iii) used for general maintenance, security, agricultural, or horticultural purposes. "Utility vehicle" does not include all-terrain vehicles as defined in this section, riding lawn mowers, or any other vehicle whose definition is included in this section.

"Vehicle" means every device in, on or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn on a highway, except devices moved by human power or used exclusively on stationary rails or tracks. For the purposes of Chapter 8 (§ 46.2-800 et seq.), bicycles, electric personal assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, and mopeds shall be vehicles while operated on a highway.

"Wheel chair or wheel chair conveyance" means a chair or seat equipped with wheels, typically used to provide mobility for persons who, by reason of physical disability, are otherwise unable to move about as pedestrians. The term includes both three-wheeled and four-wheeled devices. So long as it is operated only as provided in § 46.2-677, a self-propelled wheel chair or self-propelled wheel chair conveyance shall not be considered a motor vehicle.

§ 46.2-800. Riding bicycles, electric personal assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, or mopeds; riding or driving animals.

Every person riding a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, moped, or an animal or driving an animal on a highway shall be subject to the provisions of this chapter and shall have all of the rights and duties applicable to the driver of a vehicle, unless the context of the provision clearly indicates otherwise.

The provisions of subsections A and C of § 46.2-920 applicable to operation of emergency vehicles under emergency conditions shall also apply, mutatis mutandis, to bicycles, electric personal assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, and mopeds operated under similar emergency conditions by law-enforcement officers.

§ 46.2-833. Traffic lights; penalty.

A. Signals by traffic lights shall be as follows:

Steady red indicates that moving traffic shall stop and remain stopped as long as the red signal is shown, except in the direction indicated by a lighted green arrow.

Green indicates the traffic shall move in the direction of the signal and remain in motion as long as the green signal is given, except that such traffic shall yield to other vehicles and pedestrians lawfully within the intersection.

Steady amber indicates that a change is about to be made in the direction of the moving of traffic. When the amber signal is shown, traffic which has not already entered the intersection, including the crosswalks, shall stop if it is not reasonably safe to continue, but traffic which has already entered the intersection shall continue to move until the intersection has been cleared. The amber signal is a warning that the steady red signal is imminent.

Flashing red indicates that traffic shall stop before entering an intersection.

Flashing amber indicates that traffic may proceed through the intersection or past such signal with reasonable care under the circumstances.

- B. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, if a driver of a motorcycle or moped or a bicycle rider approaches an intersection that is controlled by a traffic light, the driver or rider may proceed through the intersection on a steady red light only if the driver or rider (i) comes to a full and complete stop at the intersection for two complete cycles of the traffic light or for two minutes, whichever is shorter, (ii) exercises due care as provided by law, (iii) otherwise treats the traffic control device as a stop sign, (iv) determines that it is safe to proceed, and (v) yields the right of way to the driver of any vehicle approaching on such other highway from either direction.
- C. If the traffic lights controlling an intersection are out of service because of a power failure or other event that prevents the giving of signals by the traffic lights, the drivers of vehicles approaching such an intersection shall proceed as though such intersection were controlled by a stop sign on all approaches. The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to: intersections controlled by portable stop signs, intersections with law-enforcement officers or other authorized persons directing traffic, or intersections controlled by traffic lights displaying flashing red or flashing amber lights as provided in subsection A.
- D. The driver of any motor vehicle may be detained or arrested for a violation of this section if the detaining law-enforcement officer is in uniform, displays his badge of authority, and (i) has observed the violation or (ii) has received a message by radio or other wireless telecommunication device from another law-enforcement officer who observed the violation. In the case of a person being detained or arrested based on a radio message, the message shall be sent immediately after the violation is observed, and the observing officer shall furnish the license number or other positive identification of the vehicle to the detaining officer.

Violation of any provision of this section shall constitute a traffic infraction punishable by a fine of no more than \$350.

§ 46.2-839. Passing bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, moped, animal, or animal-drawn vehicle.

Any driver of any vehicle overtaking a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, moped, animal, or animal-drawn vehicle proceeding in the same direction shall pass at a reasonable speed at least two feet to the left of the overtaken bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, moped, animal, or animal-drawn vehicle and shall not again proceed to the right side of the highway until safely clear of such overtaken bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, moped, animal, or animal-drawn vehicle.

§ 46.2-847. Left turns by bicycles, electric personal assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, and mopeds.

A person riding a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped and intending to turn left shall either follow a course described in § 46.2-846 or make the turn as provided in this section.

A person riding a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped and intending to turn left shall approach the turn as close as practicable to the right curb or edge of the roadway. After proceeding across the intersecting roadway, the rider shall comply with traffic signs or signals and continue his turn as close as practicable to the right curb or edge of the roadway being entered.

Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this section, the Commonwealth Transportation Board and local authorities, in their respective jurisdictions, may cause official traffic control devices to be placed at intersections to direct that a specific course be traveled by turning bicycles, electric personal assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, and mopeds. When such devices are so placed, no person shall turn a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped other than as directed by such devices.

§ 46.2-849. How signals given.

- A. Signals required by § 46.2-848 shall be given by means of the hand and arm or by some mechanical or electrical device approved by the Superintendent, in the manner specified in this section. Whenever the signal is given by means of the hand and arm, the driver shall indicate his intention to start, stop, turn, or partly turn by extending the hand and arm beyond the left side of the vehicle in the manner following:
- 1. For left turn or to pull to the left, the arm shall be extended in a horizontal position straight from and level with the shoulder;
- 2. For right turn or to pull to the right, the arm shall be extended upward;
- 3. For slowing down or stopping, the arm shall be extended downward.
- B. Wherever the lawful speed is more than 35 miles per hour, such signals shall be given continuously for a distance of at least 100 feet, and in all other cases at least 50 feet, before slowing down, stopping, turning, or partly turning.
- C. A person riding a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped shall signal his intention to stop or turn. Such signals, however, need not be given continuously if both hands are needed in the control or operation of the bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped.
- D. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this section, a person operating a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped may signal a right turn or pull to the right by extending the right hand and arm in a horizontal position straight from and level with the shoulder beyond the right side of the bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped, and may signal slowing down or stopping by extending the right arm downward.

§ 46.2-856. Passing two vehicles abreast.

A person shall be guilty of reckless driving who passes or attempts to pass two other vehicles abreast, moving in the same direction, except on highways having separate roadways of three or more lanes for each direction of travel, or on designated one-way streets or highways. This section shall not apply, however, to a motor vehicle passing two other vehicles when one or both of such other vehicles is a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped; nor shall this section apply to a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped passing two other vehicles.

§ 46.2-857. Driving two abreast in a single lane.

A person shall be guilty of reckless driving who drives any motor vehicle so as to be abreast of another vehicle in a lane designed for one vehicle, or drives any motor vehicle so as to travel abreast of any other vehicle traveling in a lane designed for one vehicle. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit two two-wheeled motorcycles from traveling abreast while traveling in a lane designated for one vehicle. In addition, this section shall not apply to (i) any validly authorized parade, motorcade, or motorcycle escort; (ii) a motor vehicle traveling in the same lane of traffic as a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped; nor shall it apply to (iii) any vehicle when lawfully overtaking and passing one or more vehicles traveling in the same direction in a separate lane.

§ 46.2-905. Riding bicycles, electric personal assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, motor-driven cycles, and mopeds on roadways and bicycle paths.

