A regular meeting of the Conservation Easement Authority was held at 11:30 am on Thursday, 19 January 2017, at the Camino Real Restaurant, 16 Crow Street, Berryville, Virginia.

Call to Order: Alison Teetor, Clerk to the Easement Authority, called the meeting to order at 11:30 a.m.

Election of Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Treasurer

Ms. Teetor asked for nominations of Chairman to the Authority. Mr. Ohrstrom nominated Mr. Buckley for the position of Chairman for 2017, Ms. Thomas seconded. The Authority voted unanimously to elect Mr. Buckley as Chairman of the Authority for 2017.

Mr. Buckley asked for nominations of Vice Chairman to the Authority. Ms. Thomas nominated Mr. Ohrstrom for the position of Vice Chairman of the Authority for 2017, Ms. Wallace seconded. The Authority voted unanimously to elect Mr. Ohrstrom as Vice Chairman of the Authority for 2017.

Mr. Buckley asked for nominations of Secretary/Treasurer to the Authority. Ms. Wallace nominated Mr. Engel for the position of Secretary/Treasurer for the Authority for 2017, Mr. Ohrstrom seconded. The Authority voted unanimously to elect Mr. Engel as Secretary/Treasurer of the Authority for 2017.

Agenda On motion of Ms. Wallace, seconded by Mr. Ohrstrom, the Authority unanimously approved the agenda.

Minutes On motion of Ms. Wallace, seconded by Mr. Ohrstrom, the Authority unanimously voted to approve the minutes of December 14, 2016, with corrections.

Bank Account: Ms. Teetor handed out the spreadsheets and reviewed the expenditures. Current fund balances show a total fund balance of \$164,439 consisting of \$49,285 in the donations account, \$96,542 in stewardship, and \$18,612 in local funds. Funds were spent on the Susan Digges closing which occurred December 29, 2016.

Public Relations: Ms. Cardillo provided an update on the donations to date; this reflects the year end appeal, for a total of 164 donors contributing \$24,778 in 2016, of that amount the year-end appeal netted \$15,665 from 48 donors. The annual Conservation Award will follow this meeting. Ms. Cardillo also stated that she is distributing the notecards to area businesses. She also asked members for suggestions on a person to profile for the winter newsletter. Mr. Ohrstrom suggested William Bowen who is placing a 20 acre parcel in easement later this month.

Re: Easement Authority Sponsorship of Wetlands Exhibit

Dee-lighted the Easement Authority is open to the idea of sponsoring an exhibit on wetlands, featuring the work of sculptor, Sally Myers.

This memo provides background on the origin and purpose of the exhibit, likely benefits for all involved, and preliminary details if it's a go.

Beginnings

Last summer, Jamieanne Amicucci, owner of Grey Gallery in Winchester invited Sally Myers to mount an exhibit. Myers readily accepted because she had an idea that had been brewing for some time.

A while back a neighbor had asked for a piece of a hickory tree on Myers' property that had fallen down as a result of strong winds. As they walked to the tree, he noted the damp, soggy ground, commenting with some satisfaction that he'd "filled all that in" on <u>his</u> land.

Myers offered reasons why wetlands were important. But as his eyes shifted away, she could see it was a fool's errand. So, how COULD she get someone's ear?

How about using art as the lure to open peoples' ears. AND eyes?

The resulting exhibit, which filled the small gallery, featured Myers' stunning recreation of a wetland complete with birds, snakes, and a soaring Blue Heron. (See photos on a separate attachment.) Opening night included a brief, well-received presentation by Tom Akre, ecologist with the Smithsonian Conservation Biology Institute.

It was clear from questions and comments that ears and eyes had <u>indeed</u> been opened. But to <u>keep</u> them opening, two things about the exhibit had to be addressed.

First – education needed to be <u>embedded</u> into the design. Without it, the exhibit was like a photograph without a caption or movie without sound. Visitors could savor the exhibit's artistic beauty but were left clueless about the vital importance of the land that inspired its creation.

Second – both the size of the audience and its geographic reach needed to be increased. This could be achieved by "taking the show on the road," i.e. inviting organizations in Virginia identified with land and resource conservation to host the exhibit in their cities or towns.

The key to a successful launch hinged on the selection of that <u>first</u> sponsor. It needed to be a blue-chip environmental organization that was well-known and highly regarded in conservation circles not only locally but around the state.

Enter the Clarke County Conservation Easement Authority. (We hope!)

Everyone Benefits

Enhancing the exhibit's educational value and growing its geographic reach will surely increase knowledge and understanding about wetlands.

It will also help Sally Myers introduce herself and her work to a wider audience.