Any person operating a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped on a roadway at less than the normal speed of traffic at the time and place under conditions then existing shall ride as close as safely practicable to the right curb or edge of the roadway, except under any of the following circumstances:

- 1. When overtaking and passing another vehicle proceeding in the same direction;
- 2. When preparing for a left turn at an intersection or into a private road or driveway;
- 3. When reasonably necessary to avoid conditions including, but not limited to, fixed or moving objects, parked or moving vehicles, pedestrians, animals, surface hazards, or substandard width lanes that make it unsafe to continue along the right curb or edge;
- 4. When avoiding riding in a lane that must turn or diverge to the right; and
- 5. When riding upon a one-way road or highway, a person may also ride as near the left-hand curb or edge of such roadway as safely practicable.

For purposes of this section, a "substandard width lane" is a lane too narrow for a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, motorized skateboard or scooter, or moped and another vehicle to pass safely side by side within the lane.

Persons riding bicycles, electric personal assistive mobility devices, or electric power-assisted bicycles on a highway shall not ride more than two abreast. Persons riding two abreast shall not impede the normal and reasonable movement of traffic, shall move into a single file formation as quickly as is practicable when being overtaken from the rear by a faster moving vehicle, and, on a laned roadway, shall ride in a single lane.

Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, the Department of Conservation and Recreation shall permit the operation of electric personal assistive mobility devices on any bicycle path or trail designated by the Department for such use.

A person riding a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, motorized skateboard or scooter, or moped may overtake and pass another vehicle on either the left or right side, staying in the same lane as the overtaken vehicle, or changing to a different lane, or riding off the roadway as necessary to pass with safety.

A person riding a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, motorized skateboard or scooter, or moped may overtake and pass another vehicle only under conditions that permit the movement to be made with safety.

A person riding a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, motorized skateboard or scooter, or moped shall not travel between two lanes of traffic moving in the same direction, except where one lane is a separate turn lane or a mandatory turn lane.

Except as otherwise provided in this section, a person riding a bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, motorized skateboard or scooter, or moped shall comply with all rules applicable to the driver of a motor vehicle when overtaking and passing.

§ 46.2-1015. Lights on bicycles, electric personal assistive mobility devices, electric power-assisted bicycles, and mopeds.

A. Every bicycle, electric personal assistive mobility device, electric power-assisted bicycle, and moped when in use between sunset and sunrise shall be equipped with a headlight on the front emitting a white light visible in clear weather from a distance of at least 500 feet to the front and a red reflector visible from a distance of at least 600 feet to the rear when directly in front of lawful lower beams of headlights on a motor vehicle. Such lights and reflector shall be of types approved by the Superintendent.

In addition to the foregoing provisions of this section, a bicycle or its rider may be equipped with lights or reflectors. These lights may be steady burning or blinking.

B. Every bicycle, or its rider, shall be equipped with a taillight on the rear emitting a red light plainly visible in clear weather from a distance of at least 500 feet to the rear when in use between sunset and sunrise and operating on any highway with a speed limit of 35 mph or greater. Any such taillight shall be of a type approved by the Superintendent.

The provisions of this section shall not apply to the driver of any emergency vehicle as defined in § 46.2-920.

§ 46.2-1081. Slow-moving vehicle emblems.

- A. Every farm tractor, self-propelled unit of farm equipment or implement of husbandry, and any other vehicle designed for operation at speeds not in excess of 25 miles per hour or normally operated at speeds not in excess of 25 miles per hour, shall display a triangular slow-moving vehicle emblem on the rear of the vehicle when traveling on a public highway at any time of the day or night.
- B. Should a slow-moving vehicle tow a unit on a public highway, then the towing vehicle or the towed unit shall be equipped with the slow-moving vehicle emblem as follows:
- 1. If the towed unit or any load thereon obscures the slow-moving vehicle emblem on the towing vehicle, the towed unit shall be equipped with a slow-moving vehicle emblem, in which case the towing vehicle need not display such emblem.
- 2. If the slow-moving vehicle emblem on the towing vehicle is not obscured by the towed unit or any load thereon, then either or both such vehicles may be equipped with such emblem.
- C. The standards and specifications for the slow-moving vehicle emblem and the position of mounting of the emblem shall conform to standards and specifications adopted by the American Society of Agricultural Engineers, the Society of Automotive Engineers, the American National Standards Institute, Inc., or the federal Department of Transportation.
- D. The use of the slow-moving vehicle emblem shall be restricted to the uses specified in this title.
- E. The provisions of this section shall not apply to bicycles, electric power-assisted bicycles, or mopeds. Display of a slow-moving vehicle emblem on a bicycle, electric power-assisted bicycle, or moped shall not be deemed a violation of this section.

Cycling Laws

Bicycles have the same rights and responsibilities as motor vehicles when ridden on the road in Virginia.

- · Follow rules that apply to motor vehicles
- · Obey all traffic signs, signals, lights, and markings
- · Ride on the right, with traffic
- Unless the travel lane is too narrow to share with a motor vehicle, stay as far to the right as safely possible or use the shoulder
- Ride no more than two bicyclists side-by-side
- · Ride single-file when moving slower than motor vehicle traffic
- · Obey signs that restrict riding on Interstate highways and on limited access roads
- · Yield to pedestrians
- · Call to pedestrians when approaching from behind and to pass
- · Use hand signals for turns and stops
- When turning, use motor vehicle turn lanes
- · Keep one hand on the handlebars when carrying articles
- Don't carry adults on bicycles not built for more than one
- · Carry children securely in special seats or trailers
- · Don't wear earphones in both ears
- Use white headlamps visible from 500 feet when bicycling between sunset and sunrise
- · Use rear reflectors at night; if using roads with speed limits of 35 mph or more, use a red taillight visible from 600 feet
- Be sure brakes work properly
- Stop when involved in a crash that involves injury or damage
- Report name & other pertinent information to police or others involved in a crash
- Report property accidents to police within 24 hours
- · Obey local ordinances for riding on sidewalks, wearing helmets, and having a bicycle license

Bicyclists, motorists, and pedestrians all have rights and responsibilities regarding roadways.


Sharing the Road means respecting our differences. It means not descriminating against other roadway user types.

We've sadly become an almost 100% car-centric society, forgetting the basic modes of transportation that are good not only for the environment, but for our bodies.

To Share the Road:

- >Give 3 feet of space when passing a bicycle or walker/runner.
- >Be predictable. Use turn signals and hand signals, don't make sudden, random movements.
- >Be engaged. Don't drive, ride, or walk distracted.
- >Always obey traffic signals. They work to protect everyone and keep orderly flow.
- >Slow down around others. Take a second, save a life.
- >Know where and how you are allowed to drive, ride and walk. Read up on cycling and pedestrian laws.
- >Be smart on the road. Be visible, use lights, wear bright colors and reflective materials.

Remember that people that are riding, walking, and running are doing it for many reasons. Some are trying to get healthy. Some are reducing their stress. Some are doing their part to support a healthy environment. Others have no other means of transportation. Regardless, everyone from the car driver to the walker deserves a safe and accessible place to travel.

Cycling Tips

Cycling can be fun, safe and enjoyable when you do it right.

Bicyclists can follow simple tips to make their riding safer and more fun. For additional tips and diagrams visit our website www.sharingtheroadinvirginia.org

Ride in a straight line

Bicyclists should generally ride single file. Be predictable. In particular, don't weave in and out of parked cars – bicyclists may disappear from motorists' sight when weaving, and get squeezed when they need to merge back into car traffic. To increase visibility and predictability, occupy more of the travel lane (see "Take the Lane" below) if it is narrow or if traffic is moving slowly.

Likewise, motorists should stay in their lanes and not swerve into bike lanes.

Take the lane

If there is no shoulder or bike lane, and the travel lane is narrow, take the lane by riding closer to the center of the lane. This will prevent motorists from passing you when there isn't room. You should also take the lane when you're traveling at the same speed as traffic. This will keep you out of motorists' blind spots and reduce conflicts with right-turning traffic.

Riding side-by-side

Two bicyclists may ride side-by-side, but only if they don't impede other traffic, or if they need to "take the lane" as described above. If traffic doesn't have enough room to pass, ride single file.

Keep your distance

Don't ride too close to parked cars. If you do, you risk having a door open in front of you! Ride 3- to 5 feet from parked cars to say out of their door-opening zone. Be alert as to whether a motorist is in a parked car in front of you, and ride slower if necessary. If streets are narrow, take the lane.

Ride right

Like motorists, it is important that bicyclists use the right lane to ride with traffic instead of against traffic. Bicyclists should not tightly hug the curb or road edge since hitting the curb or slipping off the road edge could cause a bicyclist to lose his or her balance and fall into traffic. Bicyclists may ride on the shoulder.

Choose a lane

Like motorists, bicyclists should stay in the lane that is marked for the direction they are traveling. Don't ride in the turn lane if not planning to turn.

Never ride against traffic

Wrong-way bicycle riding is against the law and is a leading cause of crashes. Bicyclists may think they are safe if looking at on-coming traffic, but it is more dangerous because if hit the impact would be greater. Also, wrong-way riding gives bicyclists and motorists less reaction time. In addition, when wrong-way riding, bicyclists can't see street signs and traffic signals, and motorists are not expecting bicyclists approaching from that direction.

REQUEST FOR PUBLIC COMMENT

The Regional Cooperation Act, passed by the General Assembly in 1995, places great emphasis on the planning district commissions serving as a forum for discussion of regional issues and identification of ways to promote regional cooperation. The Code of Virginia, Section 36-139.7, requires that the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) conduct a periodic review of the boundaries of planning districts. It requires that DHCD consider, at a minimum, the following criteria:

- recognition of communities of interest among the governmental subdivisions;
- recognition of common economic and market interests;
- ease of communications and commissioner travel time;
- federal metropolitan statistical area boundaries;
- a population base adequate to ensure financial viability;
- geographic factors and natural boundaries; and
- the wishes of the governmental subdivisions within or surrounding the planning district, as expressed by resolution of the governing body.

DHCD will conduct its review in two phases: a period of written public comment and, if warranted, public hearings.

WRITTEN PUBLIC COMMENT: This notice begins the period for written public comment. Letters should concisely address the need for retaining or modifying the current boundaries of a given planning district using the criteria outlined above or other factors that affect the viability or effectiveness of the planning district commission in carrying out its duties. In the event that there are sufficient and compelling requests for boundary adjustments, DHCD will conduct public hearings within the affected planning districts. DHCD staff will consider all comments received through written responses and public hearings and, subject to the provisions of the Administrative Process Act, make adjustments to the boundaries of planning districts as it deems advisable.

Any such hearings will be advertised in local newspapers and notices will be sent to local government and planning district offices. The purpose of such hearings will be to gather information from local officials, organizations and residents as to why a boundary adjustment is warranted and the advantages such an adjustment would provide to each affected planning district in order to ensure that all affected parties have had adequate opportunity to share their views and perspectives on any proposed adjustment.

2012 Legislative Priorities And Positions For Clarke County

Issue: Chesapeake Bay TMDL

- Clarke County believes there must be a way to have clean rivers, a clean Bay and a viable agricultural community. Clarke recognizes that the Commonwealth is still negotiating with EPA on this issue so it is difficult to make specific comments. However, Clarke wants to see a supportable plan with adequate funding and/or regulations that will ultimately protect our rivers and the Bay at a reasonable cost to farmers, towns and citizens.
- Clarke County supports continued state funding of programs that will protect our groundwater, rivers and the Bay.

Issue: Eminent Domain

 Clarke County supports property rights but feels the wording of the currently proposed Constitutional Amendment is too broad and vague.

Issue: Voting Districts

 Clarke County requests that the boundary line between House Districts 10 and 33 be revised to match the line between the local election Districts. This change would affect about 150 voters and would dramatically ease the burden on local election officials.

Issue: State Yearend Surplus Funds

 Clarke County understands why the Commonwealth cut \$60 million in local support to localities during the Great Recession; we all had to share the burden as things got bad. However, Clarke feels localities were not treated fairly by the State as the economy improved as virtually none of the State's end-of-year surplus was used to restore lost aid to localities. As it stands now, the Commonwealth is forcing a "back door" tax increase on its citizens; a regressive tax increase based on property values, not income.

Issue: Education

- Clarke County asks the Commonwealth to take steps to fully fund its share of the true cost of K-12 public education without reducing other parts of the budget affecting local government or shifting costs from the Commonwealth to localities.
- Clarke County supports a change to the Composite Index, which would cause
 it to reflect land use values. Additionally, the income figure used to calculate
 the Composite Index should be average median income, not total countywide
 income.

Issue: Groundwater Quality

- Clarke County is adamantly opposed to HB 2185 which would effectively eliminate onsite review by the Health Department of soil work submitted by licensed onsite soil evaluator (OSE) or a professional engineer. This onsite review is necessary to insure adherence to local ordinance regulations.
- Clarke County supports legislation that would allow counties to exempt areas
 within their jurisdiction from installing alternative onsite sewage systems due
 to environmental conditions. Moreover, Clarke believes the inspectors
 (operators) of alternative systems (AOSS) should be required to both sample
 the effluent of their AOSS and submit a written report to the Health
 Department annually. In addition, each local Health Department should be
 required to make an annual random sample of 10% of the AOSS in their area.
- Clarke County is very concerned about the environmental hazards associated with natural gas drilling in Marcellus Shale. Clarke believes that localities should have some control over natural gas drilling. Moreover, Clarke County believes state regulations with regard to drilling in Marcellus Shale should be strengthened.

Issue: Cost and Revenue Shifting

- Clarke County is opposed to the gradual shifting of costs that has taken place over the past several years, especially the large cost shifting that occurred in the FY 2011-12 biennium budget with the reduction in aid to localities. With each passing year the County has been required to incrementally subsidize a variety of traditionally state funded (or state shared) costs (Compensation Board, Registrar, Cooperative Extension, Line of Duty, Social Services and the court system). This cost shifting places a tremendous burden on a regressive real estate tax system. Cost shifting must stop and/or the tax system must be reformed to reduce the burden on the Real Estate tax.
- Clarke County calls on the Commonwealth to fully fund state mandated retirement and employment benefits, including VRS and Line of Duty costs.
- Clarke County opposes any reduction in aid to localities (or the fees localities are allowed to charge) unless the tax system is reformed to reduce the burden on the Real Estate tax.

Issue: Tax Reform

- Clarke County supports tax reform as long as:
 - It ends up reducing Clarke's dependence on the real estate tax.
 - Any change that reduces or eliminates an existing local funding source is offset by a new or expanded source.
 - It gives equal taxing authority to cities and counties.
 - It protects the Commonwealth's General Fund. The General Fund should be used for core government functions such as public education (K-12)

and higher education), health and human services, public safety, natural resources and environmental services. Transportation maintenance and improvements should be paid by user fees.

- Clarke County supports reform of the BPOL tax as long as it meets the above criterion.
- Clarke County opposes repeal of the Machinery and Tools tax.
- Clarke County supports passage of the Streamlined Sales Tax Project agreement (SST) by both the Federal and State governments so as to compel all out-of-state vendors to collect and remit sales taxes due by Virginia citizens to the Commonwealth and it localities.
- Clarke County supports the implementation of a local option transfer tax for all property sales.