But when you consider the potential payback from this exposure opportunity, the biggest winner may be <u>you</u>. Five benefits right off the bat:

- Increased awareness of the Authority among the general public from print and online coverage of opening night.
- Opportunity to enlarge understanding about the Authority and its work in your local community at large
- Chance to strengthen ties to current donors with a special mix and mingle event
- Potential for add-on programming, directed towards people who've expressed interest in easements and, quite possibly ...
- Bragging rights as the organization chosen to premiere this important event

The final advantage is one that makes sponsoring the exhibit almost irresistible: <u>Little or no effort on your part</u>. The entire project is virtually turn-key with all work being performed by our three member team.

I'll be the exhibit manager coordinating all aspects of the launch, working in conjunction with:

Sculptor, Sally Myers who has been making art for more than four decades. Her work can be found in private collections and public spaces across the US. (See SallyMyerssculpture.com.) Using elements from the original show and adding others, she will create a stunning new wetland filled with flora and fauna made of steel.

Graphic Artist, Jeanne Krohn, who has five decades of experience designing exhibits. Included among her clients is SITES – the Smithsonian Exhibition Traveling Exhibition Service, which is the largest traveling exhibition operation in the world. She will design and

install the exhibit blending Myers' sculptures with a series of free-standing panels featuring informative narrative on wetlands, the Authority, and Myers.

Getting Started

While awaiting approval, we have begun filling in some details including:


Location -- Barns of Rose Hill. The team has agreed the small room upstairs would be an ideal spot for the exhibit. Jeanne has already designed a show for the space. Once we have your go-ahead, we will approach the Barns to secure their approval.


Schedule. We think an early spring show would be ideal and have penciled in April 21 to May 30 on our calendars.

Budget. Team members are donating their time to the project. So the only cost to the Authority will be for the purchase of materials such as those relating to the creation of the panels. We estimate the cost to range from \$500 to \$750.

Though the proposed opening is several weeks away, we will need every bit of that time to design and create the exhibit. I'm standing by ready to answer any questions you might have. If it would be helpful, Sally and Jeanne would welcome the opportunity to introduce themselves to the Authority.

Thanks again, Robin, for encouraging us to make this proposal to the Authority. Needless to say we are extremely excited about the potential for all involved and eager to get going. Hope after reading this memo, you and the Authority members share our enthusiasm -- demonstrating it with a green light!







Dear Ms. Alison Teetor:

Several weeks ago I received an email from my undergraduate advisor about an internship with the Clarke County Conservation Easement Authority. I looked into the extraordinary work in land resource preservation the CEA has done over the past 15 years, and I hope to contribute to furthering this effort and assisting in public outreach as well as easement inspections.

As a Shenandoah County native familiar with this area of Virginia, I was very excited to hear about this opportunity. I have always been interested in land use and preservation and am incorporating this interest into my pursuit of a Bachelor of Science degree in Environmental Science at Virginia Tech. This project gave me significant insight into the communication process between government agencies and private landowners and inspired my interest in the process of land use allocation.

This past summer, I was involved in a program sponsored by CalTech working on a research team of students. Our primary focus was identifying potential Active Galactic Nuclei candidates by looking through archived satellite data and communicating our results with the research team across the country. Through this program I gained real-world experience in independent and team research and was able to practice remote and personal communication skills through team collaboration.







The Clarke County Conservation Easement Authority is excited to let you know that a property adjacent to your property was recently placed in conservation easement, permanently protecting this open space. The attached map shows the parcel or parcels placed in easement in relation to your property.

A conservation easement is a legal contract entered into voluntarily by the land owner and an easement holder – such as the Clarke County Conservation Easement Authority – that permanently defines the allowable development on a property to preserve its agricultural and open space assets. This doesn't mean that no development will occur on the property, but the property owner has made the decision to significantly reduce the development potential to preserve the county's open spaces for today and for future generations.



SUBJECT: Application for Donation – Raymond & Michael Barbehennn

The Barbehenn's have submitted an application for an easement donation. The property is located on the west side of Blue Ridge Mountain Road approximately 2.3 miles north of Route 50. The parcel is a portion of Cabin Properties previously owned by the Smalley family. The parcel is identified as Tax Map# 40-A-4M, consisting of 100.4 acres, with 2 DURs. The property is wooded and vacant. The parcel has over ½ mile of frontage on the Appalachian Trail corridor.

The parcel is zoned FOC and currently in landuse, in accord with the Commissioner of Revenue's requirements, therefore a donation may be considered if at least two of the following four guidelines are met:

- 1) the parcel's Property Resource Score is at least 35;
- 2) at least one dwelling unit right is extinguished by the conservation easement;
- 3) the parcel is adjacent to a parcel already under permanent conservation easement;
- 4) the property has a minimum area of 40 acres.

The parcel meets three of the four criteria, the score was 58.45 due to retiring both of the remaining DUR's, AT corridor frontage, and steep slopes. The owner would like to retire both of the remaining DURs.

Recommendation

Give preliminary approval for the easement donation and schedule a site visit.