Issue: Broadband Access

 Clarke County asks the Commonwealth to find ways to encourage private vendors to provide rural universal access to broadband Internet services in rural communities with hilly terrain.

Issue: Transportation •

- Clarke County believes that transportation improvements should be funded by user fees, not the General Fund. General Fund revenues should not be used for transportation as doing so will undoubtedly take away from the funding of education, natural resources, etc.
- Clarke County does not support the devolution or cost shifting of transportation responsibilities to counties, especially smaller counties, like Clarke, that do not have the scale of work to allow for the efficient provision of services.
- Clarke County supports the concept of Urban Development Areas (UDAs) to better control the cost of transportation but believes that the creation of UDAs should be tied to mandatory development restrictions (e.g. downzoning) in areas outside of the UDA.

Issue: Biosolids

 Clarke County supports changes to biosolids regulations that would give localities more control over how and where biosolids are spread within their jurisdiction.

Issue: Growth Management

 Clarke County believes that the authority to plan and regulate land use should remain with local governing bodies and Clarke County opposes any legislation that would weaken that authority. Further the General Assembly

should grant localities the tools necessary to adequately meet citizens' increasing, education, public safety and other vital public infrastructure needs that are driven by development. Such additional tools may include broad impact fee authority for all counties, adequate public facilities provisions in subdivision ordinances, state funds for purchase of development rights and a real estate transfer tax.

- Clarke County supports full funding of the purchase of Development Rights
 Program as has been suggested by the Virginia Department of Agriculture
 and the Farm Bureau.
- Clarke County supports increasing the caps on the Commonwealth's tax credit program for the donation of easements as well as increased sanctions and penalties for fraudulent appraisals.

Issue: Water Supply Planning

Clarke County believes that science, rather than power politics, should govern
the approval of the local and regional water supply plans (due 2011).
Moreover, it is important that the Commonwealth honor the targets set in the
minimum in-stream flow studies of the Shenandoah River so as to protect
both the aquatic life in the river and the recreational use of the river.

Issue: County Control and Rights

- Clarke County opposes legislation that exempts agricultural lands from local regulation of non-ag business activities such as restaurants, entertainment, festivals, etc.
- Clarke County believes the Dillon Rule should be abandoned or modified and opposes any legislation that would reduce county rights.

Issue: Waste and Litter Control

- Clarke County asks the Commonwealth to devolve to local governments the
 power to control the commercial use of throw-away plastic bags. The major
 economic and environmental costs resulting from the nearly universal use of
 throwaway plastic bags are numerous. They adversely impact wildlife and
 livestock, clog storm drains, pollute waterways, and litter roadways, fields and
 forests. Clarke County joins with other local jurisdictions in requesting the
 power to manage and control the commercial use of plastic bags in
 accordance with local needs.
- Clarke County supports a Beverage Container Bill.

Issue: Power Lines

Clarke County supports legislation that would require all or part of new transmission lines to be placed underground if economic and environmental studies show that undergrounding is a viable alternative to overhead. Moreover, Clarke believes that any such economic analysis consider the cost

impact on adjacent property owners and that the environmental studies consider the health hazards from EMF, the impact on wildlife and historic sites, the visual impact, etc.

 Clarke County opposes the construction of power lines that do not benefit the region through which the line will traverse.

Issue: Affordable Housing

 Clarke County supports increased federal and state funding and appropriate incentives to encourage the provision of affordable housing.

Issue: Energy Efficiency and Conservation

Clarke County supports legislative measures (regulations) to increase the
efficient use of energy throughout the Commonwealth, both for governmental
operations and for the private sector.

Issue: Hunting

• Clarke County believes the Commonwealth's hunting rules are fine the way they are now and sees no reason why they should be changed.

Special Note: The Finance Committee completed items 1 and 2, below, at their meeting on November 14, then continued the balance of the finance agenda to November 16, subsequent to the publication of the board agenda. Therefore, the Finance Committee recommendations will be made verbally at the Board of Supervisors meeting on November 20.

- 1. **Sheriff's Department Leave Payouts.** The Sheriff presented information at the meeting regarding leave payouts. The Finance Committee requested leave information for all agencies in order to consider its policy on leave payouts.
- 2. Sheriff's Telephone System Replacement. The Sheriff presented information at the meeting regarding the need to replace the current telephone system. The system is six years old, but the vendor is forcing both hardware and software upgrades in order to continue maintenance. The system replacement received a low bid of \$172,000, while the grant received for the replacement was \$117,000, leaving a shortfall of \$55,000. The Finance Committee directed the Sheriff and Joint Services Director to fund the shortfall from already appropriated capital projects relating to Sheriff's equipment, cruiser replacements, and mobile radio replacements.
- 3. Capital Projects Carryover from FY 12 to FY13. "Be it resolved that the unexpended budgeted expenditure and appropriations, as well as revenue estimates, that remained at the end of FY 12 in the Government and School Capital Projects Funds, be carried forward to FY 12, as outlined in the attached tables."
- 4. Conservation Easement Carryover from FY 12 to FY 13. "Be it resolved that \$227,639 of unexpended budgeted expenditure and appropriations, as well as estimated revenue of \$64,780 and appropriated fund balance of \$181,460, that remained at the end of FY 12 in the Conservation Easement Fund, be carried forward to FY 13."
- 5. **FY 12 Year-end Fund Balance Designations.** The attached statement shows the General Fund balance at the end of FY 12, along with certain changes to the fund balance designations. The approved designations will appear in the FY 12 Financial Report. "Be it resolved that the attached designations be approved for inclusion in the FY 12 Financial Report."
- 6. Supplemental Appropriations FY 12. "Be it resolved that the following adjustments be made to FY 12 Expenditure, Appropriations, and Revenue accounts:

- 7. **Supplemental Appropriations FY 13.** The threshold for an FY 13 budget public hearing occurs when the total of budget adjustments since the previous public hearing exceeds \$224,800. The following budget adjustments are therefore recommended in order:
 - a. "Be it resolved that FY 13 budgeted expenditures for the School Operating Fund be increased \$61,000, and the same appropriated, and that \$61,000 in additional revenue to the School Operating fund be recognized, all for the purpose of establishing a personnel contingency".
 - b. "Be it resolved that FY 13 budgeted expenditures and appropriations of \$30,000 for the School Capital Projects Fund be transferred to the School Operating Fund to cover the cost of a high speed data line to Boyce Elementary School."
 - c. "Be it resolved that FY 13 budgeted expenditures and appropriations for the General Government Capital Projects fund of \$60,339 be transferred from the Economic Development Capital Project to the Plan Updates capital project for employment of a consultant to assist with the economic development aspect of the Comprehensive Plan Update."
 - d. "Be it resolved that FY 13 budgeted expenditures for the General Government Capital Projects Fund be increased \$200,000, and the same appropriated, and that \$200,000 in additional revenue from the Commonwealth be recognized, all for the purpose of passing through economic develop funds to Berryville Graphics via the Clarke County Industrial Development Authority".
 - e. "Be it resolved that FY 13 budgeted expenditures for the Circuit Court Clerk be increased \$104,629, and the same appropriated, and that \$104,629 in Commonwealth revenue from the Compensation Board be recognized, all for the purpose of processing the Circuit Court Clerk's payroll and benefits for the remainder of the fiscal year."

Note that since subsection b is subject to a public hearing to take place in the evening, both b and c would need to be decided in the evening.

ZONING AND SUBDIVISION ORDINANCE TEXT AMENDMENTS (TA-12-04) Merger of Parcels

November 20, 2012 Board of Supervisors Meeting –PUBLIC HEARING SUPPLEMENTARY STAFF REPORT #2 – Department of Planning

The purpose of this staff report is to provide information to the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors to assist them in reviewing this proposed ordinance amendment. It may be useful to members of the general public interested in this proposed amendment.

Description:

Proposed text amendments to add new language, §10-E Merger of Parcels; to amend Article 2, Usage and Definitions; and to amend §12-E, Vacation of Plat, of the Clarke County Subdivision Ordinance; and to amend Article 9, Definitions, of the Clarke County Zoning Ordinance. The purpose of the text amendments is to require any merger of parcels to be reviewed and approved via final plat by the Zoning Administrator for compliance with County ordinances. The text amendments would also amend the current definition of "merger" in the Ordinances to distinguish the transaction from a "vacation," and would correct a code reference error in §12-E of the Subdivision Ordinance.

Requested Action:

Recommend adoption of the proposed text amendments. A public hearing has been advertised for the November 20, 2012 Board of Supervisors regular meeting.

Planning Commission Recommendation:

Following a duly advertised Public Hearing on September 7, 2012, the Planning Commission voted 8-0 (Staelin, Kreider, McFillen absent) to recommend adoption of the text amendments.

Staff Discussion/Analysis:

The proposed text amendments are presented by Planning Staff to reconcile a technical issue between the Zoning and Subdivision Ordinances regarding mergers of parcels. Currently, there is no ordinance requirement that Planning Staff review and approve a plat when a property owner proposes to merge two or more existing lots. An applicant need only to submit a plat along with a deed or affidavit to the Clerk's office for recordation – no Planning Department approval is required.

At the Board of Supervisors' October 16, 2012 meeting, Planning Staff addressed specific questions raised by Board members at their September 18, 2012 meeting. Board members were concerned that requiring merger applicants to provide a boundary survey of properties being merged could result in substantial expense in the form of survey costs to the applicants. Board members questioned whether mergers could be reviewed and approved by Staff by having the applicant provide a deed instead of a plat and, if not, could Staff require that the plat show the boundary line or lines being eliminated instead of requiring the entire parcels to be surveyed. Staff noted that they discussed the matter with the County Attorney and confirmed that a deed-based approach could be used over a plat-based approach but with some possible disadvantages.

A complete discussion of this issue is provided in the previous Staff Report (Supplementary Report #1). The Board provided no additional direction to Staff on this issue.

Staff also noted that a merger plat can be accepted that identifies the properties to be merged and the boundary line or lines to be eliminated without requiring all property boundaries to be shown on the survey. To clarify this, Staff proposed language to proposed 10-E-B below stating that the plat of merger shall depict "at a minimum the boundary lines that are proposed to be eliminated." Chairman Hobert requested deletion of the words, "at a minimum," as being potentially confusing and unnecessary. Staff agrees with the change and it is reflected below in the proposed text amendment language.

The Board also asked for an estimate on how much a landowner could expect to spend on surveying costs for a merger plat. Staff discussed this question with Dunn Land Surveys who provided a cost range of between \$250 and \$400 dependent upon how much information is currently on record that could be used to generate a compiled plat. On a related note, Staff at this time does not recommend a new administrative fee for reviewing merger plats under these proposed text amendments. For comparison, the fee for a boundary line adjustment plat is \$500.

Staff Recommendation:

Staff has no outstanding concerns with the adoption of the proposed text amendments as presented below.

<u>AMENDMENT TEXT</u> (new or amended language in bold italics with strikethroughs where applicable):

Subdivision Ordinance:

10-E MERGER

- A. Any merger of parcels shall require approval by the Zoning Administrator.
- B. A final plat of a merger shall be submitted to the Zoning Administrator depicting the boundary lines that are proposed to be eliminated. A preliminary plat shall not be required for a merger.

Description:

Proposed text amendments to add new language, §10-E Merger of Parcels; to amend Article 2, Usage and Definitions; and to amend §12-E, Vacation of Plat, of the Clarke County Subdivision Ordinance; and to amend Article 9, Definitions, of the Clarke County Zoning Ordinance. The purpose of the text amendments is to require any merger of parcels to be reviewed and approved via final plat by the Zoning Administrator for compliance with County ordinances. The text amendments would also amend the current definition of "merger" in the Ordinances to distinguish the transaction from a "vacation," and would correct a code reference error in §12-E of the Subdivision Ordinance.

Requested Action:

Set public hearing for November 20, 2012 Board of Supervisors regular meeting.

Planning Commission Recommendation:

Following a duly advertised Public Hearing on September 7, 2012, the Planning Commission voted 8-0 (Staelin, Kreider, McFillen absent) to recommend adoption of the text amendments.

Staff Discussion/Analysis:

The proposed text amendments are presented by Planning Staff to reconcile a technical issue between the Zoning and Subdivision Ordinances regarding mergers of parcels. Currently, there is no ordinance requirement that Planning Staff review and approve a plat when a property owner proposes to merge two or more existing lots. An applicant need only submit a plat along with a deed or affidavit to the Clerk's office for recordation – no Planning Department approval is required.

The Board of Supervisors deferred Staff's request to set public hearing at their September 18, 2012 meeting as they had questions requiring additional research by Staff. Specifically, Board members were concerned that requiring merger applicants to provide a boundary survey of properties being merged could result in substantial expense in the form of survey costs to the applicants. This could be especially true if the properties being merged were large and had never been previously surveyed. Board members requested Staff responses to two questions — can the merger be reviewed and approved by Staff by having the applicant provide a deed instead of a plat and, if not, can Staff require that the plat show the boundary line or lines being eliminated instead of requiring the entire parcels to be surveyed.

As noted in the original Staff Report, one of the main reasons for requiring a merger plat is to enable Staff to accurately account for dwelling unit rights (DURs), and to advise applicants how a merger may affect the number of DURs that they have available. For DUR accounting purposes, the Zoning Ordinance identifies tracts of land based on the County Real Property Identification Map, or in other words, by Tax Map Identification Number. Deeds rarely refer to parcels by Tax Map Number and most commonly refer to earlier recorded plats or to metes and bounds descriptions in earlier recorded deeds.

If a deed review method is used, Staff may be required to conduct deed research to verify that the parcels to be merged match the information in the Tax Maps. Occasionally, Staff has experienced situations in which deeds refer to earlier plats or earlier metes and bounds descriptions that do not match current configurations on the Tax Maps or the County GIS. In these situations, Staff has to search the chain of title in an attempt to resolve the discrepancy. If a merger plat is required, the applicant's licensed surveyor will be able to accurately identify the properties by both deed reference and Tax Map Number, eliminating the need for Staff to conduct deed research.

Per the Board's direction, Staff consulted with the County Attorney on the question of approving mergers by deed as opposed to requiring a plat. The County Attorney confirmed that merger applicants can be required to have Planning Staff review and approve the deed prior to its recordation. The proposed text amendment would have to be changed to include requirements for specific language in the deed of merger along with a line for Planning Staff to sign indicating approval of the deed before it can be recorded.

Policing of deed approach however would fall to the Circuit Court Clerk's office. In order for the deed-based ordinance to be applied, Clerk's office staff would be relied upon to identify deeds of merger that do not meet the ordinance's requirements. Under a plat-based ordinance, Clerk's office staff would follow current procedures for plat recordation by verifying the Planning Staff's stamp and signature before recording the plat.

Staff also notes that the proposed amendment would also aid the Commissioner of the Revenue's office to track and process mergers. Mergers are reviewed by the Commissioner's office as part of the regular review of land transactions for inclusion in the Real Property database and the Tax Maps. Commissioner's office staff is currently limited to reviewing the deeds of merger to identify the properties that were merged, and they are reliant on the accuracy of the deed information absent a survey in capturing this information for the database. In speaking with Commissioner Donna Peake, she noted that requiring plats would greatly simplify and increase Staff's accuracy in processing mergers. She also indicated her support for the plat-based approach to processing mergers.

Should the Board select the deed-based approach, Staff recommends that the Board consider adding language to the amendment that would empower the Zoning Administrator to require a plat in situations where the chain of title cannot be determined by the deeds alone. Mr. Mitchell concurred that this would be a viable alternative and would prevent Staff from having to perform deed research.

Regarding the second concern, Staff can accept a merger plat that identifies the properties to be merged and the boundary line or lines to be eliminated without requiring the entire property boundaries to be shown on the survey. To clarify this, Staff has added language to proposed 10-E-B below stating that the plat of merger shall depict "at a minimum the boundary lines that are proposed to be eliminated."

Staff Recommendation:

Staff has no outstanding concerns with the adoption of the proposed text amendments and does not recommend replacing the platting requirement with a process that would involve Staff reviewing the deed for the merger transaction for the reasons stated above.

ZONING AND SUBDIVISION ORDINANCE TEXT AMENDMENTS (TA-12-04) Merger of Parcels

September 18, 2012 Board of Supervisors Meeting – SET PUBLIC HEARING STAFF REPORT – Department of Planning

The purpose of this staff report is to provide information to the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors to assist them in reviewing this proposed ordinance amendment. It may be useful to members of the general public interested in this proposed amendment.

Description:

Proposed text amendments to add new language, §10-E Merger of Parcels; to amend Article 2, Usage and Definitions; and to amend §12-E, Vacation of Plat, of the Clarke County Subdivision Ordinance; and to amend Article 9, Definitions, of the Clarke County Zoning Ordinance. The purpose of the text amendments is to require any merger of parcels to be reviewed and approved via final plat by the Zoning Administrator for compliance with County ordinances. The text amendments would also amend the current definition of "merger" in the Ordinances to distinguish the transaction from a "vacation," and would correct a code reference error in §12-E of the Subdivision Ordinance.

Requested Action:

Set public hearing for October 16, 2012 Board of Supervisors regular meeting.

Planning Commission Recommendation:

Following a duly advertised Public Hearing on September 7, 2012, the Planning Commission voted 8-0 (Staelin, Kreider, McFillen absent) to recommend adoption of the text amendments.

Staff Discussion/Analysis:

The proposed text amendment is presented by Planning Staff to reconcile a technical issue between the Zoning and Subdivision Ordinances regarding mergers of parcels. Currently, there is no ordinance requirement that Planning Staff review and approve a plat when a property owner proposes to merge two or more existing lots. An applicant need only submit a plat along with a deed or affidavit to the Clerk's office for recordation – no Planning Department approval is required.

The absence of a Planning Department review requirement conflicts with §3-D-8 (Vacation or Merger of Lots or Parcels in the AOC and FOC Districts) of the Zoning Ordinance. This section requires dwelling unit rights (DURs) to be reallocated according to the table found in §3-D-2 when lots are merged. Since there is no requirement that the Planning Department review and approve merger plats prior to recordation, Planning Staff cannot maintain an accurate accounting of DURs on these affected parcels. This can result in confusion and potential hardship to current and future property owners that are unaware that their DURs may have been reduced when the properties were merged.

If the text amendment is adopted, the conflict between the ordinances would be resolved and all plats for merger would have to be reviewed and approved by the Planning Department prior to

recordation. Staff would develop an application process for these transactions and a protocol for capturing any changes in allocated DURs. Staff also recommends that, as with other types of plats, merger plats be recorded within six months of the approval date or be considered null and void.

Staff notes that when these proposed text amendments were first presented to the Planning Commission in July, they included vacation of plats as a transaction that would be covered by the amendments. A "vacation" of a plat involves the rescission of a recorded plat of subdivision in order to return a parcel or parcels to a previous configuration. Following review by the County Attorney, he advised that we should not include vacation of plats in the proposed amendments. Plat vacation has a specific review process set forth in the Code of Virginia that is incorporated by reference in §12-E of the Subdivision Ordinance. Staff's previously proposed changes would have deviated from the State Code process so references to vacation of plats have been removed from the proposed amendments. To mitigate confusion regarding mergers and vacations, Staff has provided a revised definition of "merger" that replaces the term "vacation" with "elimination."

Also included in the amendments is a correction to a code citation in §12-E. This section states that vacation of a plat "shall be subject to the provisions of Section 3-D-7 of the Clarke County Zoning Ordinance," with Section 3-D-7 being "Allocation Disclosure." The correct reference should be to Section 3-D-8, "Vacation or Merger of Lots or Parcels of Land in the AOC and FOC Districts."

Staff Recommendation:

Staff has no outstanding concerns with the adoption of the proposed text amendments.

<u>AMENDMENT TEXT</u> (new or amended language in bold italics with strikethroughs where applicable):

Subdivision Ordinance:

10-E MERGER

- A. Any merger of parcels shall require approval by the Zoning Administrator.
- B. A final plat of a merger shall be submitted to the Zoning Administrator. A preliminary plat shall not be required for a merger.
- C. The merger plat for property in the AOC or FOC zoning districts shall show thereon the Dwelling Unit Rights on the merged parcel, which shall comply with the provisions of §3-D-8 of the Zoning Ordinance.
- D. The Zoning Administrator shall review the plat for compliance with County ordinances, and shall approve, disapprove, or approve with modifications.

- E. An approved final plat shall be recorded within six (6) months of approval, and a copy of the recorded plat shall be returned to the Zoning Administrator.
- 2-B-34 MERGER: The *vacation elimination* of one or more boundary lines between parcels of land, resulting in a single parcel of land.
- 12-E VACATION OF PLAT

Any plat of record may be vacated in accordance with the provisions of the Virginia Land Subdivision Act, Title 15.2, Chapter 22, Article 6, Sections 2271 and 2272. Vacation of any plat of record, or of any portion of a plat of record, of subdivided land situated in the Agricultural-Open Space-Conservation (AOC) or the Forestal-Open Space- Conservation (FOC) zoning districts shall be subject to the provisions of Section *3-D-7 3-D-8* of the Clarke County Zoning Ordinance.

Zoning Ordinance:

9-B-127 MERGER: The *vacation elimination* of one or more boundary lines between parcels of land, resulting in a single parcel of land.

GOVERNOR'S DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITY FUND CLARKE LOCAL GRANT PERFORMANCE AGREEMENT

This PERFORMANCE AGREEMENT made and entered this day of September, 2012, by and among the COUNTY OF CLARKE, VIRGINIA (the "Locality") a political subdivision of the Commonwealth of Virginia (the "Commonwealth"), BERRYVILLE GRAPHICS, INC. (the "Company"), a Delaware corporation authorized to transact business in the Commonwealth, and the INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY OF CLARKE COUNTY, VIRGINIA (the "Authority"), a political subdivision of the Commonwealth.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Locality has been awarded a grant of and expects to receive \$200,000 from the Governor's Development Opportunity Fund (a "GOF Grant") through the Virginia Economic Development Partnership Authority ("VEDP") for the purpose of inducing the Company to expand, improve and operate a manufacturing facility in the Locality (the "Facility"), thereby making a significant Capital Investment, as hereinafter defined, and creating and maintaining a significant number of New Jobs, as hereinafter defined;

WHEREAS, the Authority wishes to make a grant of \$200,000 from funds provided to it by the Locality (the "Local Grant") for the purpose of inducing the Company, directly or indirectly, to expand, improve and operate the Facility in the Locality, thereby making or causing to be made a significant Capital Investment, and creating and maintaining a significant number of New Jobs:

WHEREAS, the Locality, the Authority and the Company desire to set forth their understanding and agreement as to the payout of the GOF Grant and the Local Grant (together, the "Grants"), the use of the proceeds of the Grants, the obligations of the Company regarding Capital Investment and New Job creation and maintenance, and the repayment by the Company of all or part of the Grants under certain circumstances;

WHEREAS, the expansion and operation of the Facility will entail a capital expenditure of approximately \$10,614,520, of which approximately \$9,905,225 will be invested in machinery and equipment and approximately \$709,295 will be invested in the up-fit of the building;

WHEREAS, the expansion and operation of the Facility will further entail the creation and maintenance of 84 New Jobs at the Facility; and

WHEREAS, the stimulation of the additional tax revenue and economic activity to be generated by the Capital Investment and New Jobs constitutes a valid public purpose for the expenditure of public funds and is the animating purpose for the Grants:

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing, the mutual benefits, promises and undertakings of the parties to this Agreement, and other good and valuable consideration, the

receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties covenant and agree as follows.

Section 1. <u>Definitions</u>.

For the purposes of this Agreement, the following terms shall have the following definitions:

"Capital Investment" means a capital expenditure by or on behalf of the Company in taxable real property, taxable tangible personal property, or both, at the Facility on or after April 1, 2012. Capital Investment includes the acquisition price of equipment to be transferred to the Facility from the Company's current facilities in other states, which assets are estimated to have had an acquisition price of \$7,224,275. Capital Investment does not include the acquisition price or other value of equipment transferred to the Facility from the Company's current facility in Frederick County, Virginia. The total capital expenditure of \$10,614,520, is referred to in this Agreement as the "Capital Investment."

"Maintain" means that the New Jobs created pursuant to the Grants will continue without interruption from the date of creation through the Performance Date. Positions for the New Jobs will be treated as Maintained during periods in which such positions are not filled due to (i) temporary reductions in the Company's employment levels (so long as there is active recruitment for open positions), (ii) strikes and (iii) other temporary work stoppages.

"New Job" means new permanent full-time employment of an indefinite duration at the Facility for which the standard fringe benefits are paid by the Company for the employee, and for which the Company pays an average annual wage of at least \$41,584. Each New Job must require a minimum of either (i) 35 hours of an employee's time per week for the entire normal year of the Company's operations, which "normal year" must consist of at least 48 weeks, or (ii) 1,680 hours per year. Seasonal or temporary positions, positions created when a job function is shifted from an existing location in the Commonwealth, and positions with construction contractors, vendors, suppliers and similar multiplier or spin-off jobs shall not qualify as New Jobs. The New Jobs must be in addition to the 464 full-time jobs at the Facility as of January 19, 2012. The New Jobs must be in addition to the 102 full-time jobs to be transferred to the Facility from the Company's current facility in Frederick County.

"Performance Date" means September 30, 2015. If the Locality, in consultation with the Authority and VEDP, deems that good faith and reasonable efforts have been made and are being made by the Company to achieve the Targets, the Locality may agree to extend the Performance Date by up to 15 months. If the Performance Date is extended, the Locality shall send written notice of the extension to the Authority, the Company and VEDP and the date to which the Performance Date has been extended shall be the "Performance Date" for the purposes of this Agreement.

"Targets" means the Company's obligations to make Capital Investments at the Facility of at least \$10,614,520 and to create and Maintain at least 84 New Jobs at the Facility, all as of the Performance Date.

"Virginia Code" means the Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended.

Section 2. <u>Targets</u>.

The Company will develop and operate the Facility in the Locality, make a Capital Investment of at least \$10,614,520, and create and Maintain at least 84 New Jobs at the Facility, all as of the Performance Date.

The Locality and the Authority hereby strongly encourage the Company to ensure that at least thirty percent (30%) of the New Jobs are offered to "Residents" of the Commonwealth, as defined in Virginia Code Section 58.1-302. In pertinent part, that definition includes natural persons domiciled in Virginia or natural persons who, for an aggregate of more than 183 days of the year, maintained a place of abode within the Commonwealth, whether domiciled in the Commonwealth or not.

The average annual wage of the New Jobs of at least \$41,584 is more than the prevailing average annual wage in the Locality of \$38,200. The Locality is not a high-unemployment locality, having an unemployment rate for 2011, which is the last year for which such data is available, of 5.0% as compared to the 2011 statewide unemployment rate of 6.2%. The Locality is not a high-poverty locality, with a poverty rate for 2010 which is the last year for which such data is available, of 8.3% as compared to the 2010 statewide poverty rate of 11.1%.

The Company shall provide the option for its current 81 employees to move from its facility in Frederick County to the Facility. Pursuant to Section 2.2-115(D) of the Virginia Code, the Secretary of Commerce and Trade sent a letter to the Chairmen of the Senate Finance and House Appropriations Committees explaining and justifying this move.

Section 3. Disbursement and Use of Grants.

(a) Disbursement and Use of GOF Grant: By no later than September 30, 2012, the Locality will request the disbursement to it of the GOF Grant. If not so requested by the Locality by September 30, 2012, this Agreement will terminate. The Locality and the Company will be entitled to reapply for a GOF Grant thereafter, based upon the terms, conditions and availability of funds at that time.

The GOF Grant in the amount of \$200,000 will be paid to the Locality, upon its request. Within 30 days of its receipt of the GOF Grant proceeds, the Locality will disburse the GOF Grant proceeds to the Authority. Within 30 days of its receipt of the GOF Grant proceeds, the Authority will disburse the GOF Grant proceeds to the Company as an inducement to the Company to achieve the Targets at the Facility. The Company will use the GOF Grant proceeds for (i) public and private utility extension or capacity development on and off site, (ii) grading, drainage, paving, and any other activity required to prepare a site for construction, or (iii) construction or build-out of publicly or privately owned buildings, as permitted by Section 2.2-115(D) of the Virginia Code.

(b) Disbursement and Use of Local Grant: The Authority will receive at least \$200,000 from the Locality for the purpose of making the Local Grant. The Local Grant in the amount of \$200,000 will be disbursed by the Authority to the Company at the same time that the Authority disburses the GOF Grant proceeds to the Company. The disbursement of the Local Grant to the Company is being made as an inducement to the Company to achieve the Targets at the Facility.

The Company will use the Local Grant proceeds to offset the cost of utility extension work to service the Facility and the cost of the up-fit to the Facility.

Section 4. Break-Even Point; State and Local Incentives.

VEDP has estimated that the Commonwealth will reach its "break-even point" by the Performance Date. The break-even point compares new revenues realized as a result of the Capital Investment and New Jobs at the Facility with the Commonwealth's expenditures on incentives, including but not limited to the GOF Grant. With regard to the Facility, the Commonwealth expects to provide incentives in the following amounts:

Category of Incentive:	<u>Total Amount</u>
GOF Grant	\$ 200,000
Virginia Jobs Investment Program ("VJIP") (Estimated)	67,200

The Locality expects to provide the following incentives, as matching grants or otherwise, for the Facility:

Category of Incentive:	Total Amount
Local Grant	\$ 200,000

The proceeds of the GOF Grant shall be used for the purposes described in Section 3(a). The VJIP grant proceeds shall be used by the Company to pay or reimburse itself for recruitment and training costs. The proceeds of the Locality's grant shall be used for the purposes described in Section 3(b).

Section 5. Repayment Obligation.

- (a) If Minimum Statutory Eligibility Requirements are Not Met: Section 2.2-115 of the Virginia Code requires that the Company make a Capital Investment of at least \$5,000,000 in the Facility and create and Maintain at least 50 New Jobs at the Facility in order to be eligible for the GOF Grant. Failure by the Company to meet either of these minimum statutory eligibility requirements by the Performance Date shall constitute a breach of this Agreement and the entire amount of both Grants must be repaid by the Company to the Authority.
- (b) GOF Grant If Minimum Statutory Eligibility Requirements are Met: For purposes of repayment, the GOF Grant is to be allocated as \$100,000 (50%) for the Company's Capital Investment Target and \$100,000 (50%) for its New Jobs Target. If the Company has met at least ninety percent (90%) of both of the Targets at the Performance Date, then and thereafter

the Company is no longer obligated to repay any portion the GOF Grant. If the Company has not met at least ninety percent (90%) of either or both of its Targets at the Performance Date, the Company shall repay to the Authority that part of the GOF Grant that is proportional to the Target or Targets for which there is a shortfall. For example, if at the Performance Date, the Capital Investment is only \$6,368,712 (60% of the Capital Investment Target) and only 42 New Jobs have been created and Maintained (50% of the New Jobs Target), the Company shall repay to the Authority forty percent (40%) of the moneys allocated to the Capital Investment Target (\$40,000) and fifty percent (50%) of the moneys allocated to the New Jobs Target (\$50,000).

(c) Local Grant – If the Statutory Minimum Requirements are Met: The following provisions of this subsection (c) apply only if the Company has met both of the minimum statutory eligibility requirements set forth in subsection (a). For purposes of repayment, the Local Grant is to be allocated as \$200,000 (100%) for the Company's Capital Investment Target, as modified in the following provisions of this subsection (c).

For the purposes of the Local Grant, the Locality, the Authority and the Company have assumed that capital expenditures will be made in the Locality in the following categories of expenditures and in the following time frames:

Building Improvements:

Within 1 year: \$ 709,295

New Equipment:

Within 2 years: \$1,876,665 Within 3 years: 2,680,950

All Relocated Equipment (Being Transferred into the Locality; Value When Purchased):

Within 2 years: \$11,150,553 Within 3 years: \$15,929,361

Based upon these numbers, the Company will have made capital expenditures at the Facility (including the acquisition value of all relocated equipment) by the end of the second year of \$13,736,513 and by the end of the third year of \$19,319,606.

If by September 30, 2014, the Company has not made capital expenditures at the Facility (including the acquisition value of all relocated equipment) of at least \$10,989,201 (80% of \$13,736,513), a repayment of a portion of the Local Grant will be due from the Company to the Authority calculated by subtracting the percentage of the capital expenditures so made from 80%, then multiplying the difference by \$135,000. For example, if the Company has made such capital expenditures of \$10,302,385 (75% of \$13,736,513): $80\% - 75\% = 5\% \times $135,000 = $6,750$ repayment.

If by the Performance Date, the Company has not made capital expenditures at the Facility (including the acquisition value of all relocated equipment) of at least \$19,319,606, a repayment of a portion of the Local Grant will be due from the Company to the Authority calculated by subtracting the percentage of the capital expenditures so made from 100%, then multiplying the difference by \$200,000, and subtracting one-half of any repayment made in accordance with the prior paragraph. For example, if the Company made 82% of its capital expenditures required by September 30, 2014, so owed no repayment in accordance with the prior paragraph, but made such capital expenditures at the Facility by the Performance Date of only \$17,387,645 (90% of \$19,319,606): $100\% - 90\% = 10\% \times $200,000 = $20,000$ repayment. For a further example, if the Company owed a repayment as described in the prior paragraph of \$6,750 and made such capital expenditures by the Performance Date of only \$17,387,645 (90% of \$19,319,606): $100\% - 90\% = 10\% \times $200,000 = $20,000 - $3,375 (1/2 of $6,750) = $16,625$ repayment.

- (d) Determination of Inability to Comply: Notwithstanding subsections (a), (b) or (c), if the Locality or VEDP shall determine at any time prior to the Performance Date (a "Determination Date") that the Company is unable or unwilling to meet and Maintain its Targets by and through the Performance Date, and if the Locality, the Authority or VEDP shall have promptly notified the Company of such determination, the Company must repay the entire amount of both Grants to the Authority. Such a determination will be based on such circumstances as a filing by or on behalf of the Company under Chapter 7 of the U.S. Bankruptcy Code, the liquidation of the Company, an abandonment of the Facility by the Company or other similar significant event that demonstrates that the Company will be unable or is unwilling to satisfy the Targets.
- (e) Repayment Dates: Such repayment shall be due from the Company to the Authority within ninety days of the Performance Date or September 30, 2014 (as to subsection (c) above) or the Determination Date, as applicable. Any moneys repaid by the Company to the Authority hereunder shall be repaid by the Authority to the Locality. Any money repaid to the Locality allocable to the GOF Grant shall be repaid by the Locality promptly to VEDP for redeposit into the Governor's Development Opportunity Fund. The Locality and the Authority shall use their best efforts to recover such funds, including legal action for breach of this Agreement. Neither the Locality nor the Authority shall have any responsibility for the repayment of any sums hereunder unless said sums have been received by the Authority from the Company.

Section 6. Company Reporting.

The Company shall provide, at the Company's expense, detailed verification reasonably satisfactory to the Locality, the Authority and VEDP of the Company's progress on the Targets. Such progress reports will be provided annually, starting at January 1, 2013 and covering the period through the prior September 30, and at such other times as the Locality, the Authority or VEDP may reasonably require.

With each such progress report, the Company shall report to VEDP the amount paid by the Company in the prior calendar year in Virginia corporate income tax. VEDP has represented

to the Company that it considers such information to be confidential proprietary information that is exempt from public disclosure under the Virginia Freedom of Information Act and that such information will be used by VEDP solely in calculating aggregate return on invested capital analyses for purposes of gauging the overall effectiveness of economic development incentives.

Section 7. Notices.

Any notices required or permitted under this Agreement shall be given in writing, and shall be deemed to be received upon receipt or refusal after mailing of the same in the United States Mail by certified mail, postage fully pre-paid or by overnight courier (refusal shall mean return of certified mail or overnight courier package not accepted by the addressee):

Section 8. Miscellaneous.

(a) Entire Agreement; Amendments: This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement among the parties hereto as to the GOF Grant and may not be amended or modified, except in

writing, signed by each of the parties hereto. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns. The Company may not assign its rights and obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the Locality, the Authority and VEDP.

- (b) Governing Law; Venue: This Agreement is made, and is intended to be performed, in the Commonwealth and shall be construed and enforced by the laws of the Commonwealth. Jurisdiction and venue for any litigation arising out of or involving this Agreement shall lie in the Circuit Court of the City of Richmond, and such litigation shall be brought only in such court.
- (c) Counterparts: This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be an original, and all of which together shall be one and the same instrument.
- (d) Severability: If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be unenforceable, invalid or illegal, then the enforceability, validity and legality of the remaining provisions will not in any way be affected or impaired, and such provision will be deemed to be restated to reflect the original intentions of the parties as nearly as possible in accordance with applicable law.
